

BONNEVILLE MEET DRAWS NEW INTEREST

Several more groups, union and civic, announced their interest in public power in the basin Tuesday night at a meeting of the Klamath County Bonneville power committee, Secretary A. M. Thomas reported Wednesday.

A. L. Barker, appointed delegate of the Central Labor council, sat in at the conclave, Thomas said, and stated that the local machinist's union had unanimously passed a resolution endorsing public power at their last meeting. Barker also announced that various railroad brotherhoods were interested in the Bonneville power plan.

The newly-formed Stewart-Lenox community club were expected to align themselves with the power committee's platform, Thomas indicated. Two delegates from Langell valley also were present.

Plans for a downtown mass meeting were discussed but nothing definite was done regarding a date and place for the proposed gathering.

The group accepted an invitation to meet with the Fraternal Order of Eagles in the near future and will convene with the railroad carmen at Mills addition next week.

WILLAMETTE NOT 'PRIORITY' ROAD

The Willamette highway is not at present on the priority list as a military road, according to word received from the war department by the Klamath county chamber of commerce. Priority, however, has been accorded The Dalles-California highway.

In the letter it was stated that a network of 80,000 miles has been placed on the priority list with the purpose of bringing these roads up to certain minimum standards for military use. The actual construction, however, will be carried on through the usual federal aid procedure, it was stated.

RED CROSS TO HEAR TALK ON FUTURE WORK

Chairman Earl Redman of the Klamath County chapter of the American Red Cross, in a statement Tuesday said the Red Cross this year faces an unprecedented responsibility if it is to meet vastly increased needs resulting not only from the necessity of greatly expanded service requirements, but also from the added obligations resulting from the national defense activities of our government. If these obligations are to be met every chapter in the Pacific area must appreciably strengthen its organization and expand its program of services.

Nyles T. Christensen, assistant director of first aid and water safety from the Pacific branch offices of the American Red Cross will explain these obligations in his talk given at the annual Klamath county chapter meeting at the Elk hotel Wednesday evening, March 26, at 6:30 o'clock. Christensen will also explain what the Red Cross is doing in the war-torn countries of Europe and what will be expected of the Red Cross in the future.

The annual report of the local chapter will be given to each person attending the dinner. It is a record of the accomplishments of the various services for the year 1940.

RESCUE MISSION RAPIDLY RISING

Men from Klamath "jungles" are building the \$5000 Klamath Union Rescue Mission which is rapidly going up on property purchased from the city at the corner of Owens street and Shasta way. The men, according to W. A. Sellwood, superintendent in charge of the mission, were fed by women of the Klamath Temple during their working day Saturday. Women of the various participating churches will take turns in feeding the men who assist in the construction of the church.

Dr. C. B. Cassel is chairman of the board.

Work was under way on the structure the first of March and from all appearances will probably be completed late in April with dedicatory services early in May. It is now the plan of the board to lay the cornerstone of the mission Sunday, April 6, although this date is not definite. The stone has been donated by Former County Judge George D. Grizzle and Mrs. Grizzle, and pastors of the various churches will take part in the ceremony. All work will be donated, most of it from the "jungles," Sellwood stated Tuesday. The foundation of the mission was laid in four and one-half hours Saturday by 13 men who worked on the job.

in repairing the worst places on the road. In answer to a query, Howard said it would cost between \$11,000 and \$12,000 to bring the nine miles of road (between Lakeview highway and Sprague River) to standards permitting the oiling of the road. Oiling would cost about \$2000 a mile.

Ivy Clark, Sprague River justice of the peace, said he had received a letter from Congressman Pierce suggesting that efforts be made to have the Indian service earmark Indian road funds for the Sprague River road. Pierce said that such a plan had been successful in connection with a road on a reservation in Nevada.

In the discussion, past efforts to have the road included on the state highway secondary system were reviewed, and little immediate hope for that was held out. Justice Clark said he had been informed the county has \$40,000 more this year in its available road funds than last year, and urged that an appropriation be made from the fund to do a permanent, constructive piece of work on the Sprague road.

Dates Set—Many Klamath Falls garden enthusiasts and members of the local garden groups, are interested to learn the state convention of the Oregon Federation of Garden clubs will be held May 14 and 15 in Grants Pass. Because the convention is close to this city, a number are expected to attend from here.

The Johnstown election was scheduled this morning but Foster Jones, an official of the ERP, said nothing had been done, adding:

"We want to hold our election but we do not want to do anything that might precipitate trouble."

"The Germans have been sinking anything they saw," one source commented, "so the position is unaltered."
