Home Perils

A great life insurance company has recently made a survey of 117,000 accidents with the resulting decision—that accidents don't "just happen"—they are committed. Our annual automobile slaughter kills only 5% more than home accidents. Our industrial accidents total only a little more than half of the home accidents. And here are a few of the things to watch out for.

Anchor those slippery rugs. And fix the worn spots and curling edges on all your rugs. Light your stairs; poor illumination is a great source of stair-tumbles. And the average stair fall costs \$132 for doctors' bills. Put a vacuum mat in your bath tub and a hand rail beside it. Strike matches AWAY from you—not toward you. Wield a knife likewise. Keep kitchen knives in a rack—not jumbled in a drawer. Get a good step-ladder and use it instead of a tottery chair when you want to reach up to something. Keep pot handles turned away from the edge of the stove. Mop up spilled grease at once. Don't delay. You might forget it. Put broken glass in a box—don't throw it loose into the trash basket. Don't leave a chair or any other piece of furniture in the normal path of travel through a room. Don't handle electric fixtures with wet hands. Open ALL the doors of the oven, to ventilate it, before lighting it. Never burn a gas or oil stove in a closed room. Have at least one door open. Check up on your own home and your own habits in these particulars. It may save you serious trouble. Visit Memory Garden.

Transportation News

REPORT LISTS TAX PAID BY RAILROAD

Out of every dollar received by the Great Northern railway for transportation last year, taxes took more than 12 cents, F. J. Gavin, president, states in the company's annual report to stockholders.

Due to the sharp rise in taxes, Gavin reports that the Great Northern's net railway operating income for 1941 was less than for the years, 1935, 1936 and 1937, despite larger operating revenues in 1940 than for any year since 1930.

The report shows that the railroad's taxes reached a new all-time high of \$12,273,208. This is nearly double its taxes of five years ago and 21 per cent more than in 1939. The railroad paid 53 different kinds of taxes, the largest of which were state and county, federal income, pensions and unemployment.

As compared with the dividend of 50 cents a share paid to stockholders last year, the company's taxes equaled \$4.91 per share of its capital stock. To provide better equipment for shippers of lumber and grain particularly, 2000 50-ton box cars were placed in service last year and the same number ordered for delivery this year.

The Great Northern had an increase of 13 per cent in shipments of lumber and lumber products last year. Carload shipments of potatoes increased 41 per cent. The company's apple traffic was about the same as during the previous year. Livestock loadings increased slightly.

The GN's revenues from railway operations last year totaled \$101,743,146, an increase of \$9,959,773 over 1939. Operating expenses, taxes, and rental charges were \$79,936,082, an increase of \$7,737,304. Interest and other fixed charges totaled \$14,212,128. Net income representing a return of 3.58 per cent on investment, was \$10,208,194, an increase of \$1,521,769.

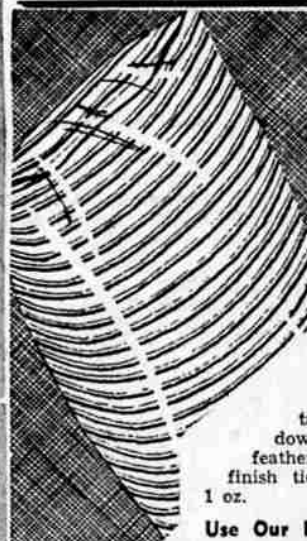

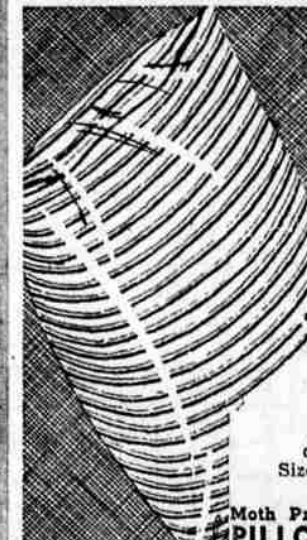
