

KING SETS UP RULE IN CRETE TO DIRECT WAR

ward to Ioannina from Metsovo in an encircling movement. The island of Crete, designated by King George as the new seat of his government, is about 75 miles off the southeastern tip of Greece and about 250 miles north of the Libyan coast, where axis armies are now engaged in a drive aimed at the Suez canal.

The British established bases on Crete shortly after the beginning of the Greek-Italian war.

King George made his fateful announcement in a lengthy proclamation in which he appealed to the Greek people to keep up their courage "even during this painful moment of our histories."

"The right of our struggle and God will help us to secure by all means a final victory in spite of the trials, pains and dangers which we shall go through," the sovereign concluded.

"Remain faithful to the idea of a united and undivided free country, intensify your will, oppose Greek pride to enemy force and enemy temptations. Have courage—good days will come again."

NLRB Election at Chiloquin Lumber Company Scheduled

The ballot, calling for a yes or no vote on whether employees wish the CIO's International Woodworkers of America as their bargaining agent, will be held for approximately 225 mill and woods workers of the firm, Davies said.

Millworkers will cast their ballots on Wednesday and woodsmen on Thursday. The NLRB man at the same time disclosed the Kesterson runoff election will be staged May 2.

armor-piercing shells crashed into underground oil deposits.

As sheets of fire spurted high into the sky, salvos crashed into the axis naval headquarters buildings, destroying them as though they had been made of cardboard.

The surprise bombardment of El Duce's heaviest fortified African possession, once base of Tripoli pirates and now the jumping-off place of Hitler's legions thrusting against Egypt, opened a few minutes after a wave of bombers handed Tripoli one of the severest bombardments of the war.

DEFENSE BONDS TO GO ON SALE

Assuring full cooperation with the federal government in financing the national defense program, the United States National bank has been approved by the Federal Reserve bank of San Francisco to act as issuing agent for United States defense savings bonds to the amount of \$1,000,000, states an announcement by Paul S. Dick, the bank's president.

The application covers bonds in series E, which preserve the character of savings bonds as issued in the past, and also the new series F and G bonds, which may be purchased by business concerns as well as individuals and which permit investment to the amount of \$50,000 annually. Defense savings stamps will also be offered, enabling those who cannot make lump-sum investments to acquire defense savings bonds through small payments over a period of time.

"Every man, woman and child will be able to save at a worth-while rate of interest and, at the same time, assist in financing the national defense program under this plan," Dick pointed out. "Savings stamps can be purchased for as little as 10 cents, and series E bonds for as low as \$18.75; while those who can invest larger amounts will be able to purchase the new series F and G bonds in amounts up to \$10,000. An interesting feature of these new bonds, too, is the fact that they can be registered in the name of any association, partnership, trustee, or corporation."

Both defense savings bonds and stamps will be placed on sale beginning May 1 at the 25 units of the United States National bank located in 21 Oregon cities, thus assuring state-wide availability.

Portland Boards to Fill Draft Quota

SALEM, April 23 (AP)—Oregon's quota of 16 men, ordered to report to the Portland armory, May 5 and 6, will be supplied by five of Multnomah county's 13 draft boards, Lieutenant Colonel Elmer V. Wootton, state selective service director, said today.

The call is the eighth since the draft was begun. Three men each from Multnomah boards Nos. 2, 6 and 8 will report May 5. Four men from Multnomah board No. 1 and three men from Multnomah board No. 9 will report May 6.

Reno Bartender Slain by Robber; Suspect Arrested

LOVELOCK, Nev., April 23 (AP)—Sheriff J. H. Clawson said today that he and his deputy, Frank Carpenter had arrested Joe Eddy, 20, in connection with the hold-up slaying of Martin Villanueva, Reno bartender, who died at Reno early today from gunshot wounds.

Clawson said that Eddy had confessed to the slaying. He was arrested on a freight train at a siding 12 miles west of here. The officers said Eddy was carrying a .22 caliber revolver.

Reno police said that Villanueva told them before he died that the shooting occurred just before closing time as he was counting his receipts for the day.

Klamath authorities expressed warm interest Wednesday in the Reno murder, because of the similarity of the case there and that of the Buffalo lunch killing at Klamath Falls in March.

They pointed out that the actions of the killer were similar to those of the two men who held up the lunch room here and killed Dr. Salem A. David, bartender.

party in the Lennox hotel in Portland, on April 12, 1938, that Bridges would carry out the meeting's decision that CIO representatives in Oregon should be ousted from office.
Richard A. St. Clair, deaf 50-year-old Los Angeles laborer and former communist, testified that while he was an armed guard at communist headquarters he saw Bridges come to party offices several times.

St. Clair said that he acted as guard for ten cents a day at the Grove street headquarters in San Francisco in 1934 and 1935, and ate at the city's soup kitchen. When party headquarters were moved to 121 Haight, he said his pay was raised to five dollars a week.

Run-Off Election Ordered by NLRB At Kesterson's

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—The labor board today called for a run-off election at the Kesterson Lumber company, Klamath Falls, Ore., to determine whether the employees want to be represented by CIO's International Wood Workers union or by the AFL's Lumber and Sawmill Workers union. A previous election failed to give a majority vote for either organization.

Joe Boyd, local AFL organizer, said Wednesday the Kesterson runoff election must be held within 30 days of the NLRB decision, which was dated April 21. Boyd said it was probable the ballot will be staged toward the end of next week.
