STOCK LEADERS POST GAINS AS MARKET RISES

NEW YORK, April 1 (AP)—Leading stocks were bid up in today's market without the benefit of much comforting news.

While a few specialties, notably Canadian mining issues, backed on one to four points, gains of minor amounts were the rule at the close.

Most steels, motors, rails, aircrafts and rubbers managed to display plus signs from the opening on, although some eventually backtracked. Transfers approximated 450,000 shares.

Word from Washington that Germany and Italy had "demanded" release of their seized ships and crews in American ports tended to accentuate apprehension in the financial sector that a break between this country and the axis might be imminent. On the other hand, war bulletins from Europe were more reassuring than otherwise.

Canadian stocks came to life on talk of the dominion government considering an exchange agreement which would give the northern currency parity with the dollar.

A pessimistic straw was seen in the sale of a stock exchange seat for \$22,000, off \$3000 from a previous transaction at a new low since 1898.

Favored most of the day were Canadian Pacific, Union Pacific, Hiram Walker, General Steel Castings preferred, American Car and Foundry common, Chicago Great Western preferred, U. S. Steel, Chrysler, American Can, Du Pont, U. S. Rubber, Cerro de Pasco, United Aircraft and American Telephone.

WHEAT NERVOUS IN DOUBTFUL MARKET

CHICAGO, April 1 (AP)—Wheat futures rose and fell nervously throughout the session today, largely reflecting the action of other commodities. Extreme losses amounted to about a cent a bushel, and despite fair rallying tendencies at times under the impetus of short covering, a sharp break near the close carried prices in most cases to the day's lowest levels. Corn also finished lower.

WOOL MARKET

BOSTON, April 1 (AP-USA) Trade was very spotty today in the Boston wool market. Fleeces and territory wools were mostly quiet. Early shorn 12 months Texas wools that had arrived in Boston were receiving a moderate demand at \$1.03-1.05, scoured basis. Asking prices on contracted 12-months Texas wools to be shorn later in the season ranged up to \$1.08-1.10, scoured basis. Combining South American wools of fine and half-blood grades were receiving a fair demand at steady prices.
