Lack of Ships Hits Lumber Area, Claim

PORTLAND, Ore., May 6 (AP) — Transfer of more ships from inter-coastal trade will cripple the Pacific Northwest lumber industry, Hillman Lueddemann predicted yesterday. A shortage already has been felt, the northwest vice president of the Pope & Talbot Lumber company and McCormick Steamship company said. Lumber firms might have to cut production in half if shipping facilities are further reduced, he warned.

Temporary closure of one Gray's Harbor, Wash., mill and discontinuance of night shifts at three others was blamed on the shipping situation.

COMPLETION NEAR IN IMMUNIZATION

The extensive immunization program, which has been carried out in the city and county schools under the direction of Dr. Peter H. Rozendal, Klamath county health officer, is nearing completion and when the entire program has been approved more than 1000 children will have been contacted, Dr. Rozendal stated.

Merrill and Malin are schools which have not yet been completed and Dr. Rozendal will spend Wednesday in both communities giving the second shot of diphtheria immunization and smallpox vaccination. On Thursday he will visit Gilchrist for the day and include a number of examinations in the school work. Friday there will be a morning staff conference at the health unit followed by a visit to Henley and Summers schools where the year's work will be completed. Cooperation between parents and the health department has been excellent, it was said.

Lamp of Justice Still Bright in U. S., Says Hughes

WASHINGTON, May 6 (AP) — Chief Justice Hughes said today that the people of the United States "are engaged in harnessing our national power for the defense of our way of life" but that this way of life "is worth while only because it is the pathway of the just."

Addressing the annual session of the American law institute, the chief justice pointed out that "the lamps of justice are dimmed or have wholly gone out in many parts of the earth, but these lights are still shining brightly here."

"It is our high privilege, although our task may seem, almost, to strengthen the defenses of democracy by commanding to public confidence and esteem the working of the institutions of justice in both state and nation."

The chief justice said the administrative office of the United States courts, the law institute and other organizations were doing excellent work in improving the efficiency of the courts.

"Democracy cannot escape its pressure groups," he said. "Each interest has its imperious demands. These groups compete in the market place, in the forums of public opinion, in popular elections, and in our legislative halls, but they have no place in the halls of judicial administration."

RFC Chairman to Head Stock Exchange

NEW YORK, May 6 (AP) — Emil Schram, chairman of the Reconstruction Finance corp., has been approved by the board of governors of the New York Stock exchange as the next president of that institution.

Schram would take the post vacated by William McC. Martin Jr., who left the exchange last month for a year's service under the selective service act.

Pegler Awarded Pulitzer Prize for Labor Articles

NEW YORK, May 6 (AP) — Westbrook Pegler, columnist for the New York World-Telegram, today was awarded a Pulitzer prize of \$1000 for "articles on scandals in the ranks of organized labor, which led to the expulsion and conviction of George Scalise."

Pegler's award was in the "distinguished example of a reporter's work" classification.

The Pulitzer prize trustees made no award in the category of "distinguished novel" published during 1940 by an American author. No explanation was made.

The \$1000 prize for the original American play performed in New York went to Robert E. Sherwood's "There Shall Be No Night."

Other journalism awards went to Reuben Maury of the New York Daily News, \$500 for distinguished editorial writing, and

Jacob Burck of the Chicago Times, a like amount for distinguished cartooning, specifically for a cartoon entitled "If I Should Die Before I Wake," published June 2, 1940.

The St. Louis Post-Dispatch received a \$500 gold medal for "the most distinguished and meritorious public service rendered by an American newspaper during the year."

A special citation was given the New York Times "for the public educational values of its foreign news reports."

It was decided the usual \$500 award for "distinguished service as foreign or Washington correspondent" would be replaced this year by erection of a bronze plaque listing the names of newspaper, press association and syndicate reporters regularly assigned to the war zone.

Certificates of award will be presented to all reporters on the plaque.

In the field of literature \$1000 awards were given to the American biography, "Jonathan Edwards," by Ola Elizabeth Winslow, and to Leonard Bacon's book of verse, "Sunderland Capture."

"The Atlantic Migration," by Marcus Lee Hansen, was given the \$1000 prize for a "distinguished book of the year on the history of the United States."

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
