

DOCTOR ASKS RESIDENTS TO AID CAMPAIGN

An appeal to all residents of Klamath county to cooperate in the "early diagnosis" campaign of the Klamath County Public Health association, which is being held throughout April, is made by Dr. P. H. Rozendal, county health officer.

Dr. Rozendal also urged residents of both the city and county, especially parents of school children, to visit the health department during its open house on April 24 in order to learn first-hand what is being accomplished and view the equipment of the department, including the x-ray which was presented as a gift to the health association.

"This campaign is held annually by the National Tuberculosis association and its affiliated state and local associations every April, in the attempt to highlight for the public certain facts that must become common knowledge and put into practice if the eradication of tuberculosis is to become an accomplished fact," said Dr. Rozendal.

The doctor pointed out that nationwide studies of admission to sanatoria and to tuberculosis hospitals show that eight out of 10 entering are in the advanced stage.

She hopes to become a great-grandmother any day now.

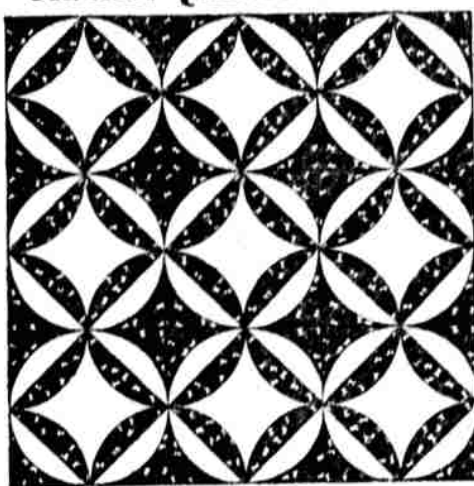

Pork Provides Necessary Vitamins on Low Budget Plan

PORK PROVIDES—18 HM PG Pork is important as a protein food because of its high vitamin B1 content and its relatively low cost.

"A good diet containing liberal amounts of fruits, green vegetables, fresh fruit, milk and meat provides daily about 500 International Units of thiamine" (vitamin B1), writes Dr. Henry Istrey, professor of biochemistry, California Institute of Technology, in his informative book, "Vitamins—What They Are and How They Can Benefit You."

Dr. Istrey observes also, "Fresh meat is a time-honored, somewhat over-rated standard. One quarter-pound of fresh lean beef contains about 50 International Units of thiamine. Fowl and pork are much richer in this respect than beef."

PORK LOAF (Serves 4 to 6)
One pound chopped pork, 1

cup bread crumbs, 1 egg, beaten, 1 small onion, chopped, pinch thyme or savory seasoning, salt, pepper, fine dry crumbs, bacon or salt pork, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 cup milk.

Mix the pork, bread crumbs, egg, onion and seasoning. Shape into a loaf, coat with fine dry crumbs, place in a baking pan, and lay a few thin strips of bacon or salt pork over (top degrees F) for an hour. A few minutes before the meat is to be served, stir the flour into the fat in the pan and add the evaporated milk. Stir until the gravy is smooth and season with salt and pepper.

PORK AND NOODLE STEW (Serves 4 to 6)
One-half pound ground lean pork, 1 cup diced celery, 2 medium-sized onions, chopped, 1 cup canned tomatoes, salt, pep-

per, 1 package noodles, ½ green pepper, chopped.

Brown the meat in its own fat. Add the celery, onions and green pepper and cook for a few minutes. The celery may be omitted. Add the tomatoes, season with salt and pepper, and simmer for about 45 minutes. Add the noodles which have been cooked until tender in boiling salted water and drained.

PORK-DIABLE (Serves 4 to 6)
Two cups cooked pork, sliced, 2 tablespoons pork drippings, olive oil or butter, 1 cup catsup, 1 tablespoon prepared mustard, 1 tablespoon prepared horseradish, 1 cup boiling water, salt, pepper.

Mix hot fat with catsup, mustard, horseradish, boiling water, and seasoning. When well blended, add sliced pork and simmer very slowly until meat is hot.

BREAKFAST: Grapefruit juice, scrambled eggs with sausage, toast, apple jelly, coffee, milk.

LUNCHEON: Spaghetti in tomato sauce, cold slaw, chocolate Brownies, tea, milk.

DINNER: Grapefruit juice, pork, leaf, mashed potatoes, asparagus with butter, strawberry, rhubarb and prune cup, nut cookies, coffee, milk.

OREGON FAMILIES MAKE MATTRESSES

Surplus raw cotton from the southern states will roll into Oregon throughout this spring and summer to meet the needs of the mattress-making centers throughout the state, where thousands of Oregon families have applied for the privilege of making their own mattresses from the surplus cotton being distributed free through the AAA and surplus marketing administration.

Officials of the OSC extension service in charge of the mattress-making project report a far greater response in many counties than was anticipated when the project was undertaken. Already applications in 25 counties have been made for 10,078 mattresses, which will require some 15 carloads of raw cotton. The project may be extended later to other counties.

Although applications are accepted only from families with a stated minimum annual cash income, the extension service emphasizes the fact that this is not a relief project, but instead is a means of disposing of huge stocks of surplus cotton while at the same time increasing the standard of living in rural homes.

With 1508 applications by the first week in March, Marion county led the others in the response to the program. Malheur county, where the actual mattressmaking work was started first, has applications for 1249 mattresses, of which 480 have been made. In Deschutes county the program is under way with 509 applications and approximately 300 mattresses made. Klamath county is also started, with 329 applications and about 100 made so far. Both Jackson and Josephine county families have turned in an excess of 700 applications.

Steel Men Ponder Test of Federal Price-Fixing Rule

WASHINGTON, April 18 (AP) Steel industry leaders were reported today to be considering a test of President Roosevelt's price control authority because of an administrative order freezing steel and iron prices.

The order, fixing prices at the level of the first quarter of this year, was issued by Leon Henderson, who was recently named price administrator by Mr. Roosevelt. In announcing it last night, Henderson said it was designed to prevent price increases resulting from wage rises granted this week by two-thirds of the industry.

An increase in prices now, Henderson asserted, "might touch off a general increase in the cost of living and start the country off on the road to price inflation."

At the same time, he made it clear that upward adjustments might be permitted in the future if a thorough study of prices and costs in the industry indicated they were necessary.

Schoenheider and Miss Moon are planning their wedding April 28.

Plans Complete for Defense of Coasts Of U. S., Canada

MONTREAL, April 18 (Canadian Press)—Completion of plans for the military and naval defense of the eastern and western coasts of Canada and the United States was announced today by the Canada-United States joint permanent defense board.

"The board from now on will devote itself to keeping these plans up to date to meet changing conditions," said the announcement.

It followed a three-day meeting, including a session with Newfoundland government officials.

The announcement, released by Mayor LaGuardia of New York and Col. O. M. Biggar of Ottawa, co-chairmen, added: "The board must naturally take a realistic view of conditions and therefore the plans have been prepared with minute detail in the event that it becomes necessary to defend either the eastern or western coasts of our countries. Nothing is left to be done but to put the plan into operation."
