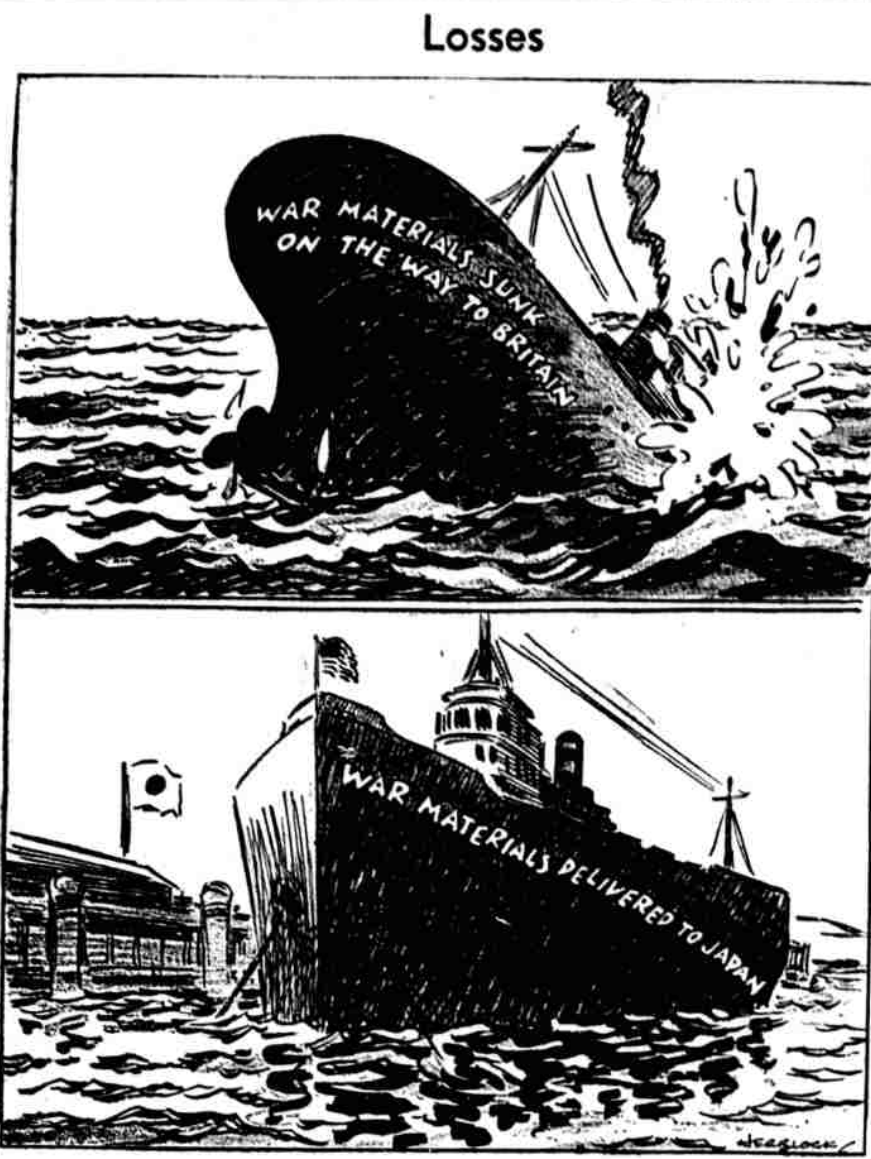

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**The Army's New Quarters**  
AFTER years in inadequate and unsatisfactory quarters, the Salvation Army is now on its way to a physical plant worthy of the program the army desires to carry on in this community. This is at Fourth street and Klamath avenue, where the army has acquired the brick and concrete building formerly occupied by a transfer company, and is remodeling it into an establishment to include an auditorium, gymnasium, sewing and Sunday school rooms, and spacious quarters for transient activities.  
It has been a struggle for the army to achieve its building goal. There were complications that made the old property on Walnut street a burden and delayed its disposal. To build or acquire a new home was a problem because of scarcity of funds. But at last, the Fourth and Klamath opportunity presented itself, and now the army has promise of a most satisfactory headquarters.  
The score or so business and professional men who serve on the advisory board of the army were shown through the partially remodeled building this week, and learned that approximately \$1000 is needed to finish the job so the army can move in. It is necessary to get this money without jeopardizing the army's regular budget to be raised in the fall.  
Labor unions have given generously to the army building effort, and it was felt that it would be possible to raise the \$1000 if it is generally realized how near the army is to obtaining what it needs in the way of quarters. This will be done without campaign, and voluntary contributions will be warmly welcomed. Several members of the advisory committee immediately presented checks, including at least three for \$100 each.  
It is here suggested to any one who can give to this final army building effort that he visit the new army home at Fourth and Klamath avenue, see for himself what is in the making there, and then decide if he wants to do his part to bring it to final development.

**Is Peace So Sweet?**  
The Oregon-educated Japanese Foreign Minister Yosuke Matsuoka describes the new Japanese-Russian pact as a "step towards peace." What he really means, no doubt, is that it will release Japanese military strength for hoped-for success against China and possibly England, and the peace he refers to will come with Japanese victory.  
The aggressor talks of peace in terms of submission to his will. To him, Yugoslavia and Greece, because they have resisted, have thrown obstacles in the path of peace. To him, England would be furthering the cause of peace if it would lay down its arms and invite the Axis to come in and take over.  
For comment on that kind of peace, let us turn from such authorities as Adolf Hitler, Paul Joseph Goebbels, Benito Mussolini and Yosuke Matsuoka, and listen to the words of one who spoke the language of freedom as Americans have known it. We quote from Patrick Henry:  
"Is life so dear or peace so sweet as to be purchased at the price of chains and slavery? Forbid it, almighty God. I know not what course others may take, but as for me, give me liberty or give me death!"  
So long as men know the meaning of freedom, and there are those who would take it from them, there can be no lasting peace.

**WPA Project For Klamath Approved**

**More on Labor**  
KLAMATH FALLS, Ore. (To the Editor) — Now there is a rising dissatisfaction with the effectiveness of labor organization. Public opinion is becoming impatient and annoyed with labor's interference in the procedure of the defense program. Questions are rising in the minds of thoughtful Americans. Do labor unions really have saboteurs? Why so many strikes? Selfishness? Are the walkouts really in accordance with the "majority rule" plan or is it some minor group dictating the policies of strikers? Now most dangerous, most menacing of all, the deep and throbbing murmurs of public opinion. Shall government make labor stop the strikes and get on with the program? Will the government take action? If it does what will that action be?  
With all my might I answer: No! Government control of labor is the sure road to dictatorship. This is a job for ALL Americans—not a job for government officials alone. On all sides, in every nook and cranny of this democracy of ours the people must stop shaking their heads and wringing their hands. For the protection of both labor and capital they must not only vote their willingness to organize labor and accept labor benefits, they must also accept the responsibilities of that organization.  
I always feel like taking a good healthy punch at the person who says, "Oh yes, I'm a union member but I haven't been to the meetings since I joined except to pay dues." That person, as a member of organized labor, is grabbing a very big benefit in wages and conditions his fellow members have worked to attain, without accepting one iota of responsibility! The person who attends meetings, although he may not always express his opinions on labor problems, is not entirely shirking his responsibility. He is at least keeping himself informed and should be able to vote his convictions.  
Many times members are inclined to support organized action just so long as it does not interfere with their own personal liberties. Do members of your organization vote some company on the unfair list, then promptly go out and buy from that company? Do they vote to recognize a picket line, then as free individuals leave labor meetings and pass the line? The only weapon labor has against unfair business practice is the unfair list or picket line. These weapons should never be used unless absolutely necessary and when used should be used effectively.  
We must remind ourselves that labor difficulties are not all due to selfish, self centered interests of organized labor. There are also selfish self centered employers who are not contented with reasonable profits—men who would not hesitate to hold down the wage scale, get by with inadequate unsafe equipment, and maintain long working hours in order to fatten their own purses.  
Let's not forget that business delayed the defense program several months dickering with the government for a guarantee of profits. Why should those profits be taken at the expense of labor—organized or unorganized?  
Let's not forget there are always two sides to any question. Let's be fair-minded enough not to pass judgment on any question before we know the facts concerning that question.  
We need all the intelligence and cooperation we can attain. Fair mindedness in both employer and employee to be successful in our defense program. Don't forget, business must cooperate fairly and unselfishly as well as organized labor.  
To those of you who think "This doesn't concern me, I'm neither a business man nor organized labor. All I want to see is completion of an adequate defense project." I wish to say:  
This does concern you. Non-union wages and conditions fluctuate in direct proportion to union wages and conditions. Prices for the farmer, profits for the business man are directly affected by labor's purchasing power. So the next time you see a picket line, please realize that something is wrong. Learn the facts—not just from the managers of the place of business—from a labor leader. Learn facts from all sources available and decide who is wrong or who is right. Give the right party your support. If all America will do this in a fair-minded way, labor difficulties will be disposed of quickly and efficiently.  
The American laborer is the backbone of America. Organized labor is its spinal column.

**News Behind THE NEWS**

WASHINGTON, April 23—A Nazi sub sent to the bottom of the Atlantic a few days back a British ship loaded with \$5,000,000 worth of our needed strategic war material, rubber. This news was bad enough to the official circle (it did not get far outside) but when the Germans got a ship loaded with 3000 of our airplane fuel pumps shortly thereafter, the war department generals wrung their hands collectively. Faced with one of the worst shortages in this line, all the generals can think of is are 3000 of their priceless pumps setting on the bottom of the Atlantic.  
Generally unknown events, such as these, are whetting the current government interest in conveying that is the source of the greatest pressure at the moment.  
Yet there is nothing like a preponderance of official sentiment in favor of trying to leap across that rubicon. As Mr. Roosevelt said, most of those who are shouting for conveying do not know "a hill of beans" (his words) about the problem. The more intimate the knowledge of officials here the less enthusiasm there is for hasty action.  
Apparently there are many drastic steps the British themselves should take first, whether or not there is to be American conveying.  
**COMPLAINTS**  
An outstanding British shipping source here is flatly conceding the British have been "fuddy-duddy" about protecting their shipments from us. His good people, he says, are still trying to do this the same way they did it in the last war. They still put slow ships in with the fast ones, holding down the speed of the entire convoy to the point where it is vulnerable to the slow submarines. They do not convey all the way across. They have worked out no adequate sea-air defense around Ireland, although their bases are closer to the shipping lanes than the German bases in France. Trusting to luck, they have refused to concentrate sufficient forces of the fleet to give their convoys adequate protection.  
Several moves to correct and perhaps cure the problem could be taken short of American conveying.  
By mistake, it has leaked out our navy has been experimenting in making auxiliary aircraft carriers out of fast merchant ships to patrol sea skies. The S. S. Mormachail, a passenger-freight ship, is being fitted with an overall landing deck. Such ships could accompany convoys and fight German bombers on the spot.  
The British could limit their convoys to snips of the same slow speed, sending their faster ships across individually. They have plenty of freighters capable of making 18 to 20 knots, whereas 15 is tops for a sub. Steering a zigzag course these fast freighters would be relatively free of danger from anything except a sub which happened to come up in the right position ready to fire. We know they

She gave the name of "Jean Lamar," but reports from Texas indicated her true name was Isabelle Messmer, a former school teacher, who twice fled the Ector county jail at Odessa, Tex., for killing Buford Armstrong, ball player.  
Inspector George Engler of the San Francisco police homicide detail said she told him she intended to kill Officer Tom O'Connor when he arrested her.  
"But he was so nice I didn't do it," she was quoted as saying.  
Engler said he found a fully-loaded .32 caliber pistol hidden in a chair in the young woman's room.
