MALIN MAYOR CHOSEN HEAD OF CHAMBER

MALIN — Mayor A. Kalina was elected president of the Malin chamber of commerce at a meeting by the board of directors in session Monday night. T. A. DeMerritt will serve as vice president, B. H. Pickett as treasurer and Irving Capek as secretary. Capek, recently elected to the board of directors, resigned to take the office of registrar. His place on the board was filled by Ray Van Meter.

The chamber will sponsor the annual Klamath county school track meet to be held here Saturday, May 3, offering for permanent custody to the relay team taking first place, a trophy. A medal will also be offered by the chamber to the entrant piling up the greatest number of individual points in the meet. Both will be presented in addition to the trophy given by the Merrill Service club to the school taking the county title.

Ribbons will be given for first, second, third and fourth places in all events.

The meet is being held in Malin for the first time this year.

The Howith ranch is located along the river two miles east of Sprague River and contains over 400 acres of fine grazing and hay land.

Howith came to the Sprague River country about 15 years ago and started the clearing of land for his ranch. For a number of years he had a dairy farm and shipped cream to Klamath Falls. During recent years Howith has devoted his time to the raising of fine beef cattle. The purchase price of the ranch is rumored to be around \$6000.

Howith and his mother, who has lived on the ranch with him, are now living in the Durbin Cook cabins. The couple spent last weekend investigating ranch possibilities in the Rogue river valley.

Hess has operated a cattle ranch for several years about seven miles west of Sprague River.
