EARL SNELL TO SPEAK HERE ON MOTHER'S DAY

The principle speaker at the Mothers' day exercises of Klamath Falls aerie and auxiliary, Fraternal Order of Eagles and other civic and fraternal groups, will be Earl Snell, prominent member of the fraternity. The exercises, to which the public is invited, will be held on Sunday, May 11, 2:30 p. m. at the Klamath Falls armory, announced M. L. Bratton, secretary of the local aerie.

The first-known public plea for a nation-wide observance of a day to honor mothers, the officer stated, was made by Past Grand Worthy President Frank E. Hering, a leader of the order.

"This address was delivered on February 7, 1904," Secretary Bratton said. "Thereafter, both Mr. Hering and other leaders of the fraternity delivered many addresses on the subject before Eagle organizations and civic and other fraternal groups throughout the country. An increasingly large number of the order's local units began to dedicate annual exercises to mother, until, in 1912, the grand aerie, or national governing body of the fraternity, passed a resolution making it mandatory for every aerie to observe Mothers' day."

"The idea quickly attracted the public interest, and many other groups joined the Eagles in supporting such a memorial day. Finally, in 1914, congress passed a resolution setting aside the second Sunday in May as a national Mothers' day."

LOS ANGELES, May 3 (UP)—The University of Southern California's polo team handed the Stanford university squad a 7-4 defeat at the Riviera Country club today in the opening game of a four game series for the California intercollegiate championship.

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
