MacMitchell Leads NYU To Penn Win

PHILADELPHIA, April 28—(U.P.)—Little Leslie MacMitchell, a lithe, dark-haired lad who learned his running on the sidewalks of New York, ran his heart out on Franklin Field Saturday to lead New York University to the 47th annual Penn relay championship over a group of speed kings from Indiana.

His breath-taking mile as anchor man on the four-mile relay team gave the Violets their third relay victory and the triumph necessary to win the mythical title—decided on the basis of relay races alone.

But there was a blue ribbon for Indiana, too, for the Big Ten champions took two relay

crowns and two individual events during the two-day meet. North Texas State Teachers made the only successful title defense when its four fast sprinters combined for a 1.27 mark in the 880 relay. Navy finished second while NYU, without Mac-Mitchell, finished third.

Pelican Nine Downs Rogues

Jump Mark

UO Boy Leaps 6'10 25-32";
USC Whips UCLA, Olympic
Club; Cal Beat Stanford

EUGENE, April 28 (AP)—Les Steers, whose 6-foot-10 25-32 inch leap Saturday bettered the world's outdoor high jump record, will compete in the Los Angeles relays May 24.

Coach Bill Hayward said Steers would appear in the high jump event there against his leading Pacific coast rival, John Wilson of the University of Southern California.

SEATTLE, April 28 (UP)—Lean-shanked Les Steers, University of Oregon high jumper, who has been threatening the world outdoor mark ever since his prep days, succeeded Saturday with a leap of 6 feet 10 25-32 inches as his teammates bowed to the University of Washington 88 to 45 in a dual track and field meet.

On his second try, Steers surpassed the mark established in 1937 by Mel Walker of Ohio State University. Then he set the bar at seven feet but on three tries failed to clear the height. A measurement correction by AAU officials credited Steers with a fraction of an inch more than the originally-announced height of 6 feet 10 1/2 inches. The old record set by Walker was 6 feet 9 1/2 inches.

MEMORIAL COLISEUM, LOS ANGELES, Calif., April 28 (UP)—University of Southern California's track and field team Saturday ran away with a triangular meet against University of California at Los Angeles and Olympic club of San Francisco, scoring 86.7 points to 37.9 for the northern team and 10.4 for UCLA.

Biggest upset of the meet was the defeat of Cornelius Warmerdam, the Olympic club's unofficial world record holder, in the pole vault. Warmerdam placed second to Bill Schaefer of USC who won with a leap of 14 feet 6 inches.

BERKELEY, Calif., April 28 (UP)—University of California won all 15 events and established five new meet records to defeat Stanford University 97 1/2 to 33 1/2 in a brilliant series of field and track performances in their annual meet Saturday.

California, rated "the second best team in the United States" behind USC, completely dominated the meet and scored upset after upset in the Bears' most decisive victory over Stanford since Brutus Hamilton took over the coaching job in 1933. Ten thousand fans saw the meet at Edwards stadium.

Henley Grade School Wins County Meet

Henley grade school track team compiled 62-15 points Saturday to win the annual Klamath county grade school track meet, held at the county fairgrounds. The meet was held in conjunction with the 4-H spring fair.

Altamont junior high school was second with 49 1/2 points, while Chiloquin placed third with 42 1/2 points. Other schools and their respective points were: Keno, 35; Fairhaven, 12; Malin, 11; Sprague River, 4-4-5; Merrill, 1 point.

Henley won seven firsts, two seconds, six thirds and four fourths, being pressed closely throughout the meet by Altamont which won three firsts, seven seconds, four thirds and five fourths.

Two boys tied for individual scoring honors: C. Cheney, Henley, and C. Downing, Keno, each scoring 11 1/2 points.

Scoring eight runs in the first three innings on seven walks, three hits and two errors, Klamath's State league Pelicans went on to take a 9-6 decision from Medford's Southern Oregon league entry, the Rogues, Sunday afternoon at Recreation park in the initial practice tilt of the 1941 baseball season.

It remained for Manager Paul "Hoosier" Hoffard of the invaders, however, to provide the thrill of the day for 300 partisan fans when he poled out a four-run 350-foot homer over the right-centerfield fence in the third frame to tie up the score at 5-5. The veteran Medford outfielder, said to be better than 50 years of age, sent the second pitch offered him by Pitcher George Burdick of the Pelicans sailing on its way to clear the 10-foot barrier by about five feet. Teammates Gitzen, Hoffman and Dick Lewis were on the base paths at the time.

This is the week the east and west meet for the first frantic showdown of the infant major league campaign and the two circuits cleared their decks for action over the weekend by elevating a pair of new leaders—the Cleveland Indians and St. Louis Cardinals.

The intersectional strife was scheduled for a fitting start today at Brooklyn with the world champion Cincinnati Reds colliding with the Dodgers as a sort of signal rocket for the full fire of battles that will be set off tomorrow.

The Reds completed their divisional dynamiting Sunday with a 3-2 triumph over the Pittsburgh Pirates as Bucky Walters bested Rip Sewell in a pitching duel.

The Dodgers, after dropping their first three games to the New York Giants, have captured ten of their last 11 contests and bumped the Giants out of the National League lead with a 7-5 decision Sunday. This was Hugh Casey's third straight victory, all at the expense of the Giants.

The Cardinals, who will invade the Giants' polo grounds Tuesday, nailed down their fifth triumph in six starts Sunday with an 8-5 conquest of the Chicago Cubs. The St. Louis slugger pounded four Chicago chukkers for 13 hits, including a triple and a double by John Mize.

In Sunday's other National League encounter the Boston Bees snapped out of their losing streak with an 8-3 decision over the pitiful Phillies. Sailor Bill Posedel held the tailenders to three hits and had a shutout till Ben Warren homered with two on in the ninth.

Cleveland gained the American League by nipping out the Detroit Tigers 2-1 while the Washington Senators ambushed the New York Yankees 6-3. In the spectacular mound struggle at Cleveland, Schoolboy Rowe gave only five hits to six Tigers collected off Bob Feller.

The Chicago White Sox shaded the St. Louis Browns 7-6 by getting 15 hits to the Browns' 12. Bill Dietrich survived the full nine innings for his third straight win.

The Boston Red Sox and Philadelphia Athletics were rained out.

Big Tourney Scheduled
For Friday; Locals Take
Three Places at Alturas

Activity Monday was thrown into sudden high gear for this weekend's big 20-30 track meet at Klamath high's Modoc field.

The tourney, which stands out as the only cinder competition in the city this spring attracting outside schools, will be held Friday night. Preliminaries are scheduled for Friday afternoon.

The local 20-30 club, which decided to stage the tourney when plans for the annual Lions' club meet fell through, promises a colorful show program to support track and field events.

Opening the card will be an Oly, pic-sty parade with all athletes marching on the field behind the Klamath high band. Awards will be presented by the queen and four princesses chosen from the high school student body.

Prizes will be in the shape of a trophy to each individual winner, a medal to second place men, and ribbons to third, fourth and fifth place winners. A huge team trophy will go to the title-winning school.

Thus far entered in the meet are most southern Oregon schools and a great many from northern California. Probably the most outstanding performer will be Medford's "Racin' Ray" Johnson, an ace quarter-mile who has been threatening the national 440 mark.

ALTURAS, April 28 (Special) Four records were shattered in the high school annual relay races held here Saturday. This was the twelfth annual track event sponsored by the 20-30 club of Alturas to which all schools in southern Oregon and northern California are invited to compete.

Smelter of Adin ran the 880 in 2:15.9, the old record being 2:19.7. In the football throw, White of Dorris beat the former record of 166 feet with a throw of 170 feet 1 inch. Alois of the Lassen high of Susanville beat the shotput record of 51 feet 8 inches, with a heave of 53 feet 4 inches. These were all in the "B" class events. Don Linville of Modoc high ran the 440 in :53.4.

Modoc won the event with 73 points, Lakeview was second with 55 1/2 points and Lassen took third with 44 1/2 points. McCreary of Modoc took the individual honors when he copped three firsts. A dance held in the high school gym in the evening furnished the visitors entertainment after the day's grind.

Three Klamath trackmen placed in the Alturas meet Saturday out of 22 Pelican secondary lads who made the trip south.

Jack Gillette coped a first in the "A" class high jump with a leap of 5 feet 8 inches for the only Klamath win. In the 440 Ken Aber pushed into a second place as a new record of :53.4 was being set. Vallaincour took fourth in the 220.

Lopsided series results sharply altered the complexion of the Pacific Coast baseball league race.

Each loser of six games out of seven, Seattle dropped from second place to fourth, Oakland from fifth to seventh and Los Angeles from sixth to last.

Corresponding gains were made by Hollywood and San Francisco, and even by Portland, although the Beavers, in achieving against San Diego one of their recently rare series victories, captured only the odd game.

Sacramento, league leader at the start of last week by a moderately comfortable margin, moved practically out of the sight of even its closest pursuers.

Three weekend victories culminated Sacramento's rout of Seattle. Starting with Saturday's 2-0 shutout by Tony Freitas, they pinned a pair of 8-7 and 8-3

decisions on the staggering Rainiers Sunday.

Seattle, blanked by Bill Schmidt for seven innings in the opener, rallied for nine hits and seven runs in the final two frames but still fell short as the senators, too, contrived a last-chance counter to keep ahead. Buster Adams, Sacramento home run expert, produced one of his specialties in the seventh with a man ahead.

Doubleheader success against San Diego Sunday, 5-0 and 6-3, clinched the series for the Portland Beavers, whose four victories in a week doubled their total for the year to date and lifted them from eighth place to sixth.

San Diego, which remained in second place although forced to share the spot with zooming Hollywood, won Saturday's game, 11-0, on three runs in the last inning.

Two reasonably tight Sunday games, 5-2 and 3-2, followed a 6-4 Saturday decision to give Hollywood a weekend sweep over Los Angeles.

San Francisco breezed past Oakland and into fifth place on Sunday's 6-1 and 6-3 double victory.

Seattle Star Cracks Swim Mark

SEATTLE, April 28 (U.P.)—Bruce Donaldson, young Seattle swimming sensation, cracked his own far western 100-yard free style record Saturday night as Washington Athletic club of Seattle captured the Pacific northwest swimming championship.

Donaldson set a new mark of 53.2—three tenths of a second better than his previous effort. Pete Povilion, University of Washington freshman competing unattached, broke the northwest 220-yard free style mark with a time of 2:21.4. The old mark was 2:23.2.

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
