

WHEELER SAYS STIMSON TALK AIMS AT WAR

LOANSING, Mich., May 7 (U.P.) Sen. Burton K. Wheeler (D-Mont.) charged Tuesday night that Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson's address advocating use of U. S. naval convoys to Great Britain showed the Roosevelt administration's foreign policy is "clearly designed to push us into war."

"The die is cast," Wheeler, a leading isolationist said in a statement recalling President Roosevelt's own statement on convoys and war.

"The speech," he said, "at last gives the American people a clear picture of the administration's policy of seeking to plow every fourth American boy under European soil." (His earlier reference to "plow under" brought sharp criticism from Mr. Roosevelt.)

Stimson's address, Wheeler said, apparently had the president's approval and indicated Mr. Roosevelt's pre-election promises of peace for America were only "campaign oratory." Stimson "cast the cloak of hypocrisy from the administration's foreign policy and shows it to be clearly designed to push us into war," Wheeler held.

"It is apparent now," he added, "that the president has not been frank with the American people and that every device means is being used to take the United States to war, notwithstanding the opposition from all corners of America."

"I say the issue now is crystal clear — war or peace, democracy or dictatorship," he declared in his address, "and one man, Franklin D. Roosevelt, will decide it. The president alone will determine if we are to remain at peace and remain a democracy, if the constitution of the United States is to be upheld, if we as a nation are to remain a sanctuary for democracy."

"Ninety per cent of the American people are against war, and they will not permit a small but vocal group of warmongers to take this nation into war and dictatorship," he said.

TOPEKA, Kas., May 7 (U.P.) — Alfred M. Landon Tuesday night said of Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson's speech that "I can't see how we can be brought nearer to war unless with a formal declaration by congress."

"It was the kind of speech the president should have made himself instead of letting his secretary speak on the grave issue of peace or war," said Landon.

"The people are entitled to know the situation from the head man himself."

CHICAGO, May 7 (U.P.) — The national headquarters of the America First committee Tuesday night accused Secretary of War Henry L. Stimson of being "old womanish and defeatist" in saying the U. S. navy would be unable to protect the western hemisphere if Britain falls.

In an official statement commenting upon Stimson's speech advocating use of the U. S. fleet to safeguard war shipments to Britain, spokesmen for the group charged that Stimson called not only for the use of convoys but for a declaration of war although "he refused to call it by its real name."

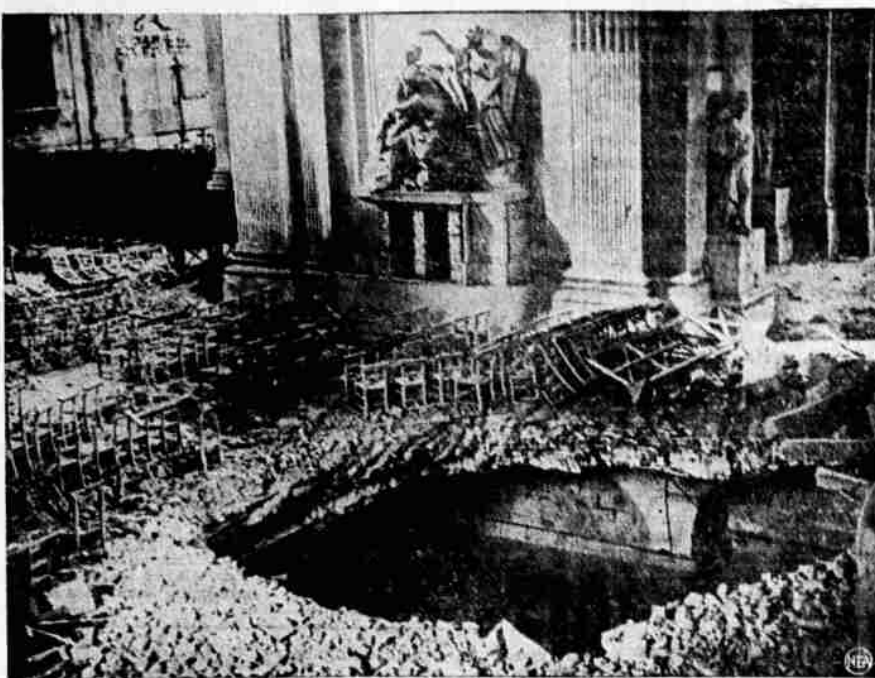
The Camp Fire girls will serve a dinner at the Weed Community church Friday, May 9, in the evening, honoring their mothers and grandmothers.

This Is the Bombhole That Closed St. Paul's



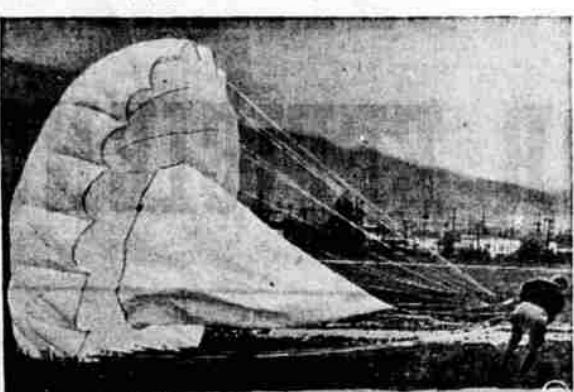

Portland Railroad Builder Passes

PORTLAND, May 7 (U.P.) — Funeral arrangements were delayed today, pending arrival of a son, for one of the northwest's pioneer railroad builders, Elmer E. Lytle, 80, who died Saturday.

He built and was president and principal owner of the Columbia River-Shaniko, Ore., line during the 1897-1900 period. He sold it to the Harriman interests in 1903.

The Harrimans also bought his second railroad, the Pacific Railway and Navigation company. Lytle also formed the Yakima Southern company to connect rail facilities with a Columbia river barge line, but the road was not completed.

Lytle lived in Tillamook county since his retirement several years ago.

Wassermann Test Sometimes False, Says Professor

DEL MONTE, Calif., May 7 (U.P.) — The Wassermann test frequently produces a "false" and misleading positive syphilis reaction in patients, Dr. George V. Kulchar, of the Stanford medical school, warned the California Medical association Tuesday.

Dr. Kulchar said the Wassermann test should not be relied on solely for syphilis examinations. He pointed out thousands of routine Wassermann tests for syphilis are being given to army draftees and, in California, to applicants for marriage licenses.

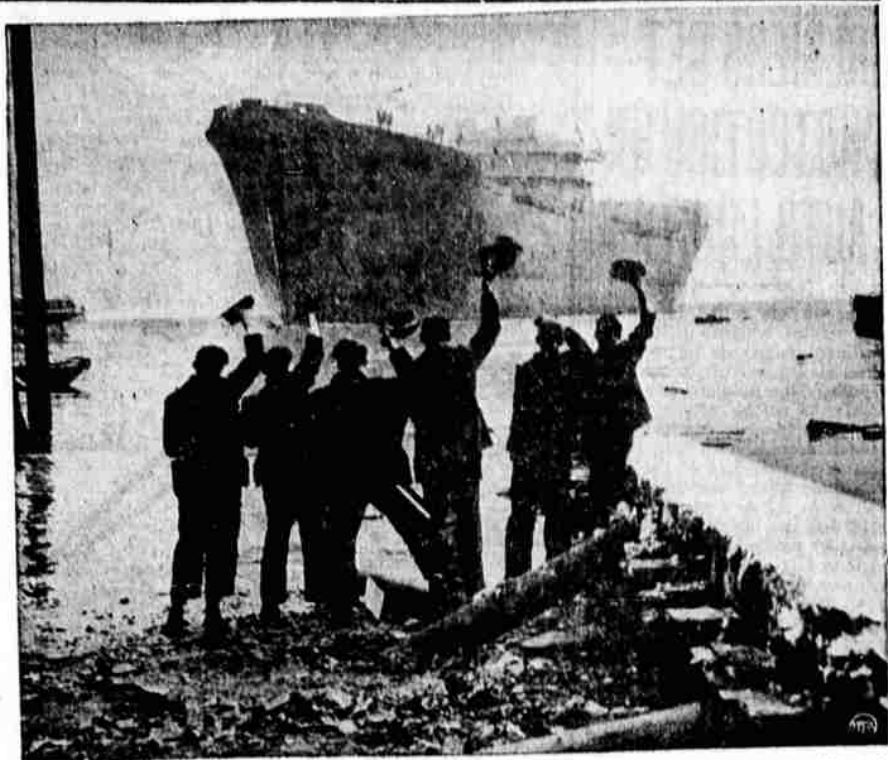
"The Wassermann," Dr. Kulchar said, "is not a specific reaction test, and in normal people's blood, as well as in the blood of patients with various diseases that are accompanied by fever, there are substances which will occasionally give a faint positive reaction, even when the organisms of syphilis are not present in the blood."

"This is called a biological 'false positive' reaction, and its occurrence is common enough to prompt a warning of more careful scrutiny of all positive Wassermann reactions," he said.

Dr. Kulchar advocated control by some central organization over private laboratories in making Wassermann tests. This would help to cut down the number of "false positive" reactions that are reported to people who do not have syphilis, he said.

Dr. Byron Stewart, Compton, described the newest advances in treatment of certain mental diseases, such as schizophrenia, through use of convulsive shock therapy.

Dr. Stewart said the use of electricity for shocking patients

was replacing drugs, such as insulin and metrazol. Many hospitals, he said, now pass a current of electricity through the patient's brain "with favorable results."

"Extensive experiments with animals has shown this procedure does not produce any damaging effect or endanger life," Dr. Stewart said.

Bowron Returned to Mayor Office by Los Angeles Voters

LOS ANGELES, May 7 (U.P.) — Mayor Fletcher Bowron, former superior judge, swept into office nearly three years ago as a reform candidate, was re-elected yesterday to a four-year term.

He defeated Stephen W. Cunningham, city councilman pledged to a business administration, with only about half the city's registered voters casting their ballots.

Trailing 90,597 to 112,556 on returns from 1750 precincts of 2753, Cunningham conceded defeat.

The campaign was enlivened by charges of wire-tapping from Cunningham supporters. The city council by resolution asked an investigation by the United States attorney and the federal grand jury.

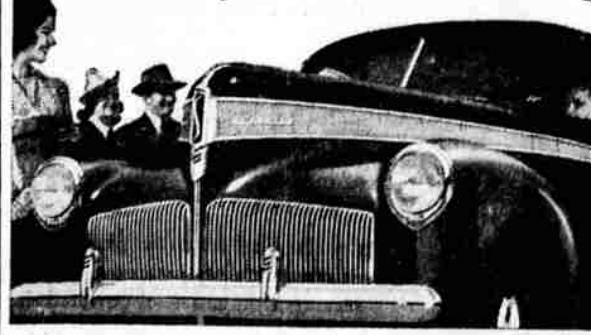
