

PEACE TERMS OF JAPS ONLY FEELER, CLAIM

One of the most extraordinary documents of the war is the "abstract exploration" of peace terms published editorially by the Japan Times-Advertiser of Tokyo, an influential newspaper which reputedly speaks often with the tongue of the Japanese foreign office.

The terms are in the language of the axis—Napoleonic in scope and definitely those of conquerors. The United States and Britain in effect are relegated to the position of defeated nations, the newspaper calmly blinking the fact that this country is a non-belligerent.

That this is an axis-sanctioned peace-feeler is obvious.

The "exploration" coolly, and without so much as "by your leave," divides the world into spheres of influence on the principle that the stronger powers must get the greatest opportunities for developing the world. Might makes right, or words to that effect. The paper used Hitler's spheres of influence for the triple alliance—Germany, Italy and Japan—as the basis for its speculations.

The powers which would rule the world are Germany, with Italy as "junior partner" (what-ever that means, and one can only assume it forecasts a hard back-seat for Rome), Japan, Russia, the United States and the British empire. France, crushed and helpless, is no longer a power. On thumb-nail the suggestions in part run something like this:

Europe, the Near East and northern Africa would be assigned to Herr Hitler. England would remain the seat of the British empire, but authority would be transferred gradually to Canada—England presumably being shunted into the position of a fourth-rate power.

Britain would clear out of the Mediterranean altogether, leaving it to the fuhrer and his "junior partner." The great British naval bases in the Mediterranean and the Far East would be demilitarized.

The American bases in the Pacific also would be demilitarized. Our sphere of influence would be the western hemisphere, but Germany, Japan and Italy would be granted an open door to South America. There would be naval parity all around.

There is more of the scheme, but taken as a whole it presents a picture of a dominant axis, which would grow stronger with each passing year because of its special facilities. The great central figure—the world leader—in this combination of power naturally would be Herr Hitler.

This "exploration" has no value as the basis for peace negotiations, of course. Neither Britain nor the United States would give the terms a second glance. The proposals are both interesting and important, however, as showing the objectives of the axis powers, and their desire to secure peace if they can get the big end of the deal.

RETAIL SALES SOAR TO ALL-TIME PEAK

NEW YORK, May 2 (AP)—Sales at retail stores, riding the broadening wave of rising consumer spending, soared this week to the highest levels in history for this time of year, Dun & Bradstreet reported today.

The credit agency said that while all reports compiled thus far are preliminary, subject to later correction, flash reports indicated sales in many categories of goods were topping 1929 spring figures, with the general average paralleling the pace of 1929 spending.

"A persistent demand for seasonal merchandise, along with exceptional interest in home furnishings and durable items, ran up another record week for retailers," the agency said. "Store reports frequently described activity as 'good and getting better.'"

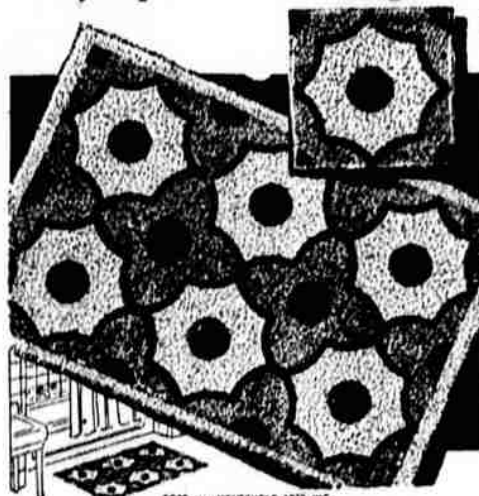
"Biggest gains were being registered in lower and medium-priced ranges but the expansion was said to be general throughout all price lines and all types of merchandise."

Sales averaged 15 to 20 per cent above last year for the country as a whole, the agency estimated, adding:

"According to wholesalers, many retail buyers who started out with what they considered full spring requirements were already back in the market to replenish stocks. Delivery continued a major problem, becoming slower rather than better in a number of lines."

Prepare Your Chicken Carefully To Get Most Tender Results

The fried chicken season begins. So let's brush up on our cooking lessons.

Cutting Up Chicken for Frying

Clean thoroughly. Cut off neck very close to the body. Trim off other end of neck neatly, cutting off the dried portion. Remove oil sac, taking care not to puncture, and clean this part out well. Remove feet, following directions given above. Remove the thigh and drumstick together. For this, hold the leg away from the body and cut through the center of the flesh between the two. Now pull the thigh back, snapping the joint. Cut through at this point. Remove the other leg the same way.

In larger chickens the thigh is separated from the drumstick. This is rather a trick performance. Bend the two leg pieces together, cut right through the center to the joint, now bend backwards and snap the joint. Cut through and the pieces are separated. Snap the wings back and remove them by cutting through the joint. After washing them well and removing all pin feathers, fold them neatly together. Separate the lower half of the body from the upper half.

If the chicken has not been drawn it can be done now easily. Divide the lower half into two pieces by cutting between the rib and backbone. Split the breastbone in half. Clean the giblets. Clean the gizzard by making a cut through the outer muscle just to the inner sac. Remove this and discard. Trim the top of the heart. Remove the small greenish sac from the liver, using extreme care not to break it. Wash all pieces carefully in cold water, watching for any pin feathers that may have escaped notice before.

That's the advice Helen Robertson gives in her new enlarged edition of the "Merry Mixer Cook Book." It's a first-rate guide to American cookery and would make a welcome gift to the June bride. Here is Miss Robertson's fried chicken recipe:

Fried Chicken
Allow 40 to 60 minutes for chicken to fry. At cooking time, rub each piece with salt and pepper and dredge with flour. In a heavy frying pan melt 2 tablespoons butter and 2 of lard or similar fat. You will want enough fat to cover the bottom of the pan well. Have it hot, but not smoking. Put in the large pieces first, brown on one side, turn and brown on the other; place the smaller pieces as space can be arranged for them.

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PETAIN CALLS FOR SOCIAL CHANGES

COMMENTARY, France, May 2 (AP)—Chief of State Petain called on the workers of France Thursday to establish a syndical industrial structure.

"Abandoning altogether the principle of the individual isolated against the state, and abandoning the practice of worker and employer coalitions lined up against each other," he said in a May day speech, "it (the new social order) institutes new groups including all members of one trade—employers, technicians and workers."

When the crowd cheered at the end of his speech, the 85-year-old marshal was visibly moved, and he turned back to the radio microphone to shout, "Workers, I am counting on you."

He spoke from the balcony of the city hall while 5000 of the workers of this mining and industrial center jammed the square.

WORK ON WATER MAINS FINISHED

Work has been virtually completed on water mains and foundation of the new Copco Shasta reservoir and metal construction on the tank itself will begin soon, the power company reported Thursday.

A gravel and sand cushion has been laid for a foundation and 10 and 12-inch water mains have been laid in place to serve the huge vat which will service residents of districts east of the city.

Metal work is scheduled to start on or about May 15.

Plan to Serve Many Vegetables On Menus for School Children

Many women have asked for quantity vegetable recipes to serve on school luncheon programs. Because part of our national defense program is the building of strong and vivacious children, more and more communities are serving hot lunches.

These recipes are approved for children by the Bureau of Home Economics, both for their nutrition value and low cost.

Green Salad with Hard-Cooked Eggs

(Serves 12)
Two quarts spinach or cress, chopped or shredded, 4 eggs, 2 cups salt pork, diced, or cooked smoked ham or shoulder, diced, 1 cup salad dressing.

Use tender spinach or cress. Wash through many waters, remove all roots and tough leaves, drain very thoroughly, and cut or chop. Chill, if possible.

Hard-cook the eggs. If salt pork is used, cook until crisp, and drain off the fat, keeping it for other use. Mix the crisp salt pork or the cooked, diced ham or shoulder and the greens with salad dressing. Add slices of hard-cooked egg to each serving (about 1 an egg).

Casserole of Cabbage and Apples
(Serves 12)
Four quarts cabbage, chopped, 2 quarts apples, sliced, raw, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 pound butter, 3 cups bread crumbs.

In greased baking dishes, place alternate layers of cabbage and the cored, sliced apples. Season each layer with salt, and a sprinkling of sugar and butter.

Over the last layer spread some buttered crumbs. Cover and bake in a moderate oven for about 35 minutes or until the cabbage and apples are tender. When nearly done, remove the cover so the crumbs can brown.

Panned Vegetables

Chopped cabbage, spinach, or kale may be cooked in a pan without added water. Heat a little fat or fry diced salt pork or bacon until crisp, then use the fat from that. Add the vegetable to the fat, cover closely to keep in the steam and cook for 10 to 15 minutes, stirring frequently. Season and serve. If salt pork or bacon has been used as the fat, add the crisp pieces to the vegetable before serving.

BREAKFAST: Sliced bananas in orange juice, French toast, honey, coffee, milk.

LUNCHEON: Casserole of cabbage and apples, whole wheat bread, nut cookies, tea, milk.

DINNER: Stuffed leg lamb chops, mashed potatoes, creamed leeks, sliced tomatoes and green peppers, orange tapioca cream, coffee, milk.

HUNGARY ORDERS YUGOSLAVS OUT

BUDAPEST, Hungary, May 2 (AP)—The military commander of the Hungarian-occupied part of Yugoslavia has ordered "all Serbs, Bosnians, Montenegrins, Gypsies and Jews and their descendants who were not Hungarian citizens before October 31, 1918, to move out within three days beginning at 8 a. m. May 28."

(The Hungarians reclaimed three small areas of Yugoslavia after the German dissolution of

the Kingdom created partly out of the former Austro-Hungarian empire after the World war.

(The announcement Thursday did not say where the deportees are expected to go.)

The decree made exceptions of husbands and wives of German and Hungarian nationals, women within two weeks of childbirth and persons more than 75 years old.

Those forced to leave, it said, may take only the property they can carry with them and enough money to cover their expenses.
