After the Surveys--?

WE NOTE with faint hope that the surveyors are busy again on South Sixth street.

Since state highway authorities two or three years ago made a serious, comprehensive statement recognizing South Sixth's traffic problem, surveying crews have appeared periodically in that territory, but unfortunately the construction crews have not followed.

So we enter another busy season with South Sixth street still functioning as one continuous intersection and the traffic badly bottle-necked at the viaduct.

South Sixth admittedly is one of the heaviest-traveled sections of state highway in Oregon. In fact, it has been described as the heaviest traffic carrier of any state highway section outside of city limits. We know for sure that it is a hazardous artery, where accidents are frequent and death has taken a most consistent toll in the last decade. In that decade, incidentally, virtually nothing has been done to improve the street or otherwise solve the problem, while the phenomenal development of the southeast suburban area has sent traffic volume sky-rocketing.

It is putting it mildly to say that the time is at hand for action that goes beyond the point of surveys.

A Successful Effort

THE Co-operative Concert association closed its season Tuesday evening after a presentation of high-calibre artists that should assure the association of ample membership for an outstanding season in 1941-42.

Last year, when the association boosted its membership fee, many of us had our doubts. But after a season featuring two such artists as Richard Crooks and Albert Spalding, it's hardly possible that anyone feels he didn't get his money's worth and is unwilling that the association should plan for the future on a similar basis.

The cooperative method of concert booking is singularly free from the headaches that come after so many of the locally-guaranteed presentations of noted artists. This year the membership was set at \$5, which seems like a lot of money. But it was worth it, and in these times there is hardly anyone who cannot, on the basis of planning ahead for a season of high-class entertainment, set aside that amount.

Those who have worked faithfully in this effort should be encouraged to continue. If they can maintain standards such as were established this year, everyone will be satisfied—except those who forget to acquire memberships when the books are open.

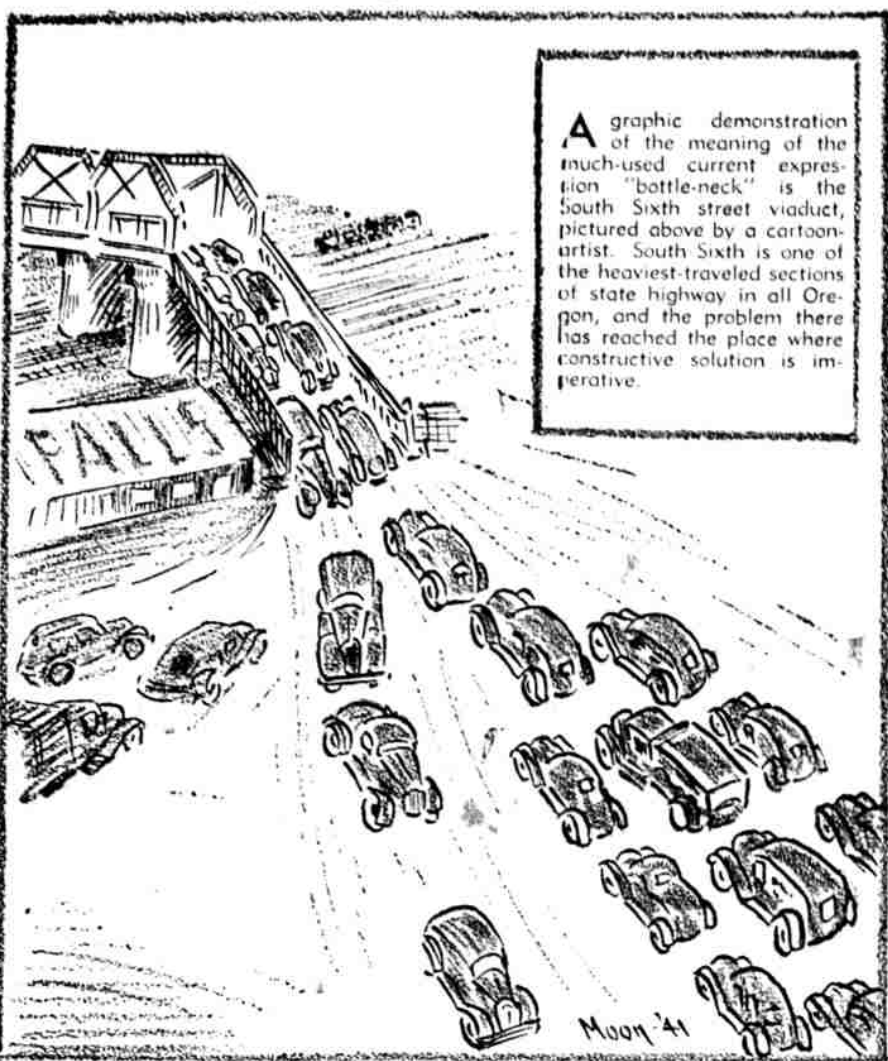

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, April 2—The British laid tricky bait to draw those trembling Italian men-of-war away from their home protection into the Ionian sea to meet their match. At least they did if you will believe some exceptionally lofty speculation here, and I do, considering the wartime ban which excludes direct naval information.

The story goes that the British Mediterranean naval forces grew tired of waiting for the Italians, and conceived an expansive scheme to make Mussolini believe their forces had been withdrawn. Faked British radio orders were issued in a code which was in the hands of the Italians withdrawing the bulk of the British Mediterranean fleet into the Atlantic to chase those two German cruisers which were supposed to be raiding shipment. Daylight movements in the same direction were attempted, to strengthen the hoax.

Believing the cat had gone, the mousey Italians flared forth to prey upon the British line of communications from Alexan-

dria to Crete. Their scouting air force is practically non-existent. Hence they could not discover their mistake until too late to escape.

It is improbable the Italians will let a gig go out from now on, even if the British announce they are withdrawing their entire Mediterranean fleet.

RELIEVES PRESSURE

Important point behind this crushing of Italian naval morale is that it relieves the British pressure on us for conveying in the north Atlantic. The British

should be able to withdraw substantial units of their force for Atlantic service. This most threatening prospect of our direct involvement in the fighting should, therefore, be eliminated for the present.

The U. S. navy itself (meaning FDR) may have had a hand in furthering this development. The navy has clamped down on all information about those two announced, and any subsequent units, sent for recreational purposes to the far eastern zones formerly patrolled by British ships. But these recreational

pursuits were sufficient to enable the British to withdraw all their first-line strength into the Mediterranean—and now into the Atlantic.

RED-HANDED

Treasury has been caught red-handed in the worst mistake in estimating revenues in its long partisan career of figuring.

Perhaps only congressmen will recall that they are now recalling it with self-satisfying laughter that the treasury claimed the milder excess profits tax law would yield only \$115,000,000. The treasury, of course, wanted another kind of tax, but congress insisted on its own, preferring to follow the estimates of its own experts that the yield would constitute more than twice treasury estimate.

Now the returns are in. Treasury places excess profits collections March 1-20 at \$82,000,000. If corporations paid one-fourth in the first installment, as is their custom, the annual yield would be \$320,000,000, nearly thrice the estimate. The treasury therefore was 300 per cent inaccurate.

Treasury estimates have been faced before with the suspicion that their pencils are guided by the kind of taxes they want to levy but not with quite as broad a smile.

AMUSING STORY

There is an amusing story around that Mr. Roosevelt sat looking at that para freighter tied up next to his yacht, Potomac, at Fort Everglades until he could stand it no longer, and ordered the long-calculated seizure of foreign ships. This explanation is not guaranteed, or substantiated. Yet its intimation that the action is not likely to be followed by serious further steps (such as turning the ships over to the British) seems verified by related facts.

The state department has contended sharply on the inside since such action was first contemplated months ago, that no valid legal excuse could be found to turn the ships over to Churchill. Mr. Hull's objection thwarted
