Outstanding Northwest Players To Appear Here In Bundles for Britain Benefit at Reames

Of interest to golf fans and those who enjoy the game as spectators, is word of the exhibition to be presented here Thursday, May the eighth, as a benefit for the local unit, Bundles for Britain.

Purpose of the tour is to help raise funds for war relief work, the gallery fees charged given entirely to the local unit of Bundles for Britain. It is pointed out that the players receive no part of the fund and in view of the fact the players are such top-fighters as Miss Marian McDougall of Portland, Mrs. Joyce Kavanaugh Priebe of Seattle, and Miss Muriel Veatch of Longview, the gallery is expected to be exceptionally large.

The visiting players will present the exhibition at Reames Golf and Country club, the exact time to be announced later. Miss McDougall, Mrs. Priebe, and Miss Veatch are all amateur golfers and are being more than generous in their effort to help raise funds for Bundles for Britain. The proposed tour, which includes appearances in Seattle, Longview, Corvallis, Marshfield, Klamath Falls, Bend, The Dalles, Pendleton, Baker, LaGrande, Walla Walla, and Wenatchee, Washington, is the idea of the three young players and they are paying their own expenses.

Word pictures of the three young women follow:

Miss Marian McDougall of Portland, Oregon; present Oregon state champion and four times winner of the title; five times winner of the Pacific Northwest Golf association championship (1934-36-37-38-39); former Women's Western Open champion; has qualified five times in the Women's National; has twice reached the quarter-finals of the Women's National; has scored victories in major

competition over Miss Betty Jameson, present national champion; Miss Patty Berg, former national champion and now an outstanding professional golfer, and Miss Maureen Orcutt of New Jersey, a nationally prominent golfer and former Curtis Cup player; and is at present a member of the Women's Committee of the United States Golf association and a member of the board of directors of the Women's Western Golf association.

Mrs. Joyce Kavanaugh Priebe of Seattle; present Seattle city champion; medalist in the Pacific Northwest Golf championship in 1940 with a 76; semi-finalist in the Women's Western Golf championship in 1940, losing to Miss Marion Milley of Lexington, Kentucky; qualified in the Women's National last year at Pebble Beach, California; broke the course record of the Sand Point Golf club in Seattle last summer with a 72 and is noted for her medal play ability.

Miss Muriel Veatch of Longview, Washington; present Washington state champion; winner of the Women's Western junior championship in Seattle in 1940, losing to Miss Betty Jameson, present national champion (in that match, Miss Jameson broke the course record with a 74 and defeated Miss Veatch only 2 and 1).

All three players are in their twenties—Muriel Veatch being the youngest of the group. Miss Veatch is a blonde, Miss McDougall is a brunette and Mrs. Priebe—you guessed it—is a redhead!
