

CAMPAIGN ON FOR CONCERT MEMBERSHIPS

More than 50 workers met in the Willard hotel Monday night to discuss plans for this week's Klamath Community Concert association campaign and with interest held the drive is expected to far exceed that of last year which resulted in putting Klamath Falls definitely in the big-time entertainment column.

The campaign, which started Monday morning, ends at 6 o'clock Saturday night. It was announced by Mrs. Lester Offield, membership chairman. Headquarters are in the Willard hotel, writing room, the association telephone number, dial 8312.

Herbert O. Fox of Seattle, campaign manager, reported successful campaigns throughout the northwest due to the high type of concerts held last year throughout the country, giving patrons assurance that coming seasons would be equally as good. The fact that Paul Robeson, biggest drawing card in the country today, will appear here in concert in the early fall months, will go far toward the success of the campaign, workers feel. Other artists will be announced at the close of the drive.

Mayor John M. Houston spoke to the officers and workers and assured them of the city's cooperation with their efforts. He commended the association on the work they had accomplished in the past in bringing to Klamath Falls the

finest entertainment in the concert world.

Hopkins in Charge of Aid Materials

WASHINGTON, April 15 (AP)—President Roosevelt today placed Harry L. Hopkins officially in charge of purchasing and acquisition of war materials for all countries benefiting under the lend-lease act.

Deals with other countries which involve consideration of foreign policy will be handled by the state department.

Hopkins, former secretary of commerce and WPA administrator, has been supervising lend-lease purchasing operations since the act was passed several weeks ago, but only in an unofficial capacity.

George L. Hossfield, 10 times professional world's typing champion, gave a demonstration Monday for all students who are now taking typing and those who have had typing.

Hossfield, whose best record is 139 net words per minute for an hour's typing, was brought to KUHS by Representative Peterson of the Underwood, Elliot Typewriter company, and Mr. Ray of Shaw's stationery.

"The government needs men who can type and take shorthand," Hossfield said. "I urge boys in particular to take advantage of the opportunity to learn in high school and to go after it with a will to do. They will never regret it."

He told how these national contests, begun in 1906, have improved typing in general.

Hossfield gave several typing demonstrations, typing 141

five-stroke words for one minute from copy and 120 actual words, or 240 words per minute, in 30 seconds doing a memorized sentence.

Rhythm, posture, and many time savers were explained. Hossfield then answered questions.

KUHS's music department is in the midst of probably its busiest season right now. Chuck Stanfield, director, and Guy Bates, assistant director, are putting the finishing touches on the various groups. The planned program runs something like this:

Thursday morning nine students will leave for Marshfield to participate Friday and Saturday in the state instrumental contest. Making the trip will be: Fred Floetke, cornet solo; Jackson Hanson, clarinet solo; Joe Schmoll, French horn solo; Bob Holmes, trombone solo; James Pearson, saxophone solo; Agnes Vasak, Jack Hanson, Gerald Einarsson, and Stanley Hendricks, clarinet quartette.

Wednesday evening, April 23, there will be a straight band concert in the high school auditorium which will feature many band numbers, instrumental solos, small ensembles, quartettes, trios, etc.

Members of the a capella chorus, Girls' Glee club, and orchestra will travel April 25 to Ashland where they will participate in the annual state of Oregon festival held at the Southern Oregon College of Education. At the same time the a capella vocalist will enter the state contest.

Week after next the band will spend two days touring Klamath county high schools. The complete 110-piece band will go.

The last concert planned will come off the second week in May. The vocal department and orchestra will take part.

The queen of the 20-30 track meet will be chosen from the class candidates by the sale of tickets to the track meet. Tickets were to be distributed in home rooms Tuesday. Each adult ticket is worth 35 votes and each student ticket worth 15 votes. These votes are then good for any candidate of the salesman's choice.

The Interstate Business college is sponsoring a dance at the Willard hotel for all high school seniors of Klamath county and surrounding communities and past and present students of Interstate April 25.

The ball room of the hotel is to be transformed into "The Old Red Barn." Emil Buzaid's five-piece band will play from the Hay Loft from 9 until 1

o'clock; refreshments will be served from the still; a clever floor show has been planned.

The highlight of the evening will be the crowning of the Queen of Calico by Mayor Johnny Houston. She and her barefoot beau will be chosen by committees during the evening.

The Oregon state winner for the nation-wide essay contest sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars auxiliary will be chosen this month. Judges are Mrs. Dorothy McCullough Lee, state senator; Judge James W. Crawford; Marshall N. Dana of the Oregon Journal.

The winning essay will be entered in the national contest,

which offers cash prizes totaling \$2100. National winners will be announced at the national encampment of the auxiliary this August in Philadelphia.

Helen Cox, senior, won the local first prize for her "One Nation Indivisible" essay. Leo Zell won second prize.
