UNION PICKS OFFICERS AT SPRAGUE RIVER

SPRAGUE RIVER—At a recent meeting of the Industrial Employees union of Sprague River, a new set of officers was elected. They are: president, Del H. Kruger; vice president, George Snider; secretary, Lee Garrett.

High praise was given to the outgoing officers, who had served for three full terms. They were: Harry Coleman, president; Lee Garrett, vice president; Ben Hansen, secretary-treasurer.

Much was accomplished during the terms of the retiring officers. On April 17, 1940, a working agreement with the Crater Lake and Lumber company went into effect, which greatly improved working conditions. On February 27, 1940, a long battle culminated in the passage of a union shop agreement with the operators.

A number of social affairs, including dances, community picnics, and socials afforded the members recreation during the past three years.

The new administration, under President Kruger, promises to continue to fight for improved working conditions, better relations between employee and employer, and the maintenance of a wage standard comparable to other regions.

So successful has been the relationship between the union and the local company that strikes are practically unheard of and on several occasions the employers have met with the workers for social evenings.

The Westside 4-H Calf clubs will meet at the Union school house the evening of March 27.

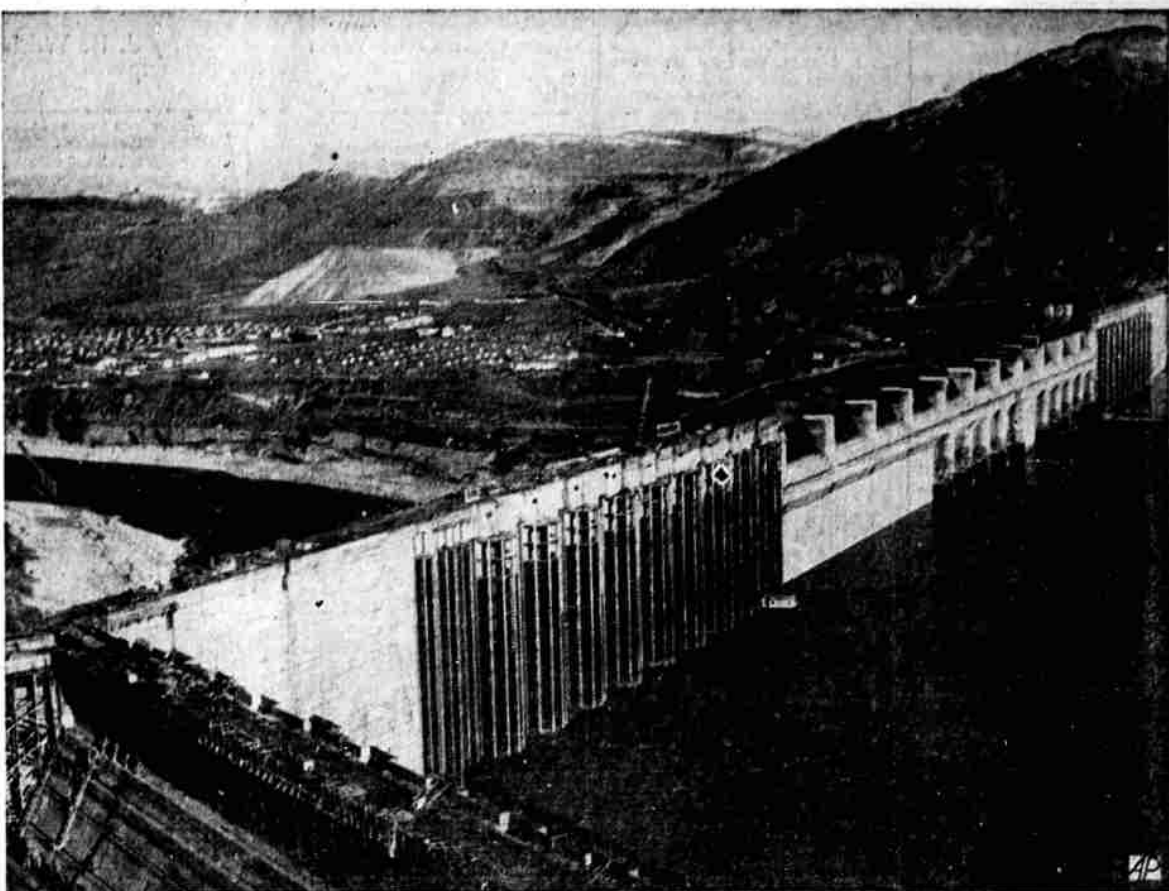
The Union and Vernon school baseball teams met on the Union diamond Friday afternoon, the home team winning by two points.

GRAND COULEE READY FOR BIRTH OF POWER—Demands for more electrical power to answer defense program needs have so stepped up the program at Grand Coulee dam (above) in Washington state that the dam will start to furnish power on March 22, when two 10,000-kilowatt station service generators are cut into the Bonneville transmission line. Grand Coulee will then be contributing kilowatt hours to Pacific Northwest needs and the dam, says John C. Page, Commissioner of the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation, will be going into use two years ahead of schedule. Grand Coulee on the Columbia river, was started in 1933, is 550 feet high and 4,300 feet long. It contains 11,250,000 cubic yards of concrete, is believed the largest structure ever erected by man.
