RALLY FIZZLES  
EARLY AS WAR  
CHILLS STOCKS

NEW YORK, April 22 (AP)—An early rally in today's stock market fizzled to a certain extent when the war news took on a more pessimistic tinge. Transfers were around 450,000 shares.

Much of the initial bidding, brokers said, was due to the thought of some speculative forces that allied reverses in the Balkans had been pretty well discounted by the long downward drift of stock prices. The same kind of reasoning apparently applied to mounting taxes and increasing government controls.

Worries revived, however, as dispatches from the battle fronts told of a possible British-Greek rout.

American Telephone dived to a new low since last June, along

with Chrysler, Sears Roebuck, N. Y. Central, and Du Pont. Consolidated Edison again was under last year's bottom.

WHEAT PRICES SLIP  
TO MODERATE LOSS

CHICAGO, April 22 (AP)—Increased offerings of wheat and a drying up of buying interest influenced in part by reactions in stocks and other commodities changed an opening advance in wheat futures into a moderate net loss today. Final prices were slightly above the day's lowest.

Continued disquieting reports from the Balkans and failure of cotton-seed oil, lard and soybeans to hold initial advances had some effect on the market. Trade was dull and featureless. Expectations of flour buying for the Red Cross failed to materialize and nothing further was heard concerning progress of farm legislation. Favorable weather and crop conditions offered little incentive to the buying side.

Wheat closed 1-1/2 cents lower than Monday's final quotations, May 89 1/2c, July 87 1/2c; corn 1-1/2c off, May 67 1/2c, July 68 1/2c; and oats were down 1-1/2 cents.

BOSTON, April 22 (AP-USA)—Scattered sales were being closed on the Boston wool market today. Graded combing three-eighths and quarter blood to bright fleece wools have been sold for shipment direct from the country at 45-46 cents, in the grease, delivered to users. South American wools of these grades were receiving a moderate demand at firm prices. A fair weight of average combing 64's fine Australian wool was sold at \$1-1.02, scoured basis, including duty.
