

Housewives Will Not Suffer From Shortage of Utensils

"Fortunately, limiting the aluminum that can be used in kitchen utensils works no great hardship on homemakers," says Dr. Louise Stanley, chief of the bureau of home economics. "For, in addition to the supply of aluminum utensils already made up, there are available utensils of many other satisfactory materials."

For top-of-the-stove cooking, utensils of porcelain-enamelware are the cheapest. Treat enamel pots and pans carefully to prevent chipping. Never boil dry. Cool them before washing, and let them cool before pouring liquids into them. When food sticks, soak it loose by boiling water or a weak solution of soda in them. Never scrape or use a coarse abrasive.

Iron Serves Well
Iron is inexpensive, heats up slowly, holds the heat well, makes good skillets, frying pans, and griddles.

Covering it with a non-salty fat and heating iron pans at low temperature for two or three hours makes the utensils more resistant to rust. Always dry an iron kettle thoroughly. Clean iron utensils with hot soapsuds and an abrasive.

The new copper-clad stainless steel utensils are excellent for waterless cooking. Although they are expensive, they are very durable and will stand up under long, hard wear. The strongest acids, lemon juice for example, will not affect them, and they keep a bright color with a minimum of care. The copper gives a fast, even heat.

The following low-cost high nutrition pudding was tested in a new three-piece copper-clad double boiler. While the pudding steamed in its special casserole tray, other foods can be steamed in the stainless steel bottom.

Bread and Butter Custard
(Serves 8, costs 32c)
One cup of raisins, 1 quart milk, sugar, 3 eggs, cinnamon, fresh or day old bread.

Line the bottom of the casserole with slices of bread (crusts removed), butter each piece of bread, sprinkle with sugar, then cinnamon, and dot lavishly with

raisins. Continue doing this layer after layer until the casserole is almost filled. Then beat three eggs thoroughly, whites and yolks together, add milk and beat again, pouring this in carefully at the side of the casserole. For the top layer, toast the slices of bread in your electric toaster, sprinkle with sugar, cinnamon and raisins. Fill the bottom part of the double boiler half way up with boiling water, insert the casserole pot, put on the tight-fitting lid and turn the flame down to low, cook until

MISTREATMENT OF FRENCH CLAIMED

VICHY, France, April 25 (AP) The physician attending former French leaders now held at Bourrasol Chateau, near Riom, says he has been forced to "intervene energetically" against what he called "inhuman treatment" of the fallen statesmen.

The charge was made by Dr. Roulet in the Paris newspaper Le Matin in telling of the living conditions of former Premiers Edouard Daladier and Leon Blum, General Maurice Gustave Gamelin, former allied generalissimo, and Guy La Chambre, ex-air minister.

Sources close to the ministry of justice here denied that they had been inhumanly treated and said, in fact, they had been given a privileged position as compared with other prisoners.

Authorized circles here said that, up to now, the Paris newspapers had been picturing the prisoners as living in ease and apparently had been ordered to change their tone for some reason.

"The first to call me in for consultation was General Gamelin," Dr. Roulet wrote. "Like the others, he hadn't the slightest heat. I treated him and made a report, as a result of which 20 tons of coal were placed at the disposal of the prisoners and their guards."

Vichy circles explained the absence of fuel resulted from a snow-storm that tied up traffic. On one occasion, the physician asserted, General Gamelin had to make a sharp protest to the penitentiary administration because his sheets had not been changed for two months.

According to Le Matin, the prisoners spend most of their time reading and writing. They are not permitted to have radios. There is no set time for getting up and going to bed, but their doors are locked each night and a guard sleeps in front of each door.

The former statesmen almost never see one another. They are allowed an hour's exercise in the court of the chateau each day but must take it separately.

SALEM, Ore., April 24 (Special)—An increasing number of persons writing to the travel and information department of the Oregon state highway commission for maps and other travel

information concerning the state are indicating in their letters interest in ultimately locating in Oregon, a study of inquiries shows. Many are evincing an interest in farming, particularly poultry and dairying.

Oregon's wild flowers and their blooming periods constitute the major interest of several thousand of more than 20,000 inquiries received by the travel and information department during the past three months. The state's rhododendrons and azaleas apparently are of outstanding interest in the flower field, many folk explaining that they want to plan their trips at such time to see these flowers in bloom.

During the past two weeks an exceedingly large number of persons writing to the department have explained that they were planning trips to Oregon this year and have asked about fishing. They want to know where they can fish, what kind of fish they may catch and something of boat, license and resort costs. More than 300 inquiries have been received during the past three months on fishing alone.
