

Flower Show Date Set by Chairman

Many New Classifications Included in 1941 Schedule as Exhibit Plans Completed

A number of new classifications will be included in the annual spring flower show sponsored by the Klamath Falls Woman's Library club, according to Mrs. Ernest D. Lamb, chairman, who has announced Saturday afternoon and evening, May the seventeenth, in the Fremont school auditorium, as the time and place of this year's exhibit.

The show is planned a week later than previously announced and blossoms are expected to be at their best at that time. Available and at the height of perfection during that week, should be tulips, irises, pansies, violas, columbine and a few of the early roses. Any other flowers that might be available will be displayed and classes arranged if a sufficient number entered. It is hoped that there will be a great many more named varieties this year, although there will be classes for both named and unnamed. Mrs. Lamb stated.

New divisions will include Victorian arrangements which should be particularly delightful with lilies, tulips and irises in the garden; a child's breakfast tray which will open a new field for those who have prepared many an invalid tray for the young men and women of the house, arrangements in Chinese pillow vases, arrangements in terrariums, and closed containers including bubble bowls and under water bouquets. There will also be a division with luncheon tables as one classification.

The schedule is now being completed and will be distributed as soon as possible.
