Green Salads Substitute Well For Old Fashioned Spring Tonic

The present generation of military men eats more fruits and vegetables than most women think, according to Mary de Garmo Bryan, chairman of the committee appointed to suggest revision of the Navy's Cookbook. That makes the spring tonic problem far easier for everyone.

Not sulphur and molasses, but fruits, vegetables and salad greens are today's spring tonics. The large wooden bowl, stacked with assorted greens, some raw vegetables and perhaps a few fresh fruits is the American way of recharging the body with vitamins and minerals after the ravages of winter.

Combine as many in one salad as you can. Use a plain French dressing, toss well and serve on

KEEP GREENS CRISP
Fern Silver, supervisor of home economics at Lincoln high school, Albuquerque, N. M., writes of salads in her practical new book, "Foods and Nutrition."

"To make their greens deliciously crisp, wash the leaves under cold running water, dry lightly with a towel, fold in a damp cloth, and put in the ice-box for some time before using. Other salad ingredients also should be chilled and kept cold until served."

"When using ingredients that

discolor quickly, such as apples or bananas, sprinkle a little lemon juice over them after peeling. A sharp knife should be used to dice (not mince) ingredients into small attractive pieces.

"Toss ingredients lightly together with a fork to avoid a stirred-up look. Some ingredients, notably greens, acquire a wilted look when exposed to the acid of salad dressings if allowed to stand mixed with the

FRENCH DRESSING
Three-fourths cup salad oil, 3 tablespoons vinegar or lemon

juice, 1 tablespoon salt, dash pepper, few grains paprika, 1 teaspoon mustard, 1 teaspoon sugar.

Mix dry ingredients with vinegar or lemon juice. Add oil and beat until creamy thick. The
