RECLAMATION PLAN INCLUDES KLAMATH

WASHINGTON, May 1 (AP)—A \$78,934,000 appropriation to accelerate western reclamation project developments during the fiscal year starting July 1 was recommended to the house Wednesday by its appropriations committee.

The committee, in a report filed by Chairman Taylor (D-Colo.), described the amount as probably the largest ever proposed for reclamation work, but said it was "fully justified by the tremendous importance of reclamation to the national defense program."

The sum was \$5,741,000 over that appropriated for the current year and \$4,200,000 under budget estimates.

Largest cut was one of \$4,000,000 in a \$38,750,000 item suggested for the California Central Valley project by President Roosevelt. The \$4,000,000 was to have been used to start construction of a steam stand-by power plant, but the committee asserted its installation would be a departure from established policy and recommended further consideration before favorable action was taken.

Other reductions included elimination of \$500,000 for construction of transmission lines from the Fort Peck, Mont., project, the committee reporting that inasmuch as power would not be available until 1944 work on the lines could be postponed.

Appropriations for new construction recommended included:

Grand Coulee dam, Wash., \$8,000,000; Boulder dam, \$5,000,000; All-American and Coachella canals, Calif., \$2,000,000; Yakima project (Rosa division), Wash., \$300,000, an increase of \$200,000 over budget estimates; Yakima project (Sunnyside division), \$100,000; Boise project (Arrowrock division), Ida., \$750,000; Boise project (Payette division), \$350,000; Sun River, Mont., \$50,000.

Deschutes project, Ore., \$400,000; Owyhee project, Ore., \$100,000; Klamath project, Ore., \$200,000; Ogden River, Utah, \$60,000; Provo River, Utah, \$1,250,000.
