

KLAMATH-LAKE ENDEAVORERS CLAIM HONORS

Klamath-Lake Christian Endeavor union was awarded the Paul Brown achievement cup most coveted of Oregon Christian Endeavor honors, at the final session of the state convention here Sunday.

It was the third successive year that the Klamath-Lake Endeavorers have carried off the Brown trophy. Outstanding work in entertaining the state convention was factor in the triumph this year, it was indicated.

The Philadelphia cup, given for the best entry in the annual parade, went to the Marion union. Local Endeavorers do not compete in the parade contest.

Endeavorers from all parts of the state began homeward trips Sunday evening and Monday morning, following a busy three days at what was declared to be one of the most successful state conventions in the Oregon union's 51 years of existence. It was reported that 495 outsiders were assigned to housing through the central housing committee, while about 100 others made their own arrangements or stayed with friends. Altogether, registration totaled about 1200.

An event of Sunday was installation of state officers, in charge of Mrs. Reba Rickman of California, international society lookout and extension superintendent.

Worship and decision services occurred at the final day's sessions. Dr. Luther Steis, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Glendale, Calif., conducted the decision ceremonies in the afternoon at the high school auditorium. Young people throughout the audience arose to signify steps they have taken in personal Christian life and Endeavor work.

Next year's convention goes to Eugene. The Lane county seat competed with Klamath for the 1941 convention, and when Klamath won it was generally agreed Eugene could have the 1942 meet if it wanted it. The Eugene delegates served notice they wanted it.

Saturday night at 6 o'clock more than 800 delegates and members of the Klamath-Lake union, host group, sat down in the high school gymnasium to the largest banquet ever served in Klamath Falls.

Veldon Diment was director of ceremonies in a program of merry mood at the banquet. Special numbers were provided by the male quartet of the Pratum Mennonite church, and Arthur Montanic, who is one of the delegates from the Tullula mission, sang "The Holy City." He was accompanied by Gwendolyn Ramsey.

In hilarious 'share the wealth' numbers several of the gentlemen involuntarily contributed their neckties to a good cause. In another Claude Neely, the popular song leader of the convention received the benefits of special treatment.

At the evening session the president, Marjory Boon, spoke for the convention in presenting a wrist watch as a token of appreciation to Walter L. Myers who is retiring as field secretary after six years of service.

Premiums were presented by chairmen of the various divisions assisted by C. C. Jenkins, 4-H club agent, and C. A. Henderson, Klamath county agricultural agent.

The style revue, participated in by girls from all over the county modeling in outfits which they made themselves, was directed by Mrs. John Hayden and judged by Mrs. Mary E. Long and Mrs. Winnifred Gillen. 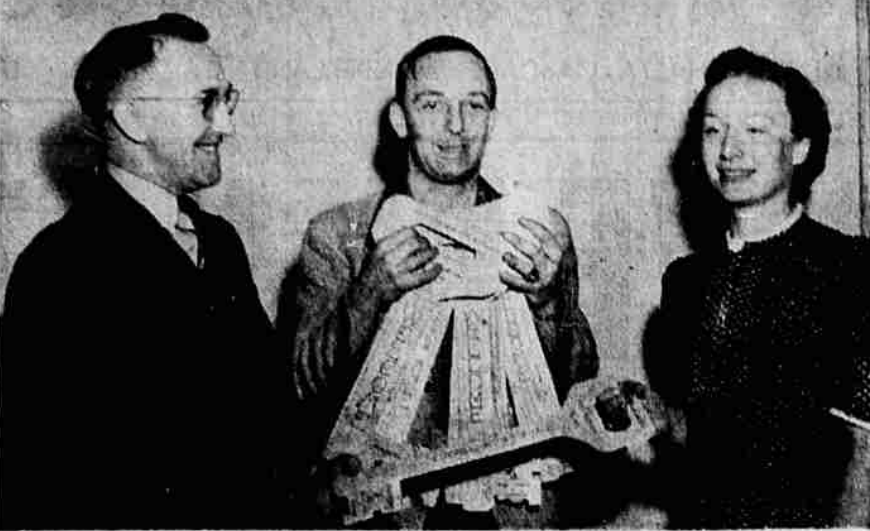

BRITAIN TURNS TO U. S. FROM GREEK DEFEAT

the air to become very fierce, varied and widespread.

"The war may spread eastwards to Turkey and Russia. The Germans may lay their hands for a time upon wheat lands of the Ukraine and oil wells of the Caucasus."

"But there is one thing which is certain: Hitler cannot find safety in avenging justice in the east, middle east, or far east. In order to win this war he must either conquer this land by invasion or he must cut the ocean lifeline which joins us to the United States."

My Dear Mr. Roosevelt: Your remarks at White House press conference on April 25 involving my reserve commission in the United States army air corps, has of course disturbed me greatly. I had hoped that I might exercise my right as an American citizen, to place my viewpoint before the people of my country in time of peace without giving up the privilege of serving my country as an air corps officer in the event of war.

But since you, in your capacity as president of the United States and commander in chief of the army, have clearly implied that I am no longer of use to this country as a reserve officer, and in view of other implications that you, my president and my superior officer, have made concerning my loyalty to my country, my character, and my motives, I can see no honorable alternative to tendering my resignation as colonel in the United States army air corps reserve. I am, therefore, forwarding my resignation to the secretary of war.

I take this action with the utmost regret, for my relationship with the air corps is one of the things that has meant most to me in life. I place it second only to my right as a citizen to speak freely to my fellow countrymen, and to discuss with them the issues of war and peace which confront our nation in this crisis.

I will continue to serve my country to the best of my ability as a private citizen.

President Roosevelt, at his press conference last Friday, asserted that it was dumb to consider a Nazi victory inevitable and classed Col. Lindbergh with appeasers who urged peace during the Revolutionary and Civil wars on the grounds that those wars could not be won.

Lindbergh has been a colonel in the air corps reserve since 1927, the year of his New York-Paris flight.

His last appointment was in 1937 after the passage of the recent air corps act. Appointments are renewed every five years. His present appointment would have expired in 1942.

He has been on active duty with the air corps three times, first in 1925 while a captain.

He has been on active duty with the air corps three times, first in 1925 while a captain.
