MOTHERS' DAY EXERCISES SET; SNELL TO TALK

Mothers' day will be observed by Klamath Falls Aerie, Fraternal Order of Eagles, and auxiliary, with special exercises on Sunday, May 11, 2:30 p. m. at the Klamath Falls armory.

The principal speaker on the program will be Earl Snell, secretary of state, a prominent member of the fraternity. The public is invited to attend.

This annual commemoration of Mothers' day is a long standing tradition in the Fraternal Order of Eagles, declared Worthy President A. R. Renner. Two years before congress set aside the second Sunday in May as Mothers' day, the grand aerie, or national governing body of the fraternity, enacted legislation providing that all aeries in the jurisdiction observe Mothers' day with appropriate ceremonies.

The interest of the fraternity in Mothers' day dates back to February 7, 1904, the day on which one of its leaders, Frank E. Hering, now editor of the Eagles magazine and chairman of the Eagles' national old age pension commission, delivered the first-known public plea for a nation-wide Mothers' day.

In 1925, the American War Mothers issued this statement: "The Fraternal Order of Eagles was the first organization to conduct a national campaign for the observance of Mothers' day."

The committee in charge of the program includes, G. C. Persell, Sid Herbert, R. M. Book, Dolly Machado, Stella Persell and Ursel Bratton, with C. D. Long as master of ceremonies. Aerie officers expect a record crowd to attend.

Australia Loses 3000 in Greece

CANBERRA, Australia, May 8 (AP)—Total Australian casualties in Greece—including killed, prisoners and missing—probably were less than 3000 out of a force of 16,000 men, Army Minister Percy G. Spender declared today.

He said he based his estimate on dispatches received from Lieut. Gen. Sir Thomas Blamey, deputy commander-in-chief of imperial forces in the middle east.

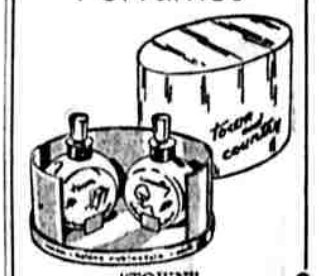
