Beavers Lick UO Cindermen At Corvallis

CORVALLIS, Ore., April 21 (AP)—Oregon State dominated track events here Saturday and trounced the University of Oregon in the annual relay meet, 5 to 3.

Aided by the touted Les Steers, Oregon won the shot-put and high jump relays, but could capture only the mile relay in the running events. Oregon State chalked up firsts in the 40, 880, two-mile, four-mile and shuttle hurdle relays.

Oregon established a new meet record of 24 feet, 9 inches in the high jump with Steers' 6 feet, 7 inches the best performance of the day.

Jim Holloway provided Oregon State's victory by recovering from a tumble in the hurdle relay event and nosing out Ralph Furman, Oregon anchor man.

The Oregon State freshmen also won, 4-1, from Oregon frosh.

BEAVERS, WEBFOOTS EVEN IN BALL SERIES

EUGENE, April 21 (AP)—University of Oregon and Oregon State stood even in their northern division baseball series today as the result of the Beavers' 4-3 victory here Saturday.

The teams did all their scoring in the first inning, but fire-works continued even after the last out of the game. Empire Spec Burke was knocked to the ground in a dispute that followed Oregon Coach Howard Hobson's protest of a play at first base.

GOVERNOR TO SPEAK

THE DALLES, April 21 (AP)—Governor Chase A. Clark of Idaho will be the principal speaker at the state convention of young democrats here April 25-27, Edward Howell, local convention chairman, said today.

He added that Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, previously scheduled to speak, had sent word that she would be unable to attend.

Wooden Shoes Now Being Worn in Nazi-Held Norway

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—Wooden shoes are replacing leather-soled shoes in German-occupied Norway as a result of a leather shortage, according to authoritative information received in diplomatic quarters here.

The wooden shoes, it was reported, are only one indication of a growing list of inconveniences, hardships and prohibitions which beset the Norwegians under Nazi domination.

Other aspects of life in Norway today as reported in diplomatic quarters include: Tooth paste is sold only to customers who return old tubes, because of the shortage of aluminum tube metal. Experiments with paper and other substitutes have proved unsuccessful.

Processed fish oil has been substituted for olive and other vegetable oils, with the claim that it costs only half and has equal nutritional value.

Because of the shortage of gasoline and trucks, the Nazi-controlled government prohibited use of trucks in clearing away snow from streets and roads.

All Norwegians more than 15 years old now carry identity cards, because of sabotage and street disturbances. Identity cards must be submitted by any one registering at a hotel or traveling by ships in Norwegian waters.

Long Relected Head of Oregon AFL Carpenters

PORTLAND, Ore., April 21 (AP)—A contract to govern wages and working conditions on highway and heavy construction projects in Oregon and five southwestern Washington counties was attacked yesterday by Oregon AFL carpenters.

The carpenters said in their annual state convention that the contract was signed recently by the Portland chapter of the Associated General Contractors and the Allied Heavy Construction and Highway Crafts union.

They charged that neither the CIO or AFL recognizes the union, and urged Oregon's 2100 carpenters and joiners to affiliate with the Oregon State Building & Construction Trades Council, which has an AFL charter.

C. D. Long, Klamath Falls, was reelected president and L. W. Crone, Seaside, executive secretary of the carpenters. Joe L. Ross, Bend, was named vice president, and the following were elected district committeemen: B. J. Benson, Portland; N. C. Nelson, Seaside; L. O. Swanger, Eugene; James Hanson, Marshfield; J. R. Fugill, Klamath Falls; Joe E. Ross, Bend; Tom Hodgson, Pendleton.

Two State Officers Enter Army Service

SALEM, April 21 (AP)—Oregon lost the services of two state officials today to Uncle Sam's armed forces.

Wallace Wharton, state tax commissioner and a lieutenant commander in the naval reserve, will leave tonight for Washington, D. C., to go on active duty as an intelligence officer. Former Jackson County Judge Earl B. Day will substitute for Wharton while the latter is on duty with the navy.

Sigfrid B. Unander, governor's private secretary and a first lieutenant in the field artillery reserve, reported today for active duty with the third division at Fort Lewis. David Eccles, budget director and executive secretary to the governor, will take over Unander's duties.

Army Considers New 'Tin Hat'

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—The army is considering adoption of a new type of steel helmet, similar in appearance to battlefield headgear of Nazi troops.

Designed to give greater protection to the sides and back of the head, the new helmet was said to be more stable, better balanced and generally more comfortable. It weighs about two and a half pounds, an increase of three ounces, and is made of tougher steel.

EDWARD ALLESCH DIES IN PORTLAND

Edward Allesch, World war veteran from Klamath Falls, died Monday morning in the Veterans hospital in Portland, it was learned here. He had been in the hospital for the past year.

Mr. Allesch had been a resident of Klamath Falls for many years and was employed as a baker. He was a member of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

Funeral services will be held in Portland Wednesday morning, April 23.

League of Nations Has 30 Members, Research Shows

GENEVA, Switzerland, April 21 (AP)—France's notification that she is withdrawing from the league of nations was held up for hours Saturday because officials couldn't remember how many nations are left in the dwindling institution.

Several hours of research finally established that there still are 30 full and independent members out of an all-time high of 54.

Earlier the French government, at Vichy, announced that France had withdrawn from the league of nations under the provision which gives any member the right to withdraw after two-year notification.

An authorized press release asserted that "this decision of Marshal Petain's government was simply a recognition of a de facto situation x x x. The activity of the league of nations belongs to the past."

Three Sneezes Held Normal Quota

PHILADELPHIA, April 21 (AP)—A normal person is allowed three consecutive sneezes. If you sneeze more, you're an allergic.

That's what Dr. Richard A. Kern, professor of clinical medicine at the University of Pennsylvania, told the college of physicians.

People do not inherit hay fever or sensitivity to strawberries, sea food or dog hair, he said. What they inherit is the ability to become sensitive much more easily than the average.
