

TRAILER SPACE LACKING HERE, COUNCIL TOLD

Klamath Falls was accused of a deplorable lack of trailer parking facilities by Don Statham, a telephone company employee, at Monday night's council meeting, and Statham himself was subsequently taken severely to task by Councilman Bussman for advising his friends to stay away from this city.

Statham, who was notified his trailer house out of the city after he had lived in it for some time in the yard of a friend, asserted the trailer parking situation here is the "worst on the coast." He said he wanted to live in "decent surroundings and not in 'grapes of wrath' areas near-by."

The complainant said he had told his trailer-using friends to stay away from Klamath Falls because of the trailer-parking situation here.

That aroused Councilman Bussman. "Did you say you're telling your acquaintances up and down the coast to stay away from Klamath Falls?" demanded Bussman. Getting an affirmative answer, he vigorously criticized Statham for this attitude, pointing out that Statham had received his living in this community for 17 months and admittedly sought to prevent tourists and others from going through here.

Building Inspector Harold Franey said he had served Statham with an abatement notice in accordance with city ordinance which requires that a trailer house, if lived in within the city, must be connected with a sewer. He added that Statham has an excellent trailer house and the violation of the ordinance was strictly technical.

Mayor John Houston said that the matter of a lack of trailer facilities here was chiefly a question of business opportunity for some one, and suggested it be referred to the chamber of commerce.

Councilman Bussman reported to the council he had received complaints from people living on South Riverside concerning muskrats running at large in that district.

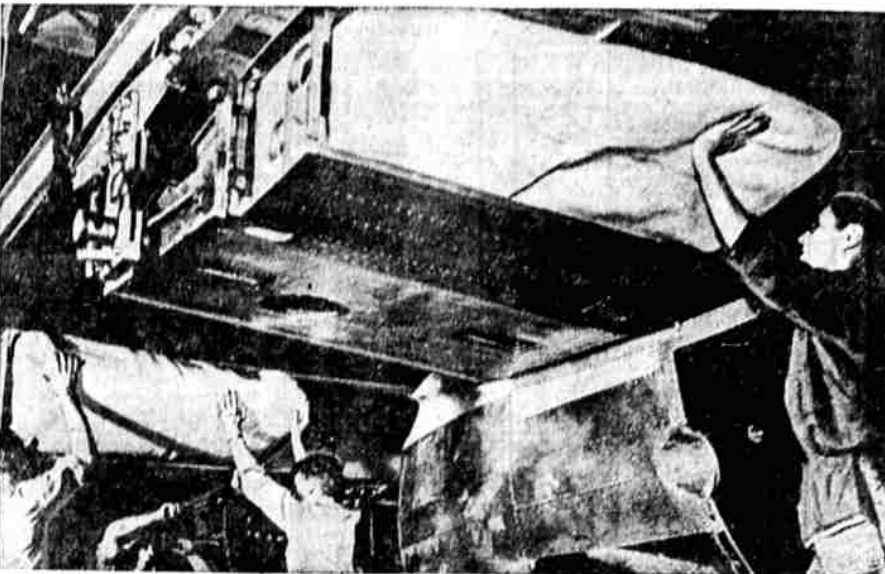
Sanitary Inspector Harold Franey said that until it was shown the muskrats created an unsanitary condition, it would be difficult to apply any existing city regulations against them. It was stated that Oscar Peyton has leased land from a railroad company near South Riverside for the purpose of taking muskrats from it, and that rats had actually been planted there.

Mayor Houston suggested that complaining residents of the district prepare a petition if the council is to consider the matter further.

A proposal by Councilman Bussman that fees be charged for loading zones along the curbs in the business district was deferred for 30 days for further consideration.

police judge solely responsible for disposition of traffic cases, and to relieve the police chief of the constant embarrassment of pleas for excusing offending motorists.

Judge Leigh Ackerman said that bench warrants for persons who ignore traffic tickets will be forthcoming shortly.

Chief Frank Hamm objected to increasing the number of pawnbrokers in the city, when asked for comment on the matter by Mayor Houston. The council deferred to the chief's opinion.

The council instructed the police judge to notify Turner Chevrolet company and Safeway stores that because of the store construction at Twelfth street and Klamath avenue, an alley there must be cleared of all obstructions.

nut cups, grade 1, Miss Cooke, teacher. The 140 nut cups will be used in Veterans' and children's hospitals, including Doernbecher hospital, Portland.

The menu covers made by Mills school group were sent to the Children's Farm home at Corvallis and to the Shrine hospital, Portland.
