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NAZI CONSULATE AT S. F. GUARDED

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1 (AP) — After two anonymous threats were made to bomb the new German consulate, a heavy police detail Wednesday guarded movement of the consulate from downtown offices to new headquarters in an exclusive residential section.

Police Inspector Sidney Du Bose, head of the crime prevention detail, said neither the police nor the consulate regarded the threats seriously, but that the police would take no chances.

He said Chancellor Herman Loeper of the consulate reported receiving two anonymous telephone calls threatening to "bomb that place out on Jackson street," if the consulate moved in the face of protest by some residents of the area.

The consulate made arrangements to move when its former lease in the business section was cancelled after two U. S. navy sailors, on leave and in plain clothes, ripped down the swastika flying from the tenth floor offices.

DuBose headed a squad of 15 patrolmen guarding the old and new consulates while a number of police patrol cars watched trucks along the route.

Body of Woman Found After Spill From Speedboat

RICHMOND, Calif., May 1 (UP) — Mystery surrounding the discovery of a motorboat with its four passengers missing last Sunday was partially dispelled today when the body of Mrs. Bernyce River was recovered from a sand spit in San Francisco bay near the Ford Motor company plant.

Mrs. River, 25, was one of the four persons who embarked in the craft from Oakland. Also missing, and feared drowned, were J. P. River, Oakland policeman, her husband; Les Croux, 27, Oakland, former St. Mary's football player, and his wife, Marie, 25.

Cornor C. L. Abbott, who said Mrs. River's body had been identified positively by Alfred E. Chaix, a fellow employee, declared there were no marks of violence. He ordered an autopsy to determine cause of death.

George Dyer, Piedmont, and Bert Nelson, Oakland, found the body near a rock wall section of the bay breakwater. It required three hours to retrieve the body.

The empty 18-foot motorboat in which the party had been for a cruise, was found Sunday afternoon by the coast guard in the Oakland estuary. Search by coast guard ships and planes had proved fruitless. Authorities believed the four may have been pulled overboard by a fouled anchor line or thrown into the bay when the boat hit an obstruction or the wash of another craft.

Pan-American Announces Extension of Air Service

NEW YORK, May 1 (UP) — Pan-American Airways is extending its trans-Pacific air service from Manila to Singapore, beginning May 2, it was announced Wednesday night.

The new service, to which Britain gave assent some time ago, will add 1500 miles to the company's present lines and will cut straight across the China sea over an area now dominated by the Japanese navy.

It will link San Francisco and Singapore directly for the first time in history and will bring the great British naval base days nearer the continental United States.

Pan-American Airways said that the order of the civil aeronautics authority, signed by the president, stated that "The current world conditions and the importance to the United States of the Malay and The Netherlands East Indies (in the Singapore area) require the establishment

of this service in the public interest."

Immediately upon receipt of this order, Pan-American said, it was announced that service over the new, extended route would be inaugurated with the scheduled clipper departure from San Francisco on May 2.

The existing service to Hong Kong will be maintained, alternate weekly flights being made to the Hong Kong and Singapore terminals.

Clippers will make the flight from Manila to Singapore in about 6½ hours compared to approximately a week required by present steamer services.

The new service, it was said, will bring Singapore, one of the great trade centers of the far east, within a little more than five days from the United States. It will provide the first direct access to the Straits Settlements and British India, on the north, and on the south to



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Borneo, Java and other islands of The Netherlands East Indies.

Observers recalled that British air service between Hong Kong and Singapore, formerly linked by Imperial Airways, was halted following the Japanese occupation of parts of French Indo-China last fall. Hong Kong was thus partly isolated.

Japanese have been following proposals for the Singapore-U. S. A. service and have said that beginning of actual flights would mark another step in American efforts to defend British interests in southeast Asia.

Bank Clearance Shows Increase

PORTLAND, May 1 (AP) — April business indices for Portland Wednesday revealed a 37 per cent increase in bank clearings over last year and a 22 per cent boost in building permit values.

The Portland branch of the Federal Reserve bank reported April clearings at \$195,174,885 compared to \$142,275,849 in April of 1940. Residential construction within the city reached \$703,720 compared to \$567,150 last year.

Foreign exports doubled dur-

ing April over March. Total exports attained \$3,397,234 compared to March's \$1,829,196.

Testimony on Poison Introduced in Seattle Trial

SEATTLE, May 1 (AP) — Seventy-two-year-old Jay Allen testified Wednesday that Mrs. Margaret Gable, who is suing him for \$250,000 for breach of promise, frequently tried to convince him members of his family were trying to poison him.

Before a courtroom crowded with women spectators, Allen, prominent attorney, concentrated on details of statements given the jury earlier by the 58-year-old former saleswoman and demonstrator. He denies he ever asked her to marry him, during an acquaintance which began more than 30 years ago. "I told her that was nonsense — pure bosh," Allen said. "But one day she handed me a book on poisons which mentioned the symptoms of various kinds of poisons, including arsenic. She had underlined a portion, which she thought would indicate my symptoms. . . .

"She used to tell me they

wanted to get rid of me to get my share of the estate."

Defense Attorney John F. Walthew introduced in evidence a sheaf of florists bills, indicating Allen had purchased more than \$500 worth of flowers since 1934, only a small portion of which were flowers for Mrs. Gable.

Allen denied he ever told a hotel woman here that she was to give Mrs. Gable anything she wanted while living there. "Did you ever tell her about the relationship between you and Mrs. Gable?" the attorney asked.

"I never told her or anyone else," Allen responded. "I was not proud of it and I didn't want her to be proud of it, either."

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FORBIDDEN ENTRY
