TAXICABS INSTALL UNIFORM CHARGES

Effective at 6 p. m. Friday, all taxicabs in Klamath Falls will go on a new uniform rate, it was announced Thursday by the operators.

The rate will be 35 cents for the first 5/6 of a mile, and 5 cents for every 1/6 of a mile thereafter.

This rate is established on meters, which have now been installed on all cabs operating in the city.

Cab operators said the rates are highly favorable to the public in comparison with those effective in other cities.

The recent flat rate of 25 cents was effective while meters were being installed.
