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Weekend Roundup

IN a world shocked by hatreds and mass bloodshed, the faithful will pause on Sunday, Easter day, with the thought that if the words of the Man of Peace had been heeded, "this all would not have been."

The beautiful story of Easter, the story of Christ triumphant, carries hope for the distressed and troubled in this historic year of 1941. It will be re-told in song and pageant and sermon in thousands of churches over America, and in our own Midland Empire churches, the preparations have been in keeping with the great significance of the day.

Those who go to church on Easter will profit by it.

St. Matthew's story of the first Easter runs like this: "In the end of the sabbath, as it began to dawn toward the first day of the week, came Mary Magdalene, and the other Mary to see the sepulchre."

"And behold, there was a great earthquake: for the angel of the Lord descended from heaven and came and rolled back the stone from the door and sat upon it."

"His countenance was like lightning, and raiment white as snow. And for fear of him the keepers did shake, and became as dead men. And the angel answered, fear not ye: for I know that ye seek Jesus, which was crucified. 'He is not here: for he is risen, as he said...'

Read it again, before turning to the depressing news of the day.

Information from the Balkans as this is written continues on a disturbing key. The German advance has moved with new success, and axis and British troops are reportedly engaged in a huge struggle in the Phlorina area of Greece. Yugoslav resistance appears to be rapidly collapsing. There is nothing in the situation, insofar as it has been told in the news, that is encouraging to those in sympathy with the allies.

Meanwhile, along the same line, runs a story that the British have lost much that they gained in their recent brilliant African campaign against the Italians. It is possible a major battle is in the making there, also.

None of it makes pleasant reading.

The Russian mystery thickens, if that is possible. Yugoslavia's premier was reported on a mission of some kind to Moscow. Moscow's military organ, the Red Star, recently made some favorable comment on Yugoslavia's courage, and it is remembered that Russia and Yugoslavia signed a non-aggression pact just before the recent hostilities broke out.

But let's remain skeptical about any possibility of Russian help for Yugoslavia. The Russian Bear hasn't shown any disposition yet to bestir himself by anyone being over-run by the German machine. And the time to help Yugoslavia already is slipping speedily into the past. —M.E.

WHITE MAN HELD IN SHOOTING CASE

Reservation Indian officers have arrested John Charles Rhoads, white, as the man who sold liquor to Indians in the party that preceded the shooting of Melvin Barkley, 20-year-old Indian.

Rhoads waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to a federal grand jury late yesterday by U. S. Commissioner Bert C. Thomas.

Indian Officer John Arkell who arrested Rhoads, said the white man was at the Wednesday night party at the Orpha Schen-

chin house but left shortly before trouble developed culminating in the shooting of Barkley. The officer said he had been told that trouble started when Orpha Schenchin was tripped as she walked by Barkley. Barkley later was shot outside the house. Arkell arrested Guy Schenchin, her father, and charged him with the shooting. Barkley is in a serious condition at Agency hospital.

London Hits Axis-Helping News in U. S.

LONDON, April 12 (UP)—The British government was reported today to have protested informally to the United States against dissemination by American newspapers and radio of military information helpful to the axis.

A more rigorous voluntary self-censorship must be imposed in the United States, it was felt, to stop leakages of information on which secrecy is considered essential to Britain's war effort.

The final decision as to whether voluntary restraint will suffice or some kind of government censorship ultimately will be necessary must rest with the United States, it was stressed. There was a general feeling that censorship by law is unlikely as long as the United States remains a non-belligerent.

Publication of stories and pictures in American newspapers about the arrival of a British battleship in the United States drew bitter condemnation in authoritative circles.

Man Catches Shark; Shark Catches Man

BERKELEY, Calif., April 12 (UP)—For a time Friday Capt. Osman Freeman, 66, U. S. army, retired, wasn't sure whether he had caught a shark or a shark had caught him.

He landed the four-foot shark, but his catch retaliated by clamping onto Freeman's hand.

Traffic Signal Bids for Klamath To Open May 8

Balkan Fifth Column Paved Way, Report

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Calif., April 12 (UP)—The German army's sweep through Yugoslavia climaxed years of Nazi fifth column activity in the Balkans, Otto von Hapsburg, pretender to the now non-existent throne of Austria-Hungary, said yesterday.

He said the Germans foresaw a possible Balkan thrust as early as 1928 and have had a fifth column working there for "several years."

"It was only through fifth column activities the Germans were able to make such rapid progress in Yugoslavia," he said. "Though their arms are inferior, the Yugoslavs are very good soldiers."

He said there was no valid evidence of a break between Russia and Germany. "The communists are still cooperating closely with the Nazis," he said.

Hapsburg arrived in the United States recently from Bordeaux, France. He was met here by Ralph Lutz, head of the Herbert Hoover war library, and Edgar Eugene Robinson, acting president of Stanford in the absence of President Ray Lyman Wilbur.

Hapsburg charged the Count Paul Teleki, premier of Hungary, was "slain by Nazis" and did not commit suicide as was announced officially. "Teleki was a healthy, active, Christian man. He never would have committed suicide."

The French Ninth army was to defend the Meuse, but its orders required five days to get the army up to the defense line. Consequently the Germans were on the east bank before the French had manned the west bank.

The French did not sell out. The bridges were blown up, but with the west bank only defended in spots, the Germans forded in rubber boats and set up pontoon bridges. They were able to take some of the French defensive positions from the rear.

To colossalize this otherwise stupendous French inefficiency, the tanks of the Ninth army finally arrived somewhat off the scene of battle on the fifth day (they had been misdirected). Thereupon they promptly ran out of gas. The tanks were abandoned and seized by the Germans without a shot.

Only a few French aircraft appeared in this "impregnable" zone. German dive bombers appeared on the second day, but there was really not much fighting to be done. The main French forces were off to the north where they expected the main blow. The Germans did not even have time to bring up their own artillery. Their success was far greater than their most optimistic calculations. After the breakthrough, all was lost for the British and French.

NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

WASHINGTON, April 12—The Germans ruined the Yugoslav army upon precisely the same trick which fooled the French. The very same Nazi army crowd which knifed through Sedan and severed the French armies, handled the job. The mechanized units which pushed through the impregnable passes on the Bulgarian border were directly under General Von Kleist who staged the surprise of the French Ardennes with approximately the same units.

They got through the impassable passes simply by forcing the most impassable first. Here was a defile so narrow tanks could not pass. Appreciating this, the Yugoslavs left it protected by a very small force. The Nazis conquered the isolated spot easily and slipped through motorcycle units in single file.

On the other side of the mountains these joined with parachute troops to take the strongly defended neighboring passes from their undefended rear. Within 24 hours the larger passes had thus been opened up and the tanks were streaming down across the sparsely manned southern half of the country. All this while the bulk of the Yugoslav army was in the north carrying out a carefully prepared defense plan founded on suppositions exactly the reverse of what the Germans did.

The Yugoslavs figured their unfortified border with Rumania would naturally be attacked first. It was their obvious weakness. They planned to give way slowly and fall back upon their strong defense line in the mountains to the southwest. But by the time they were ready for this the mechanized Nazi scissoring had already cut their southern communications and rail lines. They were doomed.

STUPIDITY BLAMED

As the detailed stories of these German successes come out, months after the event, it becomes clear that the mechanized German monsters that are supposed to hammer down their adversaries with brute force, are far from supernatural. The Nazis have used their wits more than their fists. The only thing unconquerable about them has been the stupidity of their opponents.

SEDAN EXPLAINED

Now comes the first authentic details of what happened at Sedan in a study by Capt. Paul Thompson, U.S.A. (April "Infantry Journal," circulated in the military trade). He looked into German, French and Swiss accounts and found no evidence of French treason or irresistible German power but an amazing amount of French misadventure.

Like the Yugoslavs with their passes, the French thought that the Ardennes hilly forest terrain offered insurmountable obstacles for mechanized units. They only had their horse cavalry on the job to defend it back to the line of the Meuse river. The Germans slaughtered the horse units in small combats near the Luxembourg border and arrived, otherwise unopposed, at the Meuse river three days after the invasion started.

over the ground in detail. The Germans knew what spots were defended and how strongly. They shrewdly spied out the soft spot and contrived mechanical means to use it.

What authorities here now would like to know is whether Britain has overlooked anything.

Danish Minister Told To Protest Ship Sale, Claim

ZURICH, Saturday, April 12 (UP)—The German radio said at midnight the Danish government had instructed its minister in Washington to protest in advance any United States action to purchase or charter Danish ships now in protective custody in American harbors.

The Danish government also stated, the radio reported, that it had no knowledge of any agreement for the United States to occupy Greenland and construct air bases there.

"According to reports from New York an agreement was reached between the American government and the Danish minister in Washington for erection of American air bases in Greenland," the radio said.

"The Danish foreign office states, however, that it has absolutely no information regarding such an agreement."
