

GREEK TROOPS TRUDGE ROADS SEEKING KIN

IN GREECE, May 5 (UP)—(Delayed, via Courier to Berlin)—Tens of thousands of rugged Greek soldiers penniless and hungry, are trudging the highways of Greece in search of families left behind six months ago when they set out to battle the Italians.

Many are wandering aimlessly in a sorrowful trek that can be compared only to the days following the American Civil war when thousands of confederate soldiers started home afoot.

This unorganized, aimless breakup of Greece's army began immediately after Adolf Hitler's signature was placed on an order for the general release of all Greek prisoners of war, even before the German occupation of Athens.

The Greek soldiers, after months of fighting against the Italians and then the Germans, found themselves free men again but without any provisions for their future. The Germans had no interest in them once they were disarmed and released.

King George II and his Greek government had fled to Crete and the authorities remaining in Athens had no means of providing trains and trucks to transport them back home.

Only the roads were open to them and in the past few days 1 and other foreign correspondents touring the Greek war fronts have found thousands of these tattered Greek soldiers, plodding wearily along, thumbing rides and asking for food.

I have talked with many of these disarmed Greek soldiers and most of them told me the same story—no food since their release except scraps offered them by their own countrymen in villages or countryside.

In several cases, however, I saw German army field kitchens dishing out soup to small groups of them.

These men are the remnants of an army smashed in a few days by a blitzkrieg that owes its speed to Germany's dive-bombers and swift striking panzer units.

That became unmistakably clear in the course of a 500-mile automobile trip through the Greek battlefields from the Metaxas line to Athens. A party

of Berlin foreign correspondents made the trip under the auspices of German military authorities. Along the route of the British retreat to the sea, yawning bomb craters by the roadside and the wreckage of hundreds of British trucks and tanks gave testimony of the power of the blitzkrieg.

The accuracy of the Stukas was all but unbelievable. Mile after mile of craters lined both sides of the wreckage-littered roadway. The Germans seldom hit the highway itself—over which their own troops were to pass—but a majority of the hits were placed within a yard or so of the roadway.

Probably the two most battered towns in the whole southeastern battle area are Larissa and Lamia. Larissa suffered severely in an earthquake early in March. Then it was bombed successively by the Italians, Germans and British.

The town is wrecked. Hardly a single house is intact. The local German commander said hundreds of corpses still were under the wreckage.

Lamia was little more than a pile of wreckage after three days of stuka bombing.

OREGON TO FURNISH 210 IN NEXT CALL

SALEM, May 8 (AP)—Oregon will furnish 210 men in the tenth draft call June 2, 3, 4 and 5, state selective service headquarters here announced today.

Fifty-three men will report for induction on both June 2 and 3 and 52 on both June 4 and 5.

The number called will include for the first time the estimated percentage of men who will be rejected, eliminating replacement calls. Selective service headquarters said the number rejected in each call averages about 12 per cent.

Farrell Urges Study Of Multnomah Taxes

PORTLAND, May 8 (AP)—Robert S. Farrell Jr., speaker of the house, urged a meeting of the legislative interim committee on Oregon tax structure yesterday to study the Multnomah county assessment muddle.

Farrell, in a letter to Senate President Dean H. Walker, said the situation needed early consideration.

A recent court decision held that variations in the Multnomah county assessment rate on residential and business properties were illegal. The practice has been followed for a number of years.

and Efforts in Their Behalf

"Be Kind to Animals" week brought a number of interesting posters into the hands of the Humane society with two prize winners, one being the poster by John Chavez, grade eight, Crescent Lake, and the other that of Lois Lea Kandra, grade five, Merrill.

Oddly enough both of these posters had kittens as the motif, both naughty kittens and well behaved little cats. The many other posters covered a variety of animals. Judges of the contest were Mrs. Alice Howard, dean of girls at Klamath Union high school, and Mrs. John Kenoffel. The judges were unable to decide between first and second prize winner so Mrs. Althea Randel cast a deciding vote.

Other contestants were Peggy Arnold, John Sims, Hilla Chavez and Wayne Hebert from Crescent Lake; Eleanor Hunnicutt of Merrill; Patricia Eloise Ward, Oswaldo Magallanes, Carmen Chase, June Johnette House and Gloria Jean Fitzsimmon from Keno; Marian Schiefenstein, Billy Collier, Joyce Eckstrom, Buddy Brown, Rose Grondahl and Barbara Lee Zinn from Fairhaven.

The prizes awarded annually by the Humane society consist of very fine books, this year's first prize being Yainino-Kwiti, The Boy Runners of Siba, a story of the American Indians. The books are chosen by Miss Mary McComb who will present them to the winners on her regular trips with the book van. Mrs. Jean Young, vice president of the society, expects to accompany Miss McComb and present a pin to each of the other contestants.

Next year the society anticipates having the rules of the national contest early enough to distribute to the schools throughout the county so that the winning posters may be entered in the national event.

This year's winning posters are on display in the windows of the secretary-treasurer of the society, Mrs. Robert Odell, 118 North Eighth.

A report from the executive manager of the society for the month of April shows approximately 150 animals handled during the month, including dogs, cats, rabbits, lambs, and a calf. Work done includes, rescue of injured animals, disposal of animals killed by cars and left unreported, lambs picked up from

residents' lawns, a calf impounded and returned to its owner, dog shipped by express to an owner compelled to leave town and her pet left until called for at the shelter, rescue of and first aid treatment to a dog left in a basement, and many other acts of mercy. Response to telephone calls have ranged from 7:30 in the morning to midnight. While the Shelter always stands by to give aid, unless it is for the relief of suffering or some unavoidable need we would appreciate calls coming in as early in the evening as possible or being held until the following morning. Visitors are welcome.
