Danny Battles Dude Chick Tonight for Coast Crown

Dangerous Ready; So Is Cowboy

Tonight it's Mr. Dangerous Danny McShain versus Mr. Cowboy Dude Chick for the world's Pacific Coast Junior Heavyweight wrestling championship of America (Oregon division).

The big event, to which practically all of Klamath Falls and most of Chiloquin has been looking forward since early this morning, will begin with more than customary fanfare shortly after four other guys have completed their Tuesday exercise—somewhere along about 9:30 if the train is on time.

The old Klamath armory is expected to bulge with an overflow crowd, if advance ticket sales are a criterion. As of noon Tuesday, sales were 17,347 per cent ahead of last Tuesday at the same time but 4.65 per cent off the pace established last fall when Dangerous and Jesse James hooked up in the finals of Promoter Machiavelli Lillard's aging coast tournament. This was not believed to be the fault of Cowboy Dude, who has done his part.

Both lads are in fine fettle, to coin a cliché, particularly after their Monday night workout in Medford. Daniel hooked up with Klamath Ernie Piluso in the valley while Dude was grappling Peter Belcastro. Results were not available this morning but were expected at any time and in most any form.

In addition, Cowboy has continued his up-with-the-cows-and-bed-with-the-birds campaign which is credited largely with his double defeat of the more roisterous McShain over the past two weeks. Dangerous has been roistering.

Daniel's belt will be presented the winner tonight by Thomas J. Towey, Klamath wrestling commission chairman, in a fitting ceremony following the title grapple.

It is hoped that Danny will be in shape to receive or lose it. After each of his beatings by the Dude in preceding weeks he has been loathe, to say nothing of unable, to leave the mat without aid.

An old friend, tired but true, will appear before Klamath fans tonight when Otis Clingman, the Eugene restaurateur, climbs through the hemp to battle Gus, also known as Gus, Johnson. The St. Paul Swede is riding the crest of four local showings without a defeat. Clingman is presumed to have ridden over in his automobile.

Opening the exhibition will be Gil Knudsen, ash-blond Norwegian from Canada, and Ernie Piluso. Ernie is replacing one Dutch Hefner, who missed a train out of Los Angeles.

Knudsen last week defeated Tiger Steve Nenoff-Tsakoff. Piluso spent the evening at home. It all begins at 8:30.

COOTIE THOMPSON SIGNED BY STARS

HOLLYWOOD, May 6 (AP)—Quentin (Cootie) Thompson, 22-year-old right-hander from Stanford and one of the California Intercollegiate association's best pitchers the past two seasons, has been signed by Hollywood of the Pacific Coast league.

He plugged away with such diligence that he was voted the league's "most valuable" player last season, an honor which he previously won as a first baseman in 1935.

It hardly seems possible that the manager of a team that is riding the top of the National league on the crest of a 10-game winning streak would be growling at his ill luck but Billy Southworth was a sorely-tried man Monday.

His St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Boston Braves, 5-1 behind the five-hit pitching of Rookie Ernie White and there, in one bundle, is Southworth's trouble—pitching—too good and too much of it.

Major league rules will force him to cut his squad to 25 active players next Thursday.

All of the rookies have scored impressively. Sam Nahem and Johnny Grodzicki beat Pittsburgh and New York, the latter in two relief roles. Howie Kist whipped the Philadelphia Phillies with five hits and Hank Gornicki molded a one-hitter against the same club.

While made his initial start Monday and beat the Braves with five hits. Pinch-hitter Max West's homer in the eighth accounted for the Braves' only run. The triumph widened the Cards' league lead to 14 games.

All other games in the National league Monday were postponed because of rain and threatening weather.

In the American league the Cleveland Indians won their 11th straight, defeating Washington, 3-1. Bob Feller fanned 12 and walked seven as he held the Senators to three hits, for his fifth victory. Rollie Hemleig singled home Lou Boudreau with the deciding run off Ken Chase in the ninth inning to increase the Indians league lead to 4 1/2 games.

A five-run rally in the third inning featured by Pinky Higgins' long double with the bases loaded knocked out Lefty Gomez and gave the Detroit Tigers a 7-3 victory over the New York Yankees.

Rookie Pitcher Les McCrabb, making his second straight, pitched and batted the Philadelphia Athletics to a 5-4, 11-inning win over the Chicago White Sox. The loss was the third in a row for the Sox and dropped them into a third-place tie with the Tigers.

Softball Managers Will Meet

Deadline for Entries Set for May 7; Park Facilities Are Talked

Managers and sponsors of softball teams and directors of the Klamath Softball association are to mull over plans for the 1941 season at a meeting scheduled for Wednesday night at 7:30 o'clock in the city council chambers, according to an announcement made Tuesday morning by Lynn Roycroft, president of the association.

Since the deadline for team rosters was previously set for May 7, complete lists of players personnel also will be forthcoming at the Wednesday meeting. Entry fees, due May 1, will be accepted any time this week.

Starting Time
President Roycroft was emphatic in his statement that rosters and fees must be filed at once with Dave Bridge at the city recreation office or with Estlin Kiger at the New City Laundry. Formal opening of the 1941 season has been designated for Tuesday, May 20, and there must be no delay due to late applications, Roycroft added.

An earlier starting time, 7 p. m., will be observed this season for the doubleheader softball programs that will be played four nights a week, Tuesday through Friday. Hour time limits for each contest will be put in effect, and the lights will be turned off promptly at 9:30 p. m. or before.

Toilet facilities, the lack of which last season caused many complaints among residents of the neighborhood immediately adjoining Recreation park, have been installed behind the grandstand. Parking space on the Mills school playground only a half block from the softball field has been provided by officers of the city school system.

Objection to dust raised by vehicles driving and parking along the dusty roads adjacent to the park doubtless will be alleviated by this expected remedy. Subject of umpires for the league games to be played at Recreation field also is expected to draw its share of the discussion Wednesday night.
