Langell Valley Soil Conservation District Confirmed

Robert H. Warrens, chairman of the state soil conservation committee of Oregon, has issued legal notice of result of the referendum for the creation of the proposed Langell Valley Soil Conservation district. This notice states that 92 votes, representing 26,250 acres, were cast in favor of the creation of said soil conservation district, with none voting against. As required by law, this is over 50 per cent of the land owners and over 70 per cent of the acreage of the district.

The law provides that two supervisors be appointed by the state committee and these have been appointed, and are as follows: M. T. Prince and O. S. Campbell.

As soon as nominating petitions for the election of three other supervisors are completed and in the hands of the state soil conservation committee, an election will be called to select three additional supervisors, making a board of five to conduct the affairs of the district.

Controversial Bills Among 22 Measures On Governor's Desk

SALEM, April 1 (AP)—Only 22 bills remained on Governor Charles A. Sprague's desk today, and he has until Friday to dispose of them.

But among those measures are some of the most controversial of the 511 bills passed by the legislature.

Included are bills taxing cigarettes 2 cents a package, permitting sale of natural wines over the bar, giving free textbooks to students in private schools, increasing penalties for sabotage, and preventing persons who advocate overthrow of the government by force from holding office or seeking public office.

Other measures which he has not yet disposed of would: create a board to license watchmakers and watch repairmen, authorize vocational education schools, permit increase in logging truck weights from 54,000 to 68,000 pounds, appropriate \$15,000 for education of hand-

capped children, regulate cold storage lockers, appropriate \$190,000 for research on crop diseases, appropriate \$250 for a fence around the bronze state seal in the floor of the capitol rotunda, create a nine-member Oregon dairy products commission to conduct national advertising campaign in behalf of Oregon dairy products, and increase educational requirements of cosmeticians.

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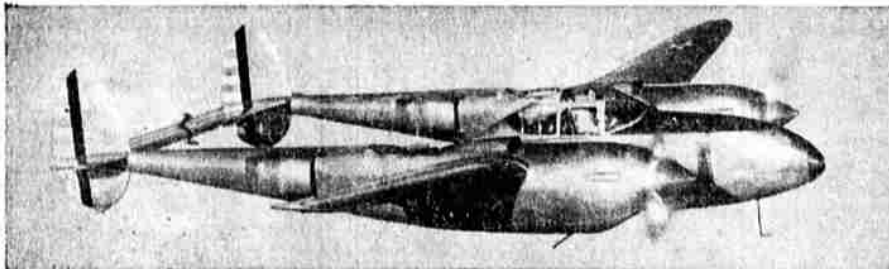
