

Spring Musicale of Interest in Klamath

Henri Arcand of Portland Presents Program of Modern Music Before Library Club Members

The annual spring musicale of the Woman's club is always an outstanding event in this city's musical season. This year the club was fortunate in securing Henri Arcand, Portland, one of the most talented and brilliant pianists of the western coast. A large and interested audience greeted Mr. Arcand in the library auditorium on Monday afternoon, and left no doubt by their enthusiastic reception of his playing, of their enjoyment of his renditions.

Mr. Arcand is most versatile, and is equally at home in both classical and ultra-modern music. Monday's program dealt solely with the modern school, and Mr. Arcand's comments on each composer, and his work, added greatly to the pleasure of his listeners. He warned his audience against harshness in judging unusual forms and harmonies and bade them bear in mind that these composers of the ultra-modern school have in large measure departed from the idea of developing themes, and using only consonances, and like our modern painters, are endeavoring to depict moods and impressions, and they freely use dissonances to create their effects. This was especially shown in "Fireworks" by Debussy.

Mr. Arcand's technique is faultless and sparkling, and the difficulties of execution which these moderns display, were easily disposed of by him. Each number on the program is deserving of special mention, but perhaps one of the most characteristic and enjoyable was "Brouillards" by Debussy, the most-played and best known of the moderns. This charming composition gave the impression of swirling fog, with occasional voices rising from it. The climax of the afternoon was of course MacDowell's tremendous Sonata Eroica. Our greatest American composer is heard all too infrequently, and Mr. Arcand's performance of this masterpiece was truly splendid. At the close of the program, he graciously reported, by request, the last movement of this Sonata. Mention should be made of the whimsical Polka by Shostakovich, which had to be played a second time for its delighted audience. As one of his encores, Mr. Arcand played Chopin's Valse in F minor with poetic feeling and delicacy.
