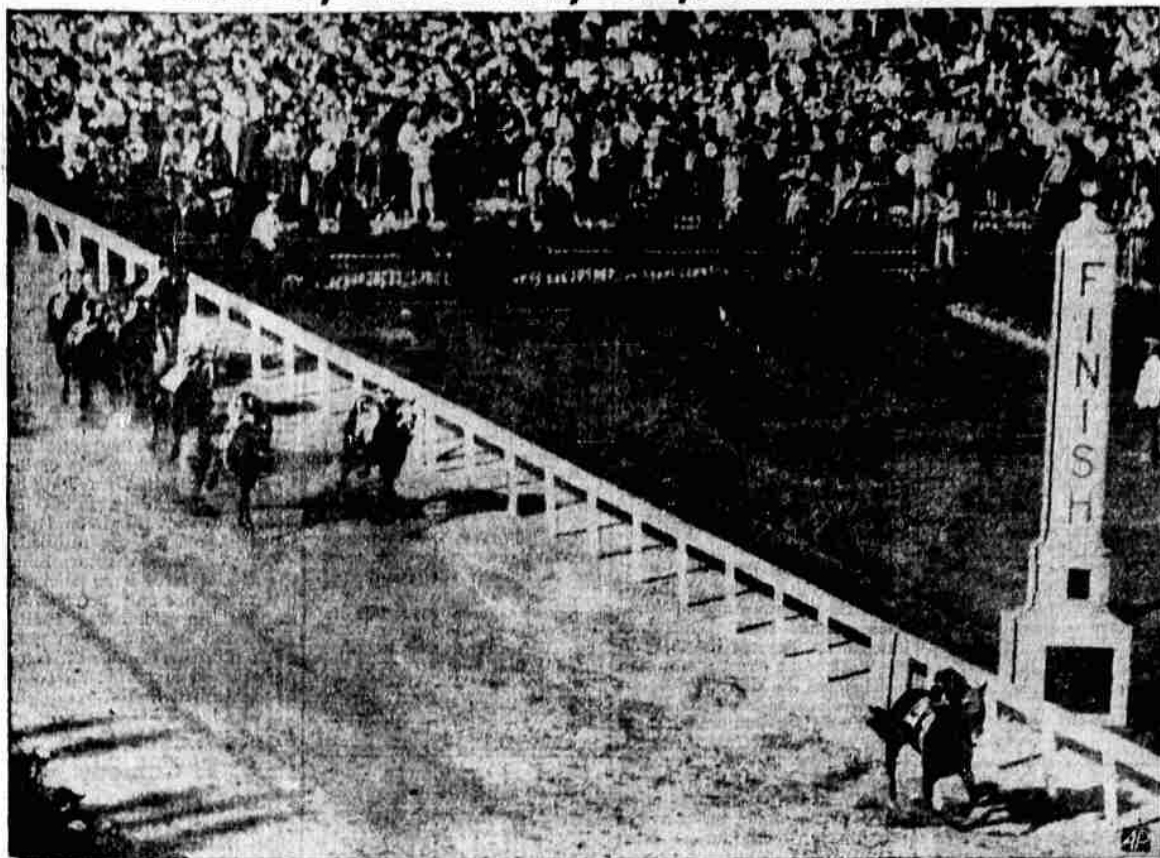


Whirlaway Wins Kentucky Derby; Sets New Record

Bobby Feller is due to go back to work for the Cleveland Indians today, which is enough to make the American league leaders a good bet to run their winning streak to 11 straight against the Washington Senators.

Since that surprising kayo the Chicago White Sox hung on his chin opening day, Master Robert has won four starts.

In running their victories through 10 straight—the latest a 12-run rout of the Senators yesterday—the Tribe's grade-A hurling staff has yielded only a fraction more than seven safeties per contest.

The Philadelphia Athletics set the day's high in their 17-11 victory over the White Sox. The A's, aided by four Sox errors in the first inning, got five runs for a starter; had a 12-4 lead at the end of the fourth, and picked up another five in the seventh as they ended a seven-game losing streak.

The New York Yankees, still in second place, fell three and a half games off Cleveland's pace when Big Buck Newsum set them on their collective ear, 10-1, with a five-hit pitching job for Detroit.

In St. Louis Lefty Grove hung up his first victory of the year as the Boston Red Sox, mainly on one big inning, thumped the Browns, 11-4.

A rookie pitcher, Tom Hughes, was the day's standout performer in the National league. The 21-year-old Philly hurler set down the world champion Cincinnati Reds, 3-0, with three singles, only two Reds getting as far as third.

The front-running St. Louis Cardinals ran their string to nine in a row. Held to six hits by the Braves, the Cards bunched five of them in the eighth against Manuel Salvo for all their runs and a 3-1 victory.

An error that paved the way for four unearned runs, three of them on Elbie Fletcher's homer, helped the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 6-4 triumph over the Brooklyn Dodgers, and cost Luke (Hot Potato) Hamlin his first defeat.

Another sort of streak was broken when the New York Giants, who hadn't won in seven starts, belted six (count 'em, 6) Chicago Cubs pitchers for 13 hits and a 9-4 score.

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Whirlaway Winner Of Kentucky Derby

Picture-book Horse Breaks Record Of Twenty Grand; Staretor Second

Louisville, Ky., May 5 (UP)—Whirlaway, a picturebook horse with a streak of madness in his blood and a touch of greatness in his brown legs, turned the biggest and richest Kentucky derby into the fastest one as well Saturday with an eight-length triumph that stamped his name among the immortals of the turf.

In exactly 2:01 2-5 seconds—the fastest time any thoroughbred has ever run the mile and a quarter strip in all the 67 years of America's favorite race—the

copper colored colt from Calumet farm wiped out the heartbreaks of a dozen previous disappointments with a performance that will linger as long as horses are bred.

For Kentucky, the homecoming was one that the hard-boots will never forget: Beaten by 20 different horses, defeated at seven different race tracks and ridden by eight different jockeys before a rider who could hold his wild temper in check climbed on his bronzed back today—Whirlaway won as only a champion can.

Calls on Speed
Far back when the early pace-setters went roaring down the straightaway in a flying cloud of dust, Whirlaway still was far behind when the 11-horse field slammed into the final turn. Then—on the heartbreak highway where races are won or lost—he called on the speed that his daddy, crazy old Blenheim II, had willed him. It was down the stretch, on that last long strip where many a horse and many a bubble has broken before, that Whirlaway repaid the faith and the hopes lodged in every Kentuckian's breast.

Whirlaway's closing burst was no more surprising than the horse that followed him to the wire for second place—Staretor, who wasn't reckoned much of a factor before the race. Market Wise was third a neck behind Staretor. Porter's Cap, hope of the far west and one of the most highly regarded horses in the field, was fourth, 11 lengths off the pace and badly beaten.

Largest Crowd
With the roaring, echoing cheers of 100,000 persons—the largest crowd ever to witness a horse race in North America—rocking the walls of rambling Churchill Downs until they all but fell apart, Whirlaway and Eddie Arcaro gave the folks a show, leaning far over until his lips touched his rolling mount's ear, the little Italian boy gave the word and Whirlaway lived up to the promise of his name.

He caught California's vaunted Porter's Cap as he swung clear of the bend and a hush went over the spectators as they waited on him to drift and swerve as he had done so many times in the past. But there was no zig-zag in Whirlaway today—just a blinding burst of speed that sent his gleaming silks and his cold-blooded rider catapulting across the finish line all by themselves and still going away.

Behind the first four the others trailed listlessly. There was Little Beans another two lengths away for fifth; Dispose 16 lengths removed from Whirlaway's nose for sixth; Blue Paul seventh and Our Boots, Robert Morris, Valinda Paul and Swain following in the order named. The crowd hardly gave them a look as Whirlaway trailed back to the winner's circle and stood, impatient and prancing, while Governor Keene Johnson circled his silky neck with the horse-shoe of roses.

For after they realized the extent of the great gap Whirlaway had won by, the crowd set up a second shout when the time of 2:01 2-5—two fifths of a second faster than the record Twenty Grand set in 1931 and one of the fastest times for a mile and a quarter turned in these past 10 years—was flashed up on the board. Whirlaway ran that mile and a quarter in 2:23 2-5; 46 3-5; 1:11 3-4; 1:37 2-5, and then the 2:01 2-5.

Sweet Victory
It was a glorious triumph for Warren Wright of Chicago, who bred the colt in the heart of the blue grass land just 75 miles north of Churchill Downs; but it was even a sweeter victory for Trainer Ben Jones and Jockey Arcaro, who teamed up to win the necklace of roses for Whirlaway.

Henley High Cops County "B" Meet

Hornets Score 53 Points; Mueller Shatters Vault Mark at Malin High

MERRILL — Henley high school emerged victorious Saturday afternoon with the Klamath county track crown after piling up 53 points at a meet sponsored by the Malin chamber of commerce at Malin. Outstanding event of the day was Bob Mueller's trip over the bar at 11 feet 7 1/2 inches for Henley to shatter the county pole-vault record, formerly 10 feet 11 inches set by Don Frazier of Merrill in 1933.

Gridder Ace Parker Breaks Left Leg

ASHEVILLE, N. C., May 5 (UP)—Clarence (Ace) Parker, outstanding football player in the National league last fall although he played with an iron brace on a broken right leg, broke his left leg Saturday in a baseball game here.

EUGENE, May 5 (AP)—By a scant quarter-inch Les Steers missed tying his own unofficial world record high jump here Saturday as Washington State college defeated the University of Oregon Track team, 72 2-3 to 58 1-3.
