city of Yugoslavia forever" and that "the axis powers will not ask Yugoslavia to permit passage of troops through Yugoslav territory."

Palace attendants said Regent Prince Paul and the Croat peasant leader, Dr. Vladimir Macek, listened together to a broadcast of the ceremony at a radio in a study of the white palace.

Newspapers, with front page pictures of Adolf Hitler, German Foreign Minister Joachim von Ribbentrop, Premier Cvetkovic and Yugoslav Foreign Minister Aleksander Cincar-Markovic, gave the first official announcement of Yugoslavia's capitulation.

Newsboys prospered as excited crowds throughout the capital snatched up each edition.

Demonstrations—Reports began reaching Belgrade, meanwhile, of demonstrations in the provinces. At Cetinje, in Montenegro, reportedly great crowds gathered, shouting "down with the government!" Denouncing the tripartite treaty with speeches.

(The line was cut at this point in filing the dispatch from Belgrade to The Associated Press office in Bern, Switzerland, for relay to New York. The following is from an earlier dispatch.)

While Yugoslavia's premier and foreign minister were affixing their signatures to the axis alliance and their Yugoslav opponents were crying treason, these developments increased observers' belief a showdown is imminent.

1—Britain appeared prepared to sever diplomatic relations with Yugoslavia and Hungary after advising the Belgrade government she could not "condone" its alliance with the axis.

2—Soviet Russia, whose attitude long has been an enigma, pledged "full and comprehensive neutrality" in the event that Turkey, Britain's non-belligerent ally, is "obliged to enter the war for the defense of her territory."

3—Soviet war materials were reported flowing across the Caucasus frontier into Turkey only a few hours after this pact was announced in Ankara. Russian army and naval units facing German forces in southeastern Europe also were reported being strengthened.

4—Reliable sources asserted Russia also had halted shipments of vital oil supplies to the reich.

SUPPORT OF STRIKE VOICED BY ORTON

O. M. Orton, international president of the International Woodworkers of America, said here Tuesday that the IWA is fully supporting the strike of the plywood workers against the Klamath company here. Orton came to town to address plywood workers and others on the labor situation.

The IWA president reiterated the union's claim that the company broke off negotiations with the CIO union committee prior to the strike, which still persists at the plywood plant.

Discussing the issue of a majority at the Klamath plant, Orton said that the union had accepted a company suggestion that a check of union cards be made. The check, he said, was made by Gerald Murray, county juvenile officer. He said Murray's check showed a majority for the union, that the company refused to accept the check and broke off brief negotiations that followed Murray's report.

Orton said no specific deadline had been set for turning the union cards over to Murray, whereas the company claims that the deadline had been set for 12 noon on February 25 and

that Murray's check was made after that time.
Orton is scheduled to make a radio broadcast Tuesday at 8:15 p. m.
Since the strike occurred, company and union negotiators have been generally at deadlock, chiefly over the majority issue. The union claims the majority has already been established by the card check, while the company has suggested an election be held.

Featured will be high school and college bands, orchestras, choirs and a huge festival in which 25 marching units will participate in a festival in the Gonzaga stadium.
