to make tourists Oregon conscious at the opening session held this morning.

With well over 100 registered, the junior chamber men greeted their national president, Mark Matthews of New York, Saturday morning, and plunged into a series of conferences on the state projects, in which tourist guidance work held a major place.

Tourist "Schools"

Showing of the film, "The New Oregon Trail," by Ben E. Titus, of the travel and information department of the state highway commission, set off the discussion of the tourist program. A major feature is to be a series of "schools" in communities of the state, in which people who come in contact with tourists will be given information on the attractions of their area and will be prepared to answer the questions of visitors. Portland delegates outlined plans for a huge school in that city, stating they had arranged for the Benson high school auditorium to seat the 1500 or so people expected to attend.

Ed Eggen of Portland, president of the state chamber, pointed out that every day a tourist remains in Oregon he spends at least \$5. Titus told the group that tourists now constitute the state's third largest industry, and that by a coordinated program the income from tourists can be boosted by figures that run into millions of dollars.

National President Matthews came in on the morning train on a swing around the country that has taken him 55,000 miles and to 130 cities since last July. Matthews will speak at a breakfast at 10:30 a. m. Sunday, to which the public is invited, and will be

GERMANS CAN'T INVADE U. S., SAYS EX-AIDE

SAN FRANCISCO, May 3 (AP)—The far-flung "lightning of war" has struck or isolated every German consular representative in the western hemisphere and "no one knows whether the end is in sight," Christian Zinsner, ousted German diplomat, said here Friday.

Zinsner, who asserted in an interview that "agitators unjustly charged" him with murder and forced his expulsion from Guatemala and Honduras, planned to reach Germany via the Yawata Maru, leaving this noon, and said his diplomatic passport would protect him from British seizure.

If it doesn't—"Well, I'll have to take the consequences, but British diplomats travel at sea too, you know."

The stocky Nazi, formerly a German legation attaché in Poland and Guatemala and chargé d'affaires in Honduras, expressed "great hope" the United States would not enter the war. He declared there was no necessity for such action because "our foe has said America for Americans and Europe for Europeans."

"And it would be technically impossible to invade the Americas, anyway," Zinsner said he wanted to "deny reports I am an agent of the gestapo or that I organized the fifth column on Poland. . . . I am not important."

"And anyway, the gestapo could not operate outside of Germany. It is just like your FBI which has been following me all over San Francisco. I've diplomatic immunity from search but the FBI could look into my cases if they wished. I've my clothes and that's about all."

Zinsner has been in frequent consultation with Consul General Fritz Wiedemann here for several days, but said he was not bearing important material to Berlin.

Germany Drives To Destroy French Morale, Report

LONDON, May 3—A ruthless drive by Germany to destroy reviving French morale is seen by political experts here. They hold that the chief objective of present German policy is to deprive the French people of any hope in the future other than that of complete subservience to Nazi designs.

The greatest danger on the European continent to Hitler's ambitions would be a French recovery, first moral and then

material. Accordingly the Germans insist that economic relief in the present and economic recovery in the future be entirely dependent on immediate subservience to the Reich. Cooperation cannot be made popular, but the Germans seek to make it appear a question of physical life or death.

That is why the plan which was being discussed between London and Washington for the supply of foodstuffs to unoccupied France, under strict American supervision, was deliberately wrecked by Germany through the publication in the Paris press of the barter agreement between occupied and unoccupied France, British experts declare.

Berlin's methods in dressing up the Germanization of the French empire for the edification of the French people is well illustrated by a recent broadcast from radio Paris by Marcel Deat, well known for his anti-British leanings, who said:

"Africa will be an extension of the new Europe, and perhaps a field of international cooperation. Perhaps the unity of Europe will be created in the dark continent. The purely European phase of the conflict will end quite rapidly through the elimination of Britain. The second phase will be the clean-up in Africa, and France can and must play her part. This is a type of collaboration which does not lead to war against Britain, and which is contrary to our hopes of recovery. This course opens up possibilities which no one dared to think of last June."

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ground and inflicted heavy losses on the enemy. "Before nightfall," the communiqué added, "enemy pressure relaxed and no further efforts were made during last night."

"In the Salum area one of our mechanized columns, after making a wide detour, surprised a considerable body of the enemy. A number of prisoners was captured, together with a field gun."

In Ethiopia, it reported a total of 1235 additional Italian and colonial troops captured by British troops pressing in from north and south on Amba Alaj. Walidia, 50 miles north of Dessie, has been taken, it said.

BERLIN, May 3 (AP)—The German Africa corps seized a "great number of case-mates and several hundred prisoners" in a deep penetration of Tobruk's fortifications despite stiff resistance by the British garrison in the Libyan port, the German high command reported today.

CASUALTIES IN IRAQ WAR FEW, LONDON CLAIMS

(Continued from Page One) British assertion that the Iraqis provoked the strife, said only that some Iraqis artillery had been silenced and "the fighting continues."

At the same time, a Swiss radio broadcast heard here quoted an Iraq communiqué claiming that 26 British aircraft had been destroyed on Habbaniyah airfield, a British base 80 miles west of Baghdad, and saying British motorized detachments had failed in an attempt to occupy another oilfield.

NEW YORK, May 3 (AP)—The German radio said today that the Iraq government had directed an appeal to Arabs in Palestine requesting them to take up arms.

The appeal, said to have been broadcast over the Iraq radio, declared the fight of Iraq was a general fight for the liberation of the Arabs and that it must, therefore, be conducted by all Arabs.

"The appeal of the Iraq government caused the strongest reverberations in Palestine," said the German report. "Renewed attempts on the part of the Palestine Arabs to organize resistance are therefore to be expected."

Iraq War Changes Plans at Vichy

VICHY, France, May 3 (AP)—The regular Saturday afternoon cabinet meeting of the French government was suddenly cancelled today after the unexpected departure of Vice-Premier Admiral Jean Darlan for Paris, and diplomatic circles said they believed developments in Iraq and Spain were involved in the change in plans.

It was a question of great moment in Vichy, as to what is likely to happen in her mandate to Syria in case the Germans choose that route to go to the aid of Iraq.

The news that Iraq had appealed for German aid was received here this morning.

Rodeo Buckaroo Succumbs to Heart Attack at Burbank

Word was received in Klamath Falls Saturday telling of the death of John Hugo "Hugh" Strickland, 53, former world champion cowboy, who died Thursday of a heart attack at Burbank, Calif.

Strickland performed here during Klamath Buckaroo Days last year and has long been regarded as one of the outstanding cowboys in the rodeo world. Only last Sunday he had placed third in a steer roping contest at the Saugus, Calif., rodeo.

Strickland, born in Mountain Home, Ida., first won the world crown at Cheyenne, Wyo., in 1916. He repeated several times in the next 10 years and in 1926 at Madison Square garden was awarded the Ken Maynard trophy as world champion bronco rider.
