WHEAT PRICE RISES TWO CENTS BUSHEL

CHICAGO, April 25 (AP)—Wheat prices rose almost two cents a bushel today as the grain market's recovery was accelerated.

Buying attributed to professional traders, some of whom covered previous short sales, and to cash grain dealers and milling interests accounted for the strength. In the absence of specific trade developments to encourage purchases, traders attributed the action to improve flour demand, possibly involving some government business, and to general reinstatement of sold out lines on the theory that developments in the Balkans had been discounted and that government plans call for increased efforts to bolster prices.

Wheat closed 14-1/2¢ higher than yesterday, May 91¢-1¢, July 88¢; corn 1-1/4¢ up, May 68¢-1¢, July 68¢-1¢; oats 1-1/2¢ higher.
