

Spalding Concert Scheduled April 1st

Last of Series of Three Programs of Association Anticipated by Klamath Music Lovers

Fortune has smiled on those in Klamath Falls who love good music and this week the beautiful performances of Vitya Vronsky and Victor Habin at the Pelican theatre on Wednesday evening seemed the maximum in enjoyment. However—and right on the heels of the Vronsky-Habin concert—is the delightful evening scheduled for Tuesday, April the first, when America's violinist—Albert Spalding—appears at the Pelican.

Spalding's concert is the third and last planned by the Klamath Community Concert association and it is with regret that ticket holders see the season brought to a close. Mr. Spalding will play here in the midst of a sold-out tour of more than sixty concerts with additional appearances with most of the leading orchestras including the New York Philharmonic Symphony, Boston Symphony and the Philadelphia Symphony.

During the past summer Mr. Spalding was almost as busy as at the height of the winter season, for this distinguished American artist is in great demand for the open air concerts which have achieved such popularity in recent seasons. He gave a brilliant performance of the Tchaikovsky Concerto with the Boston orchestra under Koussevitzky's direction at the Berkshires festival at Stockbridge, Mass., and made his annual, much-acclaimed appearance at the Lewisohn Stadium in New York. He gave two performances at Ravinia park near Chicago and made his third summer appearance at Washington park in Milwaukee.

Mr. Spalding passed the time between seasons at his place in the Berkshires giving his attention equally to tennis (he is amateur champion in western Massachusetts) and to composition. Although he is still a comparatively young man Mr. Spalding has established his name as a composer with more than one hundred original works to his credit in addition to many important transcriptions.

Probably the best known of all American-born instrumentalists, Mr. Spalding is popular not only with the trained musician but with the mass of music-lovers throughout the world. He takes his place among the great musicians of all time and Americans feel a thrill of justifiable pride in being able to claim him.
