

ANDERSON GOES ON TRIAL HERE EARLY MONDAY

Names of 12 additional veniremen were drawn Saturday in preparation for the opening Monday of the trial of James Quentin Anderson, young part Indian charged with first degree murder in the death of Jerry Zulkoski on January 23.

It is expected most or all of Monday will be required to obtain a jury in the case, second murder trial here since Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg assumed office.

The new veniremen are Fred C. Bamber, Will Humphrey, Huntington Taylor, J. W. Dolan, Frank L. Uhrine, Robert Odell, Ralph Hill and Roland K. King, all of Klamath Falls; Charles Hodges, Merrill; James Newman, Olene; Ralph Puckett, Keno; Stewart Nicholson, Fort Klamath.

Dayton E. Van Vactor will act as special deputy district attorney in charge of the prosecution of Anderson. The young defendant will be represented by J. C. O'Neill and E. E. Driscoll.

Zulkoski's body was found beside the Lakeview highway near Olene on the morning of January 23. Later, Sheriff Lloyd Low arrested young Anderson at the home of his father, O. T. (Buck) Anderson, near Beatty.

Zulkoski was a white man who had been employed at the Anderson place. His recent permanent home was in Ord, Nebr.

It is anticipated that self-defense will be featured in the effort of counsel to prevent conviction of young Anderson, who has assertedly admitted he was with Zulkoski in a truck at the time the former Nebraskan was shot.

act limiting the right of the federal courts to issue injunctions in labor disputes, said in an open letter to his constituents that some local unions had resorted to "intimidation" in getting fees out of job applicants.

General Motors Vote — Settlement of the Ford strike — the great plant was expected to open again Monday — was described by Gov. Murry D. Van Wagner of Michigan as "an historic step in establishing industrial peace in our country."

About 200,000 workers in the Ford and allied plants have been idle for 11 days and work on \$155,000,000 in defense contracts has been bogged down.

While peace was in sight for Ford, the United Automobile Workers International union asked locals for authority to take a strike vote of 175,000 members in 78 General Motors plants. The union was reported demanding higher wages.

Coal Dispute — The bituminous coal fields remained unmanned as southern operators quit the eight-state Appalachian conference in a dispute over terms of a new contract which would cover 325,000 workers seeking wage increases.

Non-delivery of soft coal pinched the operation of steel furnaces as the CIO's steel workers organizing committee sought wage increases for about 100,000 workers in Bethlehem plants. The union wants a minimum 10-cent hourly increase.

Sidney Hillman said in Washington that settlement of the Ford dispute left fewer than 7000 defense workers on strike. The associate director of the office of production management did not include the soft coal stoppage.

ITALIANS JOIN WITH GERMANS NEAR ALBANIA

Deutschland hymn and the "England song" this morning. German and Italian troops, after joining their lines also in northwestern Yugoslavia, have started mopping up the Ljubljana basin, it was said.

In the southeast, the German air force was said to have been "especially successful" yesterday. Ten grounded Yugoslav planes were reported destroyed in raids on airports in northern Bosnia and in the Danube-Sava region.

BUDAPEST, April 12 (AP) — The Hungarian general staff announced at noon today that its troops had broken through the fortified Yugoslav line in the triangle between the Danube and Tisa rivers in northern Yugoslavia.

The announcement said further that Yugoslav fortifications between the Danube and Drava rivers was pierced yesterday and that the march south is continuing.

The confluence of the Danube and Tisa is about 60 miles below the Hungarian-Yugoslav border and 25 miles north of Belgrade.

RAVER PREDICTS POWER SELL-OUT

cal interest and it will be necessary for a public agency to arrange for power purchase and distribution.

Asked specifically about the sale of power to a public utilities district if one should be set up here, he said "we will sell to such a district if we can take over the plants and transmission lines of the California Oregon Power company."

Dr. Raver pointed out that there is a limit to the distance power can be transmitted over high voltage lines, and that in an integrated system it is possible that the power will come from any of several different sources. He indicated that in case of a public power setup here, power would probably come from other source than Bonneville dam itself.

Dr. Raver spoke at Klamath union high school auditorium at a meeting arranged by the Klamath county Bonneville power committee. Ned Smith of the committee introduced the Bonneville administrator to the audience, following the showing of the motion picture, Hydro.

Great By-Product
Dr. Raver said that power was only one aspect of the development of the Columbia river. Other features, such as transportation, irrigation and flood control, he said, fell definitely in the realm of necessary government development, and power is a great by-product of these other uses.

Outlining the Bonneville program, he said first that it is a public power program. He said he is directed by congress to build transmission lines and prevent a private monopolization of the power supply.

Secondly, he stated, it is a regional program, with a grid system of high voltage lines encompassing a region. Bonneville and Grand Coulee, he said, are doubling the power capacity of this region.

In rates, he said, the averaging principle is adopted, with a "postage stamp" rate of \$17.50 a kilowatt year available to all communities on the grid system, regardless of distance from Bonneville.

"Colonial Empire"
The speaker described the northwest as a "colonial empire" which ships its raw materials east and buys back the manufactured product, paying freight both ways. Some great development was needed to break the effect of this vicious circle, he stated, and "we've done it with Columbia river power."

Industries, he said, are coming to the west because of this development. Cheap power, he said, is the key to industrial development, and in the northwest

particular attention is directed to electro-chemistry and electro-metallurgy in the industrial picture. Light metals such as aluminum and magnesium are to be manufactured in this area in increasing quantities, and Dr. Raver said that despite their importance in national defense, he believes the market for them will continue strong after that phase has passed.

He said the government put the Reynolds Metal company, now locating at Longview, into business because competition is desirable in northwest industry. The Aluminum Company of America is already operating on the Columbia river.

Aids Free Enterprise
Finally, the speaker said, "it's your program" and the administration is required to give preference to cooperatives and public agencies.

"It's the greatest thing the chambers of commerce have had come to their door," said Dr. Raver. "There is no trouble selling the idea to business men when they understand it, for it is undergirding the system of free enterprise and initiative, and making more profits for business men."

He said in the question period that Bonneville standard re-sale rates include taxes for municipalities, and that taxes are figured in these rates the same as in private power company rates. He asserted also in answer to a question that revenue bonds are not general obligations and that bonds based on revenues from power districts are winning prestige in the investment world.

Yugoslav towns of Veles and Prilep and the village of Kiklis, in northern Greece.

Despite bad weather, the RAF airmen made repeated low-level attacks on the Germans Thursday and yesterday between Bitolj and Prilep, the communiqué said, resulting in the destruction of seven tanks and a number of lorries set afire.

Germans advancing in darkness towards Kiklis and in the Galikos area were both bombed and machine-gunned and were thrown into "great confusion," it added. At Polykastro an important road bridge was reported blown up.

Two RAF planes were said to have been lost.

Delayed reports from the front said advance units of the German army had encountered British patrols between Glanitsa, (Yanitsa) — 48 miles north of Mount Olympus, eastern anchor of the defense line — and the Aegean coast, in the first contact between the reichswehr and the British expeditionary force in Greece.

BRISTOL GETS BIG FIRE RAID

LONDON, Saturday, April 12 (UP) — German bombers, sweeping in waves across the west country at three-minute intervals, subjected the Bristol region to a heavy fire raid early today in the light of a full moon.

Trading blow for blow with the British aerial offensive which rained heavy armor-piercing bombs on the German sea raiders Scharnhorst and Gneisenau at Brest Thursday night, the Luftwaffe concentrated its attack on vital shipping centers where Britain's sea lanes from America converge.

The raiders dumped thousands of fire bombs, among them hundreds of "bread baskets" which disintegrated in the air.

The attack began about midnight after large numbers of invaders had been detected roaring inland over the southeast and southwest coasts.

Casualties appeared light considering the intensity of the attack, in part at least because the proportion of high explosives dropped was unusually small.

A branch library and cinema were damaged badly in one town, and a well-known girls' school was destroyed. Industrial premises took a pounding in another town.

An anti-aircraft barrage said to be the heaviest ever heard in the frequently bombed region was turned loose against the raiders, but a number of them penetrated the fire.
