Lawson Little Seeking Fifth Anniversary Win at Masters'

AUGUSTA, Ga., April 1 (AP) — With five years as a professional golfer behind him, Lawson Little will go into the St. Augusta Masters' tournament Thursday bidding for victory as the proper way to celebrate his fifth anniversary as a pro. It was in the 1936 masters that Little switched from the pay-for-play to the play-for-pay ranks, a step which caused considerable fuss. Great things were predicted for the husky Californian, who had swept the U. S. and British amateur ranks clean for two years, and he

was expected to do well particularly because he was such a fine putter. There have been few better amateur putters at anytime but it didn't take Little long to discover the word "amateur" made a big difference, and that knocking the ball into the cup on a perfectly-tended surface was a far cry, not to say shout, from trying to guide it home through some of the rice fields the touring pros encounter. Little, in fact, suddenly discovered that his putting stroke was the one big flaw in his game. On the smooth greens of championship courses he could chop at his putts and cut them and they'd still roll through. "But on the bumpy greens we often run into," Lawson explains, "I'd start the ball

off with a bounce and it never did stop jumping." So Little, who had considered himself a graduate student in putting, had to go back to grade school. With "Professor" Byron Nelson, the PGA champion and Cam Puet, a California pro, as his tutors, he worked for a year and a half before he was satisfied. The results are right on the record books. Last year, of course, he won the national open at Cleveland; this winter he threw in a 62, equal to the PGA tournament record, in taking the Texas open, and he also has scored major victories in the Canadian and San Francisco match play opens. DECATUR, Ala.—The Cleveland Indians aren't taking any chances with their invaluable shortstop, Lou Bourdeau, still bothered by a lame ankle. He was given the day off yesterday at Valdosta, Ga., because Manager Roger Peckinpaugh didn't want him to play on the rough infield there. He will be used only sparingly until the Indians and their traveling companions, the New York Giants, play on better fields.

LOS ANGELES—Still boiling over about the Pittsburgh Pirates' losing streak, Manager Frankie Frisch has ordered his boys to be up at 8 a. m. daily and report at the park at 9:30 for workouts. Frisch was so peeved about Sunday's loss to the Chicago Cubs that he left the bench and went to right field, where he could say what he was thinking without being overheard.

HOLLYWOOD, Calif.—Manager Jimmy Dykes of the Chicago White Sox is trying to pry Benny McCoy from the Philadelphia Athletics. "The guy can hit," says Dykes, "and I'd like to have him. He can't play second base, as Connie Mack has found out, but he can play the outfield." The Sox need an outfielder badly because of the showings of Harry Rosen-thal and Mike Kreevich.

DECATUR, Ala.—In spite of a defeat yesterday, Ace Adams, 1940 Southern association strikeout king, looks as if he'll be a mainstay of the New York Giants' relief pitching corps this year. He had allowed only seven hits and one unearned run in nine innings before yesterday's appearance. The Cleveland Indians touched him for three hits in as many frames to score three times yesterday, but one run was due to a fielding error he made, and Ace marked up two strikeouts.

Middle West Leads Way in AAU Boxing
BOSTON, April 1 (AP)—Representing five states, mid-western battlers gained 29 of the 64 quarter final berths during the opening national AAU boxing matches last night at the Boston garden.

The east's survivors in a starting field that included 136 from 26 widely scattered states totaled 17 against 15 for the far west and three for the south. None of the 1940 champions returned, but the field included two of last year's runners up, Tommy Moyer, 135-pounder from Portland, Ore., and James Reddick, the St. Louis light heavyweight. Moyer earned his bracket, by outpointing Jerry Fleming, of Cleveland.

Clingman, Ernie Meet In Middle

Klamath rattle bugs will be swarming in droves, no doubt, tonight toward the armory and Promoter Mack Lillard's top flight, but scarcely top-drawer, feature bout between Dangerous Danny McShain, world's junior heavyweight champion of the Pacific coast, and Jesse James, and Pitiless Pete Belcastro, world's heavyweight champion of Weed (Calif.) and Mike Nazarian (Armenia).

They'll be going, also, to watch the semi-windup killer-diller which brings together Ernest Piluso, champion of Klamath Falls, and Otis Clingman, champion of Eugene.

In addition there will be an opening event matching Yukon Jake Jackson, the scourge of Skagway and champion of Chiloquin, and Walter (Gazun-thet) Achui, titleholder of all North Dayton, Ohio.

Natives from as far north as Fort Klamath and south to Tule-lake's new water system are expected to crush through the armory doors, for it will be the first showing locally of Dapper Daniel since his more than memorable defeat of Athens' own Jesse James here last fall. On that unhappy day handsome Jess broke the hearts of a half hundred Klamath secretaries by losing the coast junior heavyweight title of Oregon, Washington and California to the bruising Holly-wood man.

Dashing Dan, in meeting the Weed Roman, will face as tough an opponent as he will probably face all week. The balding veteran is fresh from triumphs over Klamath Mike Nazarian and Eugene Mike Mezarian, to name a few, and would like to upset the current holder of the coast belt that he once possessed.

Leading up to this all-out scrimmage is the Piluso-Clingman jam session which will probably give spectators more actual minutes of wrestling, as such, than both the opener and final combined. Elusive Ernie, as shifty as a good attorney and twice as smooth, is favored to plaster Clingman in what will be a battle of restaurants.

Achui and Jackson will raise the curtain at 8:30.

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Hostak and Brown Both Sure of Win

"Savage Slav," Southerner Talk "Knockout Blows" for Tonight's Bout in Seattle

SEATTLE, April 1 (AP) — A former champion and an uncrowned champion beater talked about "knockout blows" they planned to unfurl tonight as they awaited the weigh-in for their middleweight fight here.

The jaunty opponents are Al Hostak, Seattle's one-time "Savage Slav," who won and lost the National Boxing association middleweight title twice, and Ben Brown of Atlanta, Ga. Brown has a victory and a loss to his credit against Ken Overlin, the present California New York-recognized champion.

Brown is expected to have about a two pound weight edge over Hostak, who will be making his first home town appearance since his dismal display in losing the title to Tony Zale of Gary, Ind., here last summer. Brown weighed 165 yesterday to Hostak's 162 1/2, and each was expected to scale about two pounds less at the weighing in this afternoon.

The former champion ruled a favorite on the basis of his punching power, despite the Georgian's boast that "he've got enough stung in mah right to stop Hostak."

Scalzo Fights Draw in S. F. With Vern Bybee
