A second BEF communique said that German forces had reached Yanitzia and Bitolj while "In southern Yugoslavia resistance to the German advance is stiffening." Yanitzia is about 35 miles northwest of Salonika.

A British royal air force communique said that British bombers and fighters yesterday attacked "an enemy motor transport column" near Bitolj, which is in southwestern Yugoslavia about seven miles above the Greek frontier, while "fighters machine-gunned trucks and troops on Bitolj airdrome, causing many casualties."

"Armored columns on the road between Philorina and Prilep were bombed successfully from a low altitude," the announcement added.

Philorina, in Greece, is less than 20 miles south of Bitolj while Prilep is about 25 miles northwest of Bitolj.

ATHENS, Friday, April 11 (UP)—Greek soldiers engulfed by the German blitzkrieg are waging a fierce death struggle deep in eastern Macedonia where 1,000,000 Greeks, mostly civilians, have been trapped by the Nazi drive down to the Aegean at Salonika which cut Greece apart, it was stated early today.

Several Greek forts and other centers of resistance, including the town of Kavalla, 80 miles east of Salonika on the coast, were said to be holding out valiantly.

While scattered Greek forces fought a battering ram of German tanks north and east of Salonika, the main Greek army and British "Tommy's" spread along a curving new defense line west of the Vardar for a head-on clash with the German blitzkrieg.

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which American vessels could not transit.

This strip constituted a stopper, he said, which now has been removed, so that in effect, the sea and gulf have been opened to American commerce like any other non-combat zone.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., April 11 (AP)—One person was killed and at least 14 injured today when an explosion ripped the roof off the Woodward Iron company's merchant iron plant and forced closing of the company.

Three of the injured were in a critical condition. The blast was heard for 10 miles and brought thousands of curious who hampered rescue work around the shattered boiler building.

Furnaces Stopped H. A. Berg, president of the Woodward company which is filling heavy defense orders, said all three of his blast furnaces were taken out of production by the explosion. He said one would resume "within 48 hours, another some time next week and the third at some later date."

The explosion was described by J. B. Price, engaged in repair work nearby as a "huge ball of fire which covered the whole place."

"I was working on a large scaffolding," he said. "I saw steel beams and brick flying through the air and a steel girder just missed my head."

Berg said preliminary investigation indicated the mixture of air and steam from the blowing engine room exploded in the cold blast main, went into the blowing machine and wrecked it.

ing two days" when 22 German aircraft were destroyed with the loss of one British Hurricane.

"On the first day of intensive aerial activity, 20 German dive-bombers and their escorts, Messerschmitt 110's, were routed by Hurricanes, and five Junkers and three Messerschmitts were destroyed," the RAF said.

Bombers Shot Down The following day was "even more disastrous," for the Germans, it added. Fourteen German dive-bombers "which ventured out unescorted" were shot down by British fighters. Six Heinkels and two other aircraft were reported destroyed in a ground strafing expedition at Derna.

One Australian fighter squadron alone shot down 18 Nazi planes in two days with two losses of its own, the British said.

Riddle ran from the conference scene unharmed. The conference had been arranged in an effort to settle the difficulty with the Modoc Indians without further bloodshed. At the time, the Modoc band, which refused to stay on the Klamath reservation, were in their Lava Beds fortress, now one of the interesting historical spots of this region. Major fighting of the war had not started when General Canby made his effort to settle the trouble with the conference that ended in the massacre.

Later, Jack, Bogus Charley, John Schonchin and Black Jim, who participated in the massacre, were hanged at Fort Klamath. Others were sentenced to life imprisonment.

The Canby cross has been on the site of the massacre since 1892, being made by Rancher John Fairchild's carpenter at the instigation of Lieut. John S. Parke of the U. S. army. In 1926, patriotic societies of California erected a marker at the spot.
