Long in L. A. to Get Sire For Band of Saddle Horses

SILVER LAKE — Reuben Long of Fort Rock and Silver Lake, owner of what is said the largest privately owned band of saddle horses in Oregon, is in Los Angeles this week to bring back another pedigree sire for his herd. "King on Parade" is the name of the horse, which is a famous American saddle bred with a family tree that antedates the Mayflower. Long bought him last fall but delayed bringing him to his desert ranch during winter for fear the change might upset his Majesty.

On his homestead land he bought or leased in Fort Rock valley Long has raised horses for rent to rodeos and camping parties since the early 1920s. By selective breeding he has built up the bloodlines of his horses until now his yearling colts are in demand by saddle clubs and polo ponies.

A few decades ago the great Oregon desert, comprising nearly half of Lake and Harney counties, was known as Horse Heaven and was the home of thousands of wild horses. As late as 1918 the late Bill Brown,

owner of the famous Gap ranch, sold 1000 head of prime saddle stock to the U. S. Cavalry at \$80 a head.

As a boy Reuben Long lived at Christmas lake before the desert was opened to homestead entry. He watched the bands of untamed horses as they came to water at the lake. Their wild beauty and freedom captured his imagination and roused an interest he never lost. When the early 1920s the U. S. forest service passed a ruling against the admission of horses to grazing on forest lands the wild horses, already greatly reduced in number, were doomed. Hundreds of them were rounded up and sold for chicken feed for five dollars a head.

But Long did not sell his horses. He purchased the best sires he could afford and went on raising horses, foreseeing the time when they would be scarcer and more valuable. For several years he has managed a saddle horse and pack horse service to tourists at Diamond lake each summer. He is widely known over the state as a man who knows horses and loves them.

A second Klamath Falls driver, Ray Orville Salk, also pleaded guilty to driving an automobile while intoxicated and signed an agreement before Justice of the Peace Clyde Barks to pay his \$100 fine in installments.
