The Friday evening session heard a message, "Believe Also in Me," by Dr. Luther E. Stein. "We are not only saved once," said Dr. Stein. "We need to be saved continually." He pointed out that the successful doctor is concerned not only about health in general, but about health in particular. "So Christ wants to be your savior in particular needs. Notice ways in which Christ has been and can be a savior."

Worship service led by Helen Evans of Salem included two solos by Mrs. Howard Cole of Oregon City, accompanied by Mrs. Walter Fiscus at the vibraharp and Fern Nutting at the piano. Two numbers were sung by the Klamath Falls convention chorus.

"reaffirm their full right to navigation of those vessels both in their national and international trade" under their flags.

Meanwhile the house prepared to act on legislation authorizing the president to take over foreign vessels in United States ports and put them to any use. The bill was approved by the house merchant marine committee yesterday.

The 5,400,000 gross tons of British shipping lost since the beginning of the war and displacement of other shipping services as a result of the conflict have created a critical shortage in ships serving South and Central American countries.

The United States has taken 69 idle vessels (39 Danish, 28 Italian and two German) into "protective custody."

Friday Warmest Day Of Year to Date

Friday was the warmest day of spring—1941—and warmest since last October 18 when the thermometer registered 80 degrees. The temperature rose to 71 degrees Friday afternoon, according to US government figures.

There was a trace of precipitation Friday, a light thunder shower, nothing like Wednesday noon's downpour which drenched the basin and brought green to the gardens.

GERMAN LINE PAST THEBES, BERLIN SAYS

by making a "detour" down the island of Evvoia (Euboea) and then crossing to the mainland behind the British in the region of Thermopylae, and are continuing on to Athens, 30 miles away, the high command announced today.

German mountain and armored units participated in the advance, which resulted in the capture of several hundred British troops and 30 guns, the high command said, and in cutting off British units which remained in the mountain defenses to the north.

NLRB Election Slated at Canby

Another in the recent series of National Labor Relations Board elections has been ordered for the Klamath district, it was announced by AFL's organizer, Joe Boyd, Saturday.

Employees of the Big Lakes Box company's Canby mill will vote within thirty days of an NLRB order dated April 24, 1941, Boyd revealed, as to whether or not they wished to be represented by the AFL-Lumber and Sawmill workers' union.

Ninety-six workers are eligible to cast ballots, Boyd said.

of the Atlantic as safe as possible for British convoys—but without actually assigning U. S. ships to convoy duty.

Senator Hill (D-Ala.), the administration whip, asserted that American convoys are necessary in order to get United States

war materials and food to Britain.

Hill expressed the view that the use of convoys "would not mean at all that we would send an expeditionary force abroad." He said there was now no place to land an expeditionary force in Europe and added: "Our problem is to supply the British—why send additional men over there to be supplied?"

At his press conference yesterday, President Roosevelt said that American naval patrols would be operated anywhere in the seven seas necessary for the protection of the western hemisphere.

Naval experts expected this action would enable the British to release a number of warships from convoy duty out of western hemisphere ports.

Barbara Roach, about 12 years of age, daughter of R. Roach of Pelican City, suffered painful bruises about the body when she fell from a moving truck near Klamath Falls early Saturday afternoon.

The girl was rushed to Hillside hospital where she received treatment and her injuries reported not serious. Barbara was seated in the back of the truck at the time of the accident.
