The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore a lace gown fashioned with a sweetheart neck line, puffed sleeves which fit snugly at the wrist, a close fitting bodice with a long full skirt ending in a sweeping train. The bride's full length illusion net veil with lace inserts was held at the head with a coronet of seed pearls. Her flowers of lilies of the valley and a single orchid were arranged on a white prayer book.
