Mattress Job Speeded at Bonanza, Langell Valley

LANGELL VALLEY — Mattress making for Langell valley and Bonanza is in full swing at the community hall under the supervision of Mrs. Charles Revell, Mrs. Laurence Campbell, Mrs. Homer Roberts and Mrs. Lyman Fitzhugh. The names are taken alphabetically and eight or nine mattresses have been finished and taken home. The project opened on Tuesday. Making one of the mattresses is a big job and is said to put all the muscles to work pounding and beating the cotton.

Each bat is made of three pounds of cotton which is put into a measured space and pinned into muslin and beaten with yardsticks for five minutes, then turned over and

beaten five more minutes. Then three of the three-pound cotton bats are put into the stitched tick, which is heavy blue and white ticking; then the ticking is put together with safety pins and beat with broom handles for 15 minutes more, after which three more three-pound bats are put in and the process repeated until 16 bats have been placed in the ticking. It is then well sewed and one more hour of beating finishes the mattress.

The finished product is valued at \$39.50 and is supposed to last for many years with occasional sunnings and beatings.

So far 110 mattresses are ordered for Langell valley.

truth in it. The story is designed deliberately to mislead.

American newspapers, thank goodness, are designed to inform. True, an imaginative reporter may describe a tenement-doorstep romance as a beautiful and touching scene. He may describe a corner brawl as a threatened riot. But you can bet your last dollar that there was a love scene and that there was a brawl.

The reason is simple. There is no force to make American newspapers describe something which doesn't happen. There is a great force which makes them report what does happen. It is the force of a free public opinion, which in America has the power of life and death over a newspaper.
