CORVALLIS, May 1 (AP)—By a margin of more than four to one, though with only a light turnout, Corvallis voters yesterday approved a \$75,000 bond issue for construction of a municipal airport. The vote was 775 to 165.

MAYOR URGES DEFENSE BOND SUPPORT HERE

"We must all lend our financial support to our government in its tremendous effort to build up the defense of our country," said Mayor John Houston as he purchased the first defense bond from George McIntyre, assistant cashier of the Klamath Falls branch of The First National Bank of Portland.

United States Savings bonds of the defense series are being placed on sale at banks and post offices throughout the country today. These new bonds are payable 10 and 12 years from date of issue at par and are sold on a discount basis. The series E issue are in denominations of \$25, \$50, \$100, \$500 and \$1000. The sale price of these bonds respectively are \$18.75, \$37.50, \$75, \$375 and \$750 and will yield approximately 2.9 per cent if held to maturity.

Henry Morgenthau Jr., secretary of the treasury, states the full faith and credit of the United States government is pledged for payment of both principal and interest on these bonds. For the small thrift purchaser, postal savings stamps in denomination of 10 cents up will also be put on sale May 1.

The public is urged to subscribe to these issues. Said Mayor Houston, "I am sure that the citizens of Klamath Falls and Klamath county will be found doing their share in the buying of these bonds."

CAVES EXPLORED IN SHASTA AREA

District Ranger M. E. Barron, Assistant Ranger R. W. Gardner, Protective Assistant Arthur H. Cooper, and Mrs. Cooper, of the Sacramento district, Shasta national forest, spent last Sunday exploring the lava caves in the vicinity of Sheep Rock on the lower north slopes of Mt. Shasta. The caves visited were Pluto's Cave, Devil's Kitchen, Whirl Cave, Moore Cave, Temple Cave and the Cedar Cave. These caves are of unusual interest in that they have many extensive underground channels and large rooms. From outward appearance one cannot appreciate the extent of the underground network.

The Shasta national forest is preparing necessary signs to direct the visiting public to the area and it is felt that they will become quite popular to those interested in these ancient geologic formations. Anyone interested in locating these caves should stop at the office of the district ranger at Dunsmuir for directional information.
