



RACING ROUNDUP

R. C. Woodruff, the active man behind this second year Klamath effort at horse-racing, reveals that over 200 camels have signed, with exquisite penmanship, to race here 'twixt June 11 and June 21, inclusive dates of the Klamath Jockey club meeting.

This virtually fills the local 235-horse stable capacity.

Of the owners who last fall raced at the Fairgrounds, most have re-entered — indicating satisfaction with the way the thing was run. In addition Woodruff has received entries from stablemen as far south as Phoenix, Ariz.

Thus far we have lined up — Art Gruber from San Mateo, currently racing eight head at Bay Meadows; Will McPherson from John Day, Ore.; R. G. Vantatta, Chico, M. D. Wilson, Phoenix; R. A. Hume, Bakersfield; C. C. Conley out of Red Bluff; Jack Hudson of San Mateo, now racing at Bay Meadows; and Jack Miller, owner of Fervorita which last fall paid off well and often locally.

The June meeting this summer should fare far better than the weather-hampered attempt of 1940. On that occasion, only the hardest of Klamath followers braved icy Fairgrounds winds with any degree of consistency and the consequent take was smaller than expected.

With fine weather a practical cinch, the coming meet should draw a full house through its entire run.

The executive committee of the Associated Students of the university voted unanimously last night to appropriate \$4271.95 to send the varsity and junior varsity crews to the regatta, despite previous intimations by student body officials that the fund would not be voted.

SALEM, April 30 (AP)—John Cobell, 25, Chemawa, Ore., thought things were going badly when he lost a six-round decision to "Boxcar" Cline of Portland in a boxing event here last night.

SEATTLE, April 30 (AP)—The West's best college basketball team this year, Washington State, and the University of Washington will be co-hosts to two outstanding middle west basketball fives in "double header" exhibition games here next December.

The Missouri and Kansas State fives will be here for the series December 19 and 20 at the University of Washington pavilion, Washington athletic authorities announced today. The first night Washington will play one of them, followed immediately by Washington State facing the other. The next night the two state teams will switch opponents.

"It's an experiment, but one which should be highly successful," Carl Kilgore, Washington athletic manager, said.

Whirlaway's Stock Rises Despite Blue Pair Defeat

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 30 (AP)—In spite of his defeat in the derby trial mile, Whirlaway's Kentucky Derby stock rose today as the most unusual field in the memory of the oldest inhabitant was rounded out for Saturday's 67th running of the Blue Grass classic.

Every one of the 12 horses expected to go to the post before an anticipated record crowd of 100,000 at Churchill Downs in this renewal of the chase after the rainbow of roses had a "yarn" behind him to make this the "different derby," with any colt in the race given a chance to hit the jackpot.

Whirlaway, hope of Warren Wright of Chicago, was the No. 1 question mark. No one argued his right to that title after the way he picked up half a dozen lengths to overhaul Tom Bragg's blue pair rounding the stretch turn in the trial yesterday, and then tossed away his

whole edge—and some six lengths to boot—to finish second by three-quarters of a length.

Trainer Ben Jones still was confident, however, pointing out the stretch running little chestnut with the flowing tail probably had in him half a mile of faster running than any other horse in the field, and that it was up to the jockey to unhook that speed when it counted most, in the stretch. Plain Ben was relying on Eddie Arcaro to do this Saturday, Wendell Eads, who had the leg up on the colt yesterday, had Whirlaway running outside of horses rounding the bend.

Chick's Whirler Throws McShain For Second Time

Match Sets Up Coast Title Go

Gil Knudsen Dumps Tiger Tsakoff, Belcastro Beaten in Armory Card

There'll be a world's Pacific Coast Junior Heavyweight wrestling championship bout in Klamath Falls next week — unless Dangerous Danny McShain kicks away \$100.

Balding, blonde Cowboy Dude Chick earned the singular honor of meeting Dangerous Danny for the Irishman's belt when he decisively dumped the champion last night to win the third fall of a somewhat laborious and lengthy main event on Promoter Machiavelli Lillard's regular Tuesday night grapple card.

Wins on Spin
As last week, the Cheyenne cowboy settled it with his famed airplane spin. But this time it took him over three-quarters of an hour, during which he dropped and won a fall, to hoist the curly-haired Hollywood man to his shoulders for the clincher.

From the opening bell Chick tried at odd times to apply the whirler and for a moment in the first minute it appeared the thing would be a duplicate of last week. Dude, after brief sparring, grabbed the Dangerous One's leg and half-raised McShain from the mat. Dapper Dan quickly clutched a rope, however, killing the opportunity.

Browning Spin
From then on it was even-Stephen for 16 minutes and 30 seconds of typical McShain hair-grappling. At this juncture Chick slapped on his lariat twirl—you may know it as a Browning spin—and crushed Daniel in 18:43.

The second oanto went to 14:58 before McShain tossed the ex-bulldogger on the third try with a punishing leg bar. Dude had previously missed two tired attempts at his spinning special and had been tied up consistently with a bruising hammerlock. Danny came out stomping after the second period recess but Chick quickly squashed his spark with a brace of flying shoulder butts which had half the full house streaming for the exits in the belief the McShain was finished. In this session the broad-beamed cowhand repeatedly applied a hammerlock which Danny broke by climbing the hemp ladder in one corner.

Knudsen Wins
This maneuver eventually backfired, for at 15:03 or thereabouts Chick plucked him from the top rung, pasted Dapper to his wide shoulders and spun.

As it does to most grapplers and men, the whirler ended McShain for the night.
A new and handsome Nordic face greeted local rattle fans this week when Gil Knudsen, variously reported as from Norway and Canada, appeared to battle Tiger Tsakoff, the aging Bulgarian wheelhorse, in the opening go.

Ash-blond Gil survived one Australian round of Nenoff's strictly back alley style before trying the ludicrous Balkanite into headlong spin. He neatly finished it with a Boston crab, the combination muddling Tiger so badly Referee Pete Becker handed the laurel to Knudsen.

Klamath's old friend, Pulverizing Pete Belcastro, surprising showed up to grapple in the middle go against Gus Johnson, Pete, substituting for Prince Nihalakis, bowed to Durable Gus on a foul in the fourth heat after each grappler had won a fall.

Cleveland held on to the leader's spot by downing the Philadelphia Athletics, 8-3, on 15 hits, including Lou Boudreau's homer with none on in the eighth.

Johnny Gorsica outpitched Bob Grove and Mickey Harris to give the Detroit Tigers a 5-3 decision over the Boston Red Sox.

Lefty Thornton won his second victory of the year as the Chicago White Sox climbed up into second place via a 3-2 win over the Washington Senators.
