

NAVY SEEKING 1100 MEDICAL RESERVE MEN

The navy department has announced an immediate enlistment call for 1100 hospital corps reserves, from among the nation's medical technicians, pharmacists, male nurses, orderlies and experienced first-aid workers, to provide additional personnel for the expanding naval service.

To facilitate enrollment in the group, designated as class V-6, applicants between the ages of 17 and 50 will be accepted at all recruiting stations and sub-stations throughout the country, according to Commander F. K. O'Brien, navy recruiting bureau officer in charge. These stations total 319 and are centrally located in all population areas.

The new personnel, Commander O'Brien said, will be given ratings in the naval reserve consistent with their training and their standing in civilian life. A special effort will be made to enroll men in the higher ratings.

Applicants will be required to demonstrate their professional qualifications for enlistment by passing such examinations as may be required by the medical officer at a main navy recruiting station.

Income Tax Running Far Ahead of Last Year's Figures

SALEM, April 11 (P)—Personal and corporation income tax returns filed before April 5 totaled \$6,483,687, compared with \$4,860,693 during the similar period of last year, the state tax commission said today.

Collections to that date totaled about \$4,500,000, the remainder to be paid before October 1, when second half payments are due.

Total collections for the year will amount to a record high of more than \$7,000,000, compared with the previous record of \$6,021,000 last year.

"Since there was no change in filing requirements or rates for the state taxes, the increases are attributable principally to improved economic conditions," the commission said.

Hitch-Hiker Takes Ride in Wrong Car

SALEM, April 11 (P)—Two men and a woman were held in the Marion county jail Thursday on burglary charges, but one of the men still would be free if he had been a little more particular about his hitchhiking.

Deputy Sheriff L. L. Pittenger said the trio was charged with burglarizing the confectionery store of Robert Blanchette in St. Paul early today.

He said that Dan William Butler and Helen Maeden were caught by Ben Goedel, who lives next door to the store. Goedel, armed with a shotgun, held the pair until officers arrived.

Pittenger said that Eddie Smith, an ex-convict, made his escape, but was identified as one of the trio.

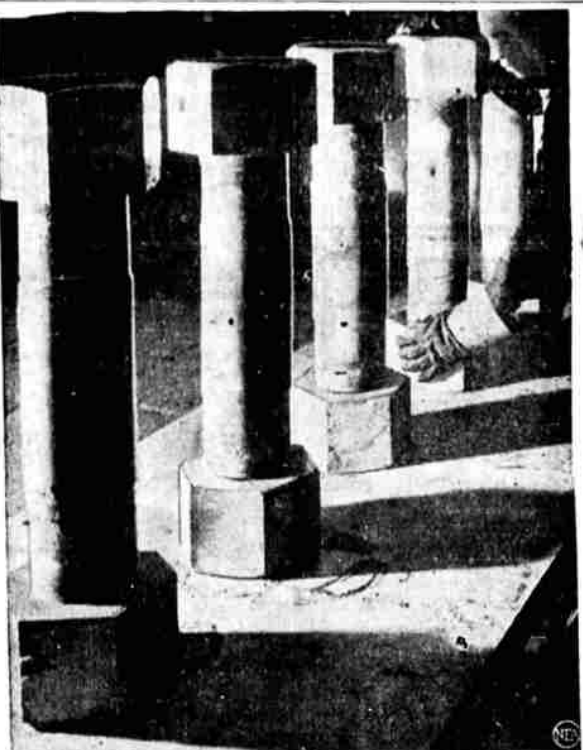

Slight Drop Seen In Pine Orders

PORTLAND, Ore., April 11 (P)—Orders for Idaho white, ponderosa, sugar and associated species of pine reached 82,357,000 board feet for the week ending April 5, the Western Pine association said today. This was a slight drop from the 87,146,000 of the previous week.

Shipments aggregated 78,511,000 board feet compared with 78,196,000 board feet the previous week. Production figures were 67,270,000 compared with 68,306,000.

INDIAN HELD IN NEVADA SLAYING

RENO, Nev., April 11 (P)—Molino Ochlo, 29, an Indian, was held in the county jail today and Sheriff Ray Root said the man had signed a confession that he shot and killed Manuel Rojas, 35, formerly of Fort Bidwell.

Rojas's body, with a bullet through the head, was found yesterday near Gerlach. Root said the shooting followed a drinking party.

The officer announced that a formal charge would be filed against Ochlo, probably tomorrow.

Moscow Paper Lauds Pact With Belgrade As Peace Support

MOSCOW, April 11 (AP)—Red Star, organ of the red army, said today the soviet Russian-Yugoslav friendship pact signed just before the outbreak of the Balkan conflict is "all the more valuable under the new conditions because the soviet union always fulfills its international pledges."

The paper said the pact gave "new proof to the attractive force of the principles of the peaceful policy of the soviet union."

"It also reflected further the strengthening position and international role of the USSR and increases its influence on the development of international relations," the army organ added.

Red Star concluded: "At the most critical moment in the development of events in the Balkans the soviet-Yugoslav agreement demonstrated the peaceful intentions of the new government of Yugoslavia. Foreign political aims toward Yugoslavia aroused the full sympathy of the government of the soviet union, which is carrying on an active and continuous struggle for peace."

The paper reported that the soviet had watched closely the efforts of the Yugoslav government, "based on the sympathy of a majority of the people," to keep the peace and their independence.

In a separate article reviewing the development of mechanical warfare, the paper said the "military successes of Germany are not due to new arms but the use of the decisive force of the mechanized army."

Red Fleet, the navy newspaper, said the spread of the war in the Balkans meant "a new front for Germany on the European continent."

"The attraction of large forces on the southeastern front may change the position on other fronts of the Anglo-German war," the paper said, adding that the action in the Balkans necessarily drew German planes and troops away from England.

"Serious danger to Italy" also was seen from the fact that the British now have airports closer to Italian industrial centers.

Curtiss Firms Draw Law Suit From Russians

NEW YORK, April 11 (P)—The United States, as assignee of the government of Russia, filed suit for \$1,330,545.14 in federal district court late Wednesday against Curtiss Aeroplane and Motor Company, Inc., and Curtiss-Wright corporation.

The amount was alleged to be due for failure of the defendant to perform satisfactorily seven contracts with the Imperial Russian government between September 25, 1914 and March 18, 1915.
