

SOVIET CUTS RELATIONS IN CAPTIVE AREA

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governments, notifying them that their ministerial powers had lost their validity.

The withdrawal of recognition was disclosed step by step—first to Norway, then Belgium and then Yugoslavia.

It was the Yugoslav minister, Milan Gavrilovic, who on April 5 signed with Foreign Commissar Molotov a Russian-Yugoslav treaty of friendship and non-aggression. Yugoslavia was invaded the next day and has been conquered by Germany.

Norway was invaded April 9, 1940, and Belgium a year ago tomorrow.

LONDON, May 9 (AP)—Informed sources in London characterized Russia's withdrawal of recognition from the Norwegian, Belgian and Yugoslav legations in Moscow as an action which "could cause some satisfaction to the Germans without costing Russia very much." Otherwise there was little disposition to comment.

Ramadi is about 12 miles north of Habbaniyah. Falluja is some 22 miles to the northeast, across Lake Habbaniyah. Both are communication centers on the Euphrates and the east-west road leading to Baghdad.

On the north African front the war bulletin said severe sandstorms again had hampered operations at Tobruk, Libyan port.

Eighty miles to the east, on the Egyptian-Libyan border, vigorous patrol activity by imperial mechanized forces are said to be continuing.

JUSTICE BEAN OF STATE COURT DIES

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of those handed down by the court. His most outstanding opinions were those involving adjudication of water rights in eastern Oregon streams.

In spite of his advanced age, Justice Bean was active until his last illness, carrying his full share of work.

He served two terms as chief justice, in 1931 and 1932, and in 1937 and 1938.

Born in Bethel, Maine, Nov. 13, 1853, he was educated in the public schools, and at Hebron and Gould academies. He then taught school six years.

After reading law in a law office in Bethel, Justice Bean was admitted to the bar in 1881, coming to Pendleton, Ore., in the same year.

Justice Bean was elected Pendleton city attorney in 1882 and city recorder in 1885. He also served a term in the legislature in 1889.

He was appointed supreme court clerk in Pendleton in 1895, holding the position for a year. Justice Bean also served as district attorney for Umatilla county for two terms, and was Umatilla county judge from 1904 to 1906.

During his residence in Pendleton, he was in law partnership with James A. Fee, John W. Lawrey and Stephen A. Lowell.

Justice Bean served as circuit judge for the sixth judicial district from 1906 to 1910, when he was elected to the state supreme court. His continuous service on the supreme bench began on Jan. 1, 1911. His present court term began four years ago and expires in January, 1943.

Justice Bean's successor, who will finish out his term, will be appointed by Governor Charles A. Sprague.

Justice Bean was married June 8, 1886 to Mattie E. Magahey of Pendleton, who died here in February, 1939. Two children, Mrs. Harold J. Larsen of Beaverton, and Hawley J. Bean, Echo (Umatilla county) attorney, survive.

He was a member of the Masonic and Knights of Pythias lodges, and was a life-long republican.

In the far east, indications arose that Japan may be seeking to free herself from the long-drawn conflict in China, possibly with an eye on United States gestures toward stronger participation in the war.

The Japan Times and Advertiser, Tokyo newspaper controlled by the Japanese foreign office, said flatly that Japan's attempt to overcome Chinese force of arms "must have little more appeal even to the most sanguine of soldierly minds."

In the near east, Reuters, British news agency, quoted the Berlin correspondent of a Swiss newspaper as saying it was believed the Vichy government of France had agreed to the passage of German troops through Syria, as well as through French provinces and other French-managed territories.

The mediation board was asked to attempt settlement of two more disputes. MISSOULA, Mont., May 9 (AP) Grinning and giving the fascist salute, 125 Italian seamen arrived in this northwest Montana town today on a special train and immediately were taken to nearby Fort Missoula for internment.

Heavily guarded by the United States border patrol, the six-car train reached Missoula at 5:45 a. m. MST and was shunted to a siding inside the military reservation, established in 1877 when white settlers feared Indian depredations.

Ten-foot iron posts already have been placed around the barracks and sailors will help in placing heavy wire to complete the enclosure.

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the city elementary district, as a result of the passage of a law at the last legislature increasing terms in first class districts to five years. Other confusing factors include the possible resignation of one member who has moved out of the district, and the fact another member is serving out an unexpired term of a director who has already resigned.

The board asked for an opinion from the attorney general's office, and this week received an interpretation of the law as applied to the local situation from Rex Putnam, state school superintendent.

Under his opinion, the situation is as follows:

The term of E. S. Robinson, which originally expired in 1943, is extended to June, 1945. L. L. Truax, whose term originally expired in 1942, would draw lots with Godfrey Blohm to determine which term expires in 1943 and which in 1944.

Blohm, however, will have to stand for election, if he is to remain on the board, because he is serving out the unexpired term of J. W. Kerns, resigned.

The terms of A. M. Collier and Mrs. Bert Hawkins originally would have expired this year. However, if Collier, who has moved out of the district, resigns before election, it will automatically extend the term of Mrs. Hawkins to 1942.

Hence it appears directors will be elected to fill the positions now held by Blohm and Collier, and possibly the one held by Mrs. Hawkins.

The new directors will be elected for five-year terms. In the county district, two directors are to be elected. The term of Harry Wilson, of the southern zone, expires, and will be filled at the balloting. So

Desk Sergeant R. Cook said Chase entered the precinct by a rear door about 3 a. m. and, when Lt. Johnson returned from lunch about 3:20, entered his office. A shot which penetrated the lieutenant's body was fired and Johnson staggered from his office gasping "Chase shot me."

Chase appeared in the doorway shouting, "I've stood all I could." He ordered Special Patrolman R. L. Turlay, who had been consulting with the desk sergeant, to leave the building, then opened fire on the lieutenant again. One shot tore off Johnson's trigger finger.

Despite his wounds, Johnson fired four times but the bullets missed his assailant. Cook said he was unable to reach his revolver, which was in a desk drawer, until Chase had fled. Johnson died about half an hour later.

Captain Lewis learned that Chase fled to the home of Arthur Wood, a nephew, at Milwaukie, Portland suburb where he washed up, discarded six of seven guns he had removed from his apartment home and from his police locker, and left. Later he telephoned a Willamette river moorage manager with instructions to turn over a boat he owned to his nephew. He informed the manager that a doctor had told him he had only "three months to live."

Mayor Earl Riley of Portland said Chase, a policeman here since 1918, had a good service record barring a few minor infractions of rules lately.
