Lady Frazer Dies Few Hours After Husband's Death

CAMBRIDGE, Eng., May 8 (AP)—Surviving her noted husband, Sir James George Frazer, by only a few hours, Lady Frazer died during the night. Sir James, 87, was well-known as an anthropologist and authority on folklore and gained wide attention as the author of "The Golden Bough," a vast collection of savage and civilized peoples. His wife, the former Mrs. Lily Groce, a native of France, also was known as a writer.

It was understood that both deaths resulted from the infirmities of old age.

Lady Frazer, who also was in her eighties, had devoted the latter part of her life to helping her husband overcome the handicap of falling sight and was his chief link with the outside world.

Only a few years ago they collaborated in writing a children's Christmas book, "Baba, the Imp."

Sir James died yesterday afternoon and his widow approximately 12 hours later.
