

Barlund May Join 'Bum-of-the-month'

Durable Finnish Heavyweight Qualifies if He Licks Billy Conn

CHICAGO, April 2 (AP)—Gunnar Barlund, durable Finnish heavyweight, will be eligible for membership in the "Bum-of-the-month" club if he can upset Pittsburgh Billy Conn Friday night in Chicago stadium.
Such a triumph would qualify him to follow Gus Dorazio, Abe Simon, Tony Musto, et al, to the Joe Louis chopping block.
The 195-pound Finn, an in-and-out for several years, is given almost no chance to get by the fancy-punching Conn despite a 15-pound weight advantage. The betting fraternity on Randolph street has set the miniature heavyweight up as a 6 to 1 choice over Barlund.

Uncle Sam Undermining Husky Team

SEATTLE, April 2 (AP)—Uncle Sam has fanned the flames of dissent in the University of Washington football prospects for 1941.

Coach Jimmy Phelan reported today, as he awaited the first spring turnout after postponement because of rain yesterday, that Quarterback Don Means would be lost to the army after the current school year.

Means has drawn consistent praise from Phelan through two seasons for his smart work as the Husky field general. His loss will remove much of the spark that remained from the Washington 1940 offensive.

Triple threat Halfback Dean McDowell and All-Star Ends Jay MacDowell and Bill Mark, plus Rudy Mucha, the great defensive center, were lost by graduation.

Of Means' loss, Phelan commented: "In a national emergency, football is of secondary importance. Means is one of the last men we can afford to lose, but that's all right with us."

Search Fails to Find Missing Boy

PORTLAND, April 2 (AP)—Exhaustive search in the Kenton area, including banks of Columbia slough, failed yesterday and last night to uncover any trace of five-year-old George Harvey.

A Doberman pinscher dog traced what appeared to be the child's path to the edge of the slough, but grappling hooks failed to recover the body. Hope grew that the lad, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Harvey, might have retraced his steps from the water's edge to safety and later became lost.

Boylen Charges Reconsidered

PORTLAND, April 2 (AP)—Reconsideration by the federal grand jury of the case of Tom Boylen Jr., Umatilla sheepman, was ordered here yesterday by Federal Judge Claude McCulloch.

The jury is in session at Pendleton. Boylen originally was indicted on a charge of selling mortgaged sheep, but Deputy U.S. District Attorney Mason Dillard told the court that additional evidence had been discovered.

NEW YORK, April 2 (AP)—It was an April Fool's joke on either (1) Manager Ray Carlen or (2) the boxing writers when Lou Nova, California heavyweight contender, revealed Tuesday that he still is imbued with the "Jack Dempsey complex."

Nova made this surprise revelation—that he still considers himself a slugged knockout artist—as he completed training for Friday night's 12-round brawl with Maxie Baer at the Garden.

He made it just after Carlen had spent nearly an hour assuring newspaper men "Nova will go out there this time and box with Baer. He won't try to slug with him. He'll out-smart Maxie in the early rounds, cut him to ribbons and then finish him."

Hence it was that the boxing Boswells were almost floored when the towny-haired ex-collegian spouted from his dressing room rubbing table, "I'll go out there in the first round and knock old man Baer stiff. I'll treat Baer to my new cosmic punch. I'll hit him like he was never hit before. I'll make it quick. I won't take 11 rounds to put him away—like I did last time we fought."

DIRECTOR TO VISIT MOOSE LODGE HERE

Arivistus was the name of one of Caesar's generals and also of the old white horse which, hitched to a two-wheel cart, N. R. Smith drove five miles daily when, as a youngster, he attended high school in Bloomington, Ind.

Smith is now regional director of the Loyal Order of Moose for the states of Oregon, Washing-

ton, Montana, Idaho, Territory of Alaska and the western provinces of Canada, with headquarters at Seattle, Wash. He will visit Klamath Falls lodge No. 1106, LOOM, April 4 and will help outline a program for the organization department of the local Moose lodge. Other important lodge affairs will be discussed.

A Hoosier by birth, Smith, formerly regional director for the Loyal Order of Moose in Iowa, North and South Dakota and Nebraska, first went to the famous country school at Clear Creek. Eventually he taught school himself in order to attend Indiana university at Bloomington, but before he could complete his course he had to quit because of ill health.

After a year of rest he went to work with a construction gang for a telephone company, and in twelve years worked up to a high position. Studying law in his spare time and becoming a member of the Indiana bar, he was advanced to head one of the five legal departments of the amalgamated telephone lines in the country, having charge of rights of way and franchises.

During the World War he was a field auditor, stationed at Fort Benjamin Harrison until the armistice.

Smith joined the Moose in St. Louis in 1925, and has done stewart work as organizer, mostly in Illinois and Iowa. He is one of the great platform orators of his day.

Mr. and Mrs. Smith have a daughter who is attending Washington university. St. Louis, Smith, remembering Arivistus, says that aside from his family his hobby is riding a fine horse amid mountain scenery.

On April 4, there will also be election of officers for the ensuing year. All loyal Moose are urged to attend this meeting.

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Transportation News

RAILROAD TAXES HELP EDUCATION

The fourth train left Klamath at 1:30 p. m.

In Redding — C. H. Reeves, general freight and passenger agent here, was in Redding Tuesday.

The importance of a railroad to the economic and cultural welfare of every community it serves should not be measured by transportation service alone, according to C. H. Reeves, district freight and passenger agent for the Southern Pacific company here.

Probably few persons are aware, he says, that the education of 1,300,000 children each year is made possible by the enormous taxes paid by the nation's railroads.

For example, of the taxes paid in Oregon last year by Southern Pacific and its wholly-owned subsidiaries, one of the state's largest taxpayers, over \$559,000 went directly to the support of schools. Based on figures furnished by the state department of education, this amount was sufficient to pay for the education of about 6200 elementary grade pupils or 5300 high school students, it was stated.

Trains Delayed At Chemult by Upset Boxcar

Southern Pacific trains, north and south bound, were delayed approximately two hours early Tuesday morning when an empty freight car hit a derail in the Chemult yards and overturned on the main line shortly after midnight.

The northbound passenger train No. 16, which left Klamath Falls at 9:45, was held up two hours and 33 minutes while the car was rolled off the track. Wreckers later were dispatched from here to clear the right-of-way. Southbound No. 23, due here at 2 a. m., was delayed nearly an hour.

According to the Southern Pacific, the empty car got away from a string while being switched and hit the derail. No one was injured.

Four Troop Trains Pass Here Tuesday

Four Southern Pacific troop transport trains Tuesday passed through Klamath Falls at noon en route from California to camp in Washington, presumably Fort Lewis.

Approximately 1800 men rode the four sections, the first of which arrived about 11 a. m.

Bowron Elected Into Runoff Election as Los Angeles Mayor

LOS ANGELES, April 2 (AP) Mayor Fletcher Bowron, elected on a reform-liberal program 17 months ago, and Councilman Stephen W. Cunningham are Los Angeles' nominees for mayor.

Bowron polled nearly a majority in yesterday's primary but seven rivals totaled just enough to force him into a runoff May 8.

Congressman Charles Kramer, an avowed candidate of the American Federation of Labor, was a poor third.

Bowron, former newspaperman, lawyer and superior court judge, led a successful recall attack on Mayor Frank L. Shaw in 1939. His administration conducted campaigns against gambling and other vices.

Cunningham had the support of many business and civic leaders who asserted that Bowron's administration was not business-like.

Portland Crime Laboratory Works On Skeleton Case

PORTLAND, Ore., April 2 (AP) Dr. Joseph Beaman of the state crime laboratory said yesterday that more research—possibly a check on teeth filling—would be necessary to determine the sex of a skeleton found on the Fort Lewis Military reservation last week.

He said the skeleton was that of a person more than 25 years of age, five feet, seven inches in height and probably of slender build. The person had been dead at least two years, he added.

PORTLAND, April 2 (AP)—The Oregon Future Farmers of America oratorical contest was captured yesterday by Edwin Heinoren, 17, Amity, who asserted that milk consumption could be doubled. He advocated nationwide advertising of dairy products.
